

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

Wells Reserve at Laudholm holds secrets of salt water marsh

A salt marsh is a place with lots of matted down grass, insatiably hungry mosquitoes, eerie-looking eels, and an occasional great blue heron standing tall and proud in the muck. You will know when you are driving by one because your passengers will complain that it smells like rotten eggs. Although it doesn't sound too pleasant, a salt marsh is a great place to visit with loads of fascinating little secrets and one big one: its continued existence is of vital importance to the health and wellbeing of our ecosystem.

A mere 30 minutes south of Portland, Maine, Wells Reserve at Laudholm (342 Laudholm Farm Road, Wells) is a 1,600-acre national estuarine research reserve that is dominated by salt marsh (approximately 1,200 acres) fed by the Little and Webhannet rivers' numerous

Wells Reserve Trail System

With more than seven miles of beginner and intermediate trails through forests and coastline, the Reserve offers the following options as recommended routes to hike while visiting:

The Salt Marsh Loop: On this trail, read through sign displays describing how rain and snowmelt move through a watershed and into an estuary, where fresh water mixes with salt water from the Gulf of Maine.

The Forest Interpretive Trail: Wander through the relaxing woodland trail and discover how landscape vegetation shifts over time, succeeding from open space to mature forest, and how water and wildlife are influenced by that change.

Laudholm Beach: Walk the length of the beach and end at the mouth of Little River, where the beach acts as a barrier for mudflats that support the life of shellfish and

Visitors can walk on their own through these trails, or join a professionally guided tour, such as "Secrets of the Salt Water Marsh" or "Life Between the Tides." Visit the website for a complete listing.

estuaries. The conservation land also incorporates the historic Laudholm Farm buildings, the Maine Coastal Ecology Center, and many fields, forests and beaches along the coastline of Wells. Visitors are welcome on the reserve daily to observe, hike the trails or attend one of several educational programs offered. There are many incredible things to see and learn at Wells Reserve at Laudholm.

What is a salt marsh?

Salt marshes are wetlands found along the world's coastlines. Often, they are on the boundaries of estuaries where fresh water and ocean water mix. Bays, harbors, rivers and other partially enclosed bodies of water are considered estuaries if they have a blend of both fresh and salt water.

Salt marshes are transitional areas between the sea and land and are necessary for the survival of many species of wildlife and plants. They are also extremely fragile and can be affected severely by inclement weather, invasive species and, especially, man-made pollution.

Salt marshes are sometimes referred to as tidal marshes. Here on the Eastern Coast they experience the ocean tides and are flooded and drained two times each day. According to Wells Reserve Education Director Suzanne Kahn Eder, the tides make the salt marshes even more astounding.

"All of the plants and animals that make the

The Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge

For those looking for even more salt marsh viewing, the Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge (321 Port Road, Wells, 207-646-9226, www.fws.gov/northeast/rachelcarson) is another point of interest along the coastline of Maine. It was established in 1966 to protect valuable salt marshes and estuaries for migratory birds. Located along 50 miles of coastline in York and Cumberland counties, it protects 10 estuaries that are migration routes for birds, as well as habitats for many species of marine and land wildlife such as the endangered piping plover and the New England cottontail. It will contain approximately 14,600 acres, including rocky coastline, forests, salt marshes, and sandy/dune beaches when land acquisition is complete. There are four developed trails on the refuge that are open daily from sunrise to sunset, and visitors will see a plethora of wildlife, and maybe a few naturalists and photographers along the way. In fact, the Carson Trail is the most often visited, having had approximately 100,000 human guests thus far. Cost is free. Unlike the Wells Reserve, Rachel Carson Refuge is pet-friendly, allowing leashed dogs on its trails.

salt marsh their home need to go through an incredible adaptation because of the tides. The marsh looks completely different at high tide than it does at low tide," she said.

Who eats whom? Life in the marsh

The many species of plants that live in the marshes provide sustenance for terrestrial life, while some grasses simply decompose and then are washed away in the water, providing nutrients for marine life. Insects and their larvae, as well as marsh vegetation, are sought out and eaten by the nearly 60 species of fish and more than 235 species of birds that have been sighted at the reserve.

Larger mammals and predators also find the food abundantly attractive in the marsh. Foxes, raccoons, rabbits, bats, deer, otter and harbor seals are just a few of the many animals that can be found at Wells Reserve at any given time. Even more fascinating are the frequent sightings of endangered species such as bald eagles and peregrine falcons.

The importance of these animal and plant species is great, but there is also another group of marine life that uses the salt marsh as breeding and feeding grounds — commercial fish — and these are the animals that we might find particularly attractive because they often feed us. Scott Richardson, writer, editor and photographer for Wells Reserve, noted that some of the more recognizable commercial fish species that dwell in the salt marsh are striped bass, rainbow smelt, river herring, flounder and bluefish.

"The mud minnow is also important. It is not harvested but feeds other commercial fish," Richardson said.

Eder revealed a few of the little-known but important secrets of salt water vegetation. Some of the most abundant are the grass species such as cord grass and salt meadow hay, and the marsh depends on these grasses for its survival.

"The salt meadow hay has a really cool tidal adaptation, essentially acting like a filter by pushing the salt in the water out to its leaves while it is under water. If you run your finger along it when it is dry, the salt will rub off. The grasses and vegetation also provide a buffer to the topography against erosion," Eder said.

Eder also explained why the salt marsh smells the way it does: "The rotten egg smell is due to bacteria, which are the decomposers of the marsh. They break down the dead plants and in the process give off hydrogen sulfide," she said.

Guests of Wells Reserve at Laudholm will learn this secret and many others if they attend one of three remaining reserve tours titled "Secrets of the Salt Marsh." In this educational program lasting approximately 11/2 to 2 hours, visitors will be guided on an easy walk about one mile to salt marsh overlooks and observe the marsh over Little River. The next program is scheduled for Monday, July 18, at 10 a.m.

From store to gallery

Old York spot preserves history, connects people with art

To the right of the George Marshall Store Gallery entrance, beneath a plaque declaring the building a historic landmark, is a sign that states: Old York George Marshall Store, a community museum.

The George Marshall Store Gallery, located on 140 Lindsay Road in York, Maine, is no longer a store. At least not the way it originally was in the late 1800s. For years the store served the community of York with goods and supplies. The York River was the main system of moving product at that time. But as trains came through the area and the invention of the automobile brought the need for Route 1 and eventually Interstate 95, the store was left empty or used for storage. The York Historical Society stepped in and purchased the building. It was renovated, though again it was used for storage, before eventually finding new life as an art gallery.

"It wasn't really a plan to start an exhibition gallery here," said Mary Harding, curator of contemporary art at the gallery.

Harding had, at one time, been the director of the Barn Gallery in Ogunquit. She left the Barn Gallery to raise her family, two boys now in college, but was still involved with art, often visiting artists she had worked with in the past. Over time the historical society moved to a different location, leaving the George Marshall Store unoccupied once again.

An artist Harding had worked with in the

past, Tom Glover, put together a series of paintings about Brave Boat Harbor, a harbor located between York and Kittery.

"I thought, these are wonderful paintings, I really want to show this work," Harding

Harding was looking for a spot to exhibit Glover's work when she remembered the space in George Marshall's store. She went to then-curator Tom Johnson with the idea of displaying Glover's work in the space. Johnson agreed and told Harding that at the same time there would be a hike for history that spring in Brave Boat Harbor.

"It was serendipity," Harding said.

The reception toward the exhibition was positive and Johnson asked Harding what she would do next.

"I thought I might go to the beach," Harding said.

Harding has been running exhibits at the gallery for 15 years since.

This summer season the George Marshall Store Gallery is once again bringing together a collaboration between art and a Maine fixture. Stonewall Kitchen, in a partnership with Jacquelyn Nooney Landscape, will present the exhibit "From the Garden to the Kitchen" in two parts. The first part runs now until July 10, and the second part will be open July 16 through August.

The exhibit is in recognition of Stonewall Kitchen's 20th anniversary. Many of the gallery's pieces are re-created in the company's garden with input from landscape designer

Jacquelyn Nooney and Harding.

Painstaking detail in work such as James Aponovich's "Appledore Island Still Life with Day Lillies" and the contemporary lines and shapes of George Lloyd's "The Cook" represent the relationship between the produce of a garden and how people use it.

The George Marshall store building is part of the Museums of Old York, a group of historic buildings including homes, the Old Schoolhouse, Jefferd's Tavern and the Old Gaol (jail). And though the Marshall building is included in that list, Harding runs the gallery as a program for the museum. The gallery focuses on contemporary art.

The pieces in the gallery's exhibits are for sale with varying price ranges. Some work in the current exhibition has already sold. A percentage of the sales from the gallery go to the Museums of Old York as a way to fund the maintenance of the historic building.

But the gallery has a good following, said Harding. It also puts on various fundraisers throughout its year-round operation, including art parties and dinners.

"Art is a wonderful carrot," said Harding. "People are drawn to art, and people are drawn to food "

Harding said that each year the gallery receives new clients, some from as far away as Texas, and that they will often return.

To Harding, the space is more than just a gallery. It's part of a community identity. A new wharf is being built behind the George Marshall Store Gallery, which stands along the

banks of the York River. The docking area will be available for the use of local lobstermen.

"It is a real special space," Harding said. "I think being here, being on the water, I always say, 'We have really good chi."



A run to remember

Summertime race honors a friend and aims to help others

Summer is a time for enjoying the great outdoors and getting fit. One way to do this is to join a road race, and luckily there are many to choose from this season in Maine's York County. A road race of any length and duration will take physical exercise to a new level, introducing the spirit of competition and the unparalleled satisfaction of achieving a significant individual goal. But even more rewarding will be running for a cause that you personally believe in.

Remembering Nicole

"By organizing these races, we remember Nicole. It brings back lots of wonderful memories of our high school days," said Jenn Walker, co-director of Nicole's Run. Jenn and her close friend Amanda Morris have been organizing Nicole's Run along Kennebunk Beach for four years now.

Jenn and Amanda and their high school classmate Nicole Oliver were best friends starting in fourth grade. They hung out together, dated together and graduated high school together. After graduation, Amanda and Nicole continued their close friendship, sharing their ups and downs, getting married, having children, and pursuing a nursing career side by side.

Unfortunately, that all came to an abrupt halt when, on July 9, 2007, Nicole was shot to death at the age of 24 by her estranged husband, who went on to kill himself. In the rubble of this terrible tragedy, the deceased couple left two small children, ages 6 and 2.

Amanda planned the first Nicole's Walk/Run in 2008 to honor and remember Nicole. Since then, and with Jenn's help, the race has become a tribute to all victims and survivors of domestic violence, creating a sense of community, giving a voice to the voiceless and spreading the word that domestic violence is a real dilemma facing as many as one in every three women today.

"Amanda is very adamant that this tragic incident and the countless others happening every day will not be forgotten," Jenn said. Annual involvement in the race has proven that Amanda has succeeded. The first Nicole's Run in 2008 saw a little over 300 runners, and in the last few years the participation level has increased to its capacity of nearly 400. Additionally, Nicole's Run has raised \$50,000 for Caring Unlimited, York County's domestic violence program providing a 24-hour hotline, outreach service programs, emergency shelter and transitional housing to thousands.



Preparing for race day

Beginning at Lord's Point on Kennebunk Beach, Nicole's Run is a 5K road race and/or walk that will begin at 9 a.m. on Saturday, July 16. The road race follows the scenic Kennebunk Beach Improvement Association (KBIA) seaside course, which is USATF Certified, relatively flat with a few moderate hills. Those who plan to run the 5K-road race may want to prepare ahead of time by following these recommended preparation tips:

Get examined by a doctor to make sure running is a safe activity for you.

Start with a weeklong walking routine, slowly increasing the duration from 20 to 30 minutes.

Introduce short spurts of running (2 minutes) in the 30-minute walking routine.

Increase running time and decrease walking time by 1 minute each week until runner can run continuously for 30 minutes.

On race day, professional runners recommend dressing in clothes as if it were 15 degrees warmer than it actually is. Also, it is important to wear bright and/or reflective clothing and comfortable running shoes. Eat at least one hour before the race and choose foods that are high in carbohydrates and low in fat, such as bagels, peanut butter, bananas or energy bars.



Ghost stories thrive on seaside cruise

Haunted harbor tour nears lighthouses and isles

The seacoast offers a wide range of summer water excursions, with boat tours that provide close-up glimpses of Portsmouth Harbor, Rye Harbor and the surrounding scenery.

For whale watches and simple cruises to the infamous Isles of Shoals, boats leave daily from docks in Portsmouth (Isles of Shoals Steamship Company, www.islesofshoals.com; The Heritage, www.portsmouthharbor.com) and Rye (Island Cruises, www.ryeharborcruises.com; Atlantic Whale Watch and Deep Sea Cruises, www.atlanticwhalewatch.com). But if you are looking for a little extra adventure, consider the Saturday, July 9, haunted cruise aboard the M/V Granite State, from 7 to 10 p.m. Cost is \$49 per person, and tickets may be purchased by calling 603-431-9155 or visiting www.lighthouse.cc/tours/xtrex.html.

Jeremy D'Entremont, founder of New England Lighthouse Tours (www.newenglandlighthousetours.com), and Ron Kolek, radio host and founder of the New England Ghost Project (www.neghostproject.com), will be offering a summer adventure aboard the whale excursion boat as it makes its way out of Rye Harbor past lighthouses and to the Isles of Shoals. They'll tell tales of haunted happenings and personal experiences. The three-hour cruise will have a snack bar with beer available for patrons, and if the weather is not conducive all customers will receive a refund, with hopes of rescheduling. Expect to get close to the islands as both guides provide narratives such as "The Women in White," about a woman who calls out storm warnings on White Island.

"There are many legends and ghost stories surrounding the islands," D'Entremont said. The lore of White Island focuses on the "The Lady Watcher of the Shoals," and according to some sources it is common to see a lady in white wandering the shores. According to D'Entremont, Coast Guard personnel have admitted to seeing the vision. Up until the 1980s the Coast Guard maintained lighthouse keepers on the island, but now the lighthouses are mostly automated

There is much more the duo will discuss on the boat trip, including a story about Betty Moody's Cave on Star Island. It's a little alcove hidden in the rocks, and there is a story about a woman who hid there during an Indian attack while holding her infant. When the infant began to cry she smothered it to keep it quiet. Some people have said the women's spirit now haunts the island. As for Star Island, where the former Oceanic Hotel once stood it is now home to the Star Island Conference Center, and there are rumors indicating the white porch-lined hotel itself is haunted. Some people claim to have heard footsteps in places where they are physically impossible to be along with sounds resembling furniture being moved. As for Appledore Island, which the boat will get close to, there is a story about pirate Phillip Babb who lived on the island in the 1600s and was also a constable. Supposedly this pirate will

appear wearing a butcher's apron. And then there is the infamous Smutty Nose Island ghost story in which two Norwegian women were allegedly murdered by a fisherman who now haunts the island

Last year, according to D'Entremont, Jim Stonier, an Electronic Voice Phenomena (EVP) expert who works with the New England Ghost Project, brought some of his recording equipment along. As the boat edged close to Smuttynose Island, he asked, "If there are any spirits here, please say something." When the recording was played back, L'Entremont explained they heard, 'We're being rescued. Boat.'

D'Entremont has been involved in lighthouse-related research and photography for 25

"I don't know the answers to any of this, but my personal feeling is there is something to it this is a big universe, and all we know is what we experience through our senses. I tend to be skeptical about a lot of things that happen, but I also believe there is something to it and have had very strong personal experiences myself" he said

If you enjoy the haunted tour, visit the Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse next to Fort Constitution, where you will find D'Entremont most Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m., when the lighthouse is open to the public. The next lighthouse walking tour will start on Thursday, July 16, at 7 p.m., and cost \$20 per person. There will be additional tours that evening at 8:45 and 10:30 p.m. Visit www.portsmouthharborlighthouse.org.



Barking up the right trees

Two new books about New Hampshire's nature

Here are two new books that would make good resources as you prepare for a trip to a state park or a local nature trail, or good reading during some down time on a hike.

The Wildlife of New England: A Viewer's Guide, by John S. Burk, University of New Hampshire Press, 2011, 279 pages.



This book purports to answer "Where are you most likely to spot a moose, black bear, or otter in the wild? On what hilltop can you see thousands of migrating hawks in a single day? Where might you see a basking shark, seal, or sea

star?" Its first part is organized by state. In the New Hampshire section, there are 13 wildlife areas addressed, including Great Bay, Odiorne Point State Park, The Connecticut Lakes, and Pack Monadnock and North Pack Monadnock mountains. It's all text, except a couple small

gratuitous pictures. For each area, facts and figures (and directions) are given and then some discussion of "Viewing" - what wildlife you're likely to see there, when and how — and "Getting Around." It's nothing extensive, but a sampler of places you might put on an itinerary. The last 10 percent or so of the book comprises profiles of "iconic and characteristic" New England animal species, organized by what types of land they inhabit (woodland, mountains, etc.). Not an exhaustive list, in other words, but a list of highlights. A nice little paperback reference book. The copyright page says the book was made in the U.S.A. and notes that "University Press of New England is a member of the Green Press Initiative. The paper used in this book meets their minimum requirement for recycled paper." (University of New Hampshire Press is part of UPNE.)

Bark: A Field Guide to Trees of the Northeast, by Michael Wojtech, University Press of New England, 2011, 264 pages.



You've seen tree guides and leaf guides, but I bet you've never seen a bark guide. And aside from peely white birch bark, I bet you never thought too much about identifying trees by their bark. But Michael Wojtech, of western Massachusetts, did, and

here he shows you how.

You need to read the book as prescribed, because there's an order to the system. First you figure out which one of six categories your bark belongs to, and then you use assorted variables to narrow it down to a specific kind of tree variables like smoothness, cracks, scales, curls, shapes and sizes of ridges and blocks — and it's complicated by the fact that bark changes as a tree ages. The book is full of diagrams and photos showing scale and detail.

If you regularly encounter trees you're curious about, here's one more angle of approach to know them by. And even if you already know your trees pretty well, this could help you get to know them better.

Although *Bark* is from the same publisher as The Wildlife of New England, this one is "Manufactured in China" and says nothing about eco-friendly paper. It's glossier.

Kennebunk restaurant is a 'local pub'

Duffy's Tavern and Grill feeds the home crowd

Duffy's Tavern and Grill is the type of place where everybody knows your name. Located on Main Street in Kennebunk, Maine, the restaurant and bar grew up in and serves the local community, much like owner David Cluff.

"If you were back home, this would be your place," Cluff said. "We strive to be a local pub."

Cluff grew up in the area and worked for the town's public safety as the deputy fire chief. But his work for the town, though rewarding, was a brief stop between two restaurant ventures

In 1986 Cluff, then in his 20s, ran a successful pizza shop in town. The shop expanded to serve ice cream and include a bakery. In 1991 Cluff sold the shop and began his work in public safety. Retiring from his position as fire deputy in 2009, Cluff saw the potential for a bar and grill in town. He envisioned a new way to serve the community, by offering a space where people could come and feel comfortable; where they could get to know one another. By the end of the restaurant's first year, it was ready for an expansion.

"Most of our business is from locals," Cluff said. "We're not in the tourist belt."

Still, new patrons are always welcome, and some come back year after year. Cluff said he does see an overflow of people who come into town from the beaches of Kennebunkport. The restaurant offers a rewards, or "Duffy's favorites," program. "A lot of out-of-staters use that program," Cluff said. The rewards program is divided into two separate memberships. The Storer Street membership is free and earns those enrolled three points for every dollar spent; once the customer reaches a certain number of points.

he or she is rewarded with free or discounted items. The Main Street membership costs \$45 a year; it gives the customer his or her own beer mug and takes 25 cents off each drink, beer or wine. Wine drinkers can enjoy a larger custom wine glass. Those enrolled also eat free on their birthday.

Food brings the customers in. The haddock (baked, with butter crumb topping, house potato, gravy and vegetable, \$9.99) is the restaurant's number-one seller — "Ever since we opened, that has stayed on top," Cluff said.

The haddock is also used for the restaurant's fish and chips (fried, with fries and coleslaw, \$9.99). Other seafood options include the fried Maine shrimp roll (served with clam chowder, \$10.99), a Cajun fried shrimp dinner (Gulf shrimp with fries and cole slaw, \$14.99) and a lobster roll and chowder (quarter pound of lobster with lettuce on a grilled roll served with chowder, \$16.99). The shellfish, Cluff said, is purchased locally in town and through a Maine distributor.

For those looking for something other than seafood, Duffy's also offers classic dinner options. The turkey dinner (with the house potato, stuffing, topped with gravy and paired with cranberry sauce and vegetable, \$9.99) is the number two seller, Cluff said. Also available is a 10-ounce sirloin steak (topped with bleu cheese butter and paired with vegetable and house potato in gravy, \$16.99), a shepard's pie (with salad, \$8.99) and boneless pork chops (with a homemade apple sauce and served with the house potato with gravy and vegetables).

Vegetarian options are included on the menu. Choices of vegetable scampi (a combination of red peppers, onions, zucchini and summer squash in garlic butter over spaghetti, \$9.99), a Boca burger (garden burger with lettuce and tomato, \$7.99) and a veggie

hummus wrap (red peppers, onions, zucchini and summer squash with hummus, \$8.99) are available.

Other wraps and sandwiches include the barbecue chicken sandwich (bacon, provolone cheese, lettuce and tomato, \$8.99) and a half sandwich, half soup option (various sandwich choices served with a side salad and soup of the day, \$9.49).

The restaurant still serves pizza as it once did, with thin crust available. Hawaiian (ham and pineapple, \$8.99) and pesto chicken and broccoli (grilled chicken, pesto, broccoli and mozzarella, \$10.99) are two selections from the pizza menu that also offers a make-yourown pizza choice with various toppings to choose from (\$1.35, each).

Duffy's also serves a gluten-free version of the menu including gluten-free pasta, pizza dough and bread crumbs on the baked haddock.

The Duffy's website includes an online ordering service. The idea came from Cluff's son, a college graduate come home, who researched the software to make the ordering program work through the website. His son also operates the social networking side of the business, utilizing both Facebook and Twitter to extend the Duffy's community.

With the success of the restaurant, Cluff is often busy preparing for mealtime rushes. He does get out of town now and again.

"We travel a lot," Cluff said. "But we always enjoy coming back."

Romantic evenings in a lighthouse

Newburyport's Rear Range Light offers dining with a view

A dining experience to remember can be had five stories above the shores of Newburyport, Mass.

"It's been called the most private and exclusive dining space in New England, and perhaps the most romantic — at least we'd like to think so ... it has one of the best views in Newburyport, if not the whole North Shore," said Jay Hyland, president of the Lighthouse Preservation Society (LPS), which was instrumental in bringing dining to the unused Newburyport Rear Range Light 12 years ago.

The LPS had been looking for adaptive reuses of two Newburyport lighthouses when it began working with David Hall, the owner of the Rear Range lighthouse, who used to run his realty office atop the brick structure. Hall told Hyland how much he enjoyed eating his lunch up there and how he would allow friends to use it to watch the sunset with

their significant others. Hall said he would even go as far as leaving a basket filled with wine and cheese at the doorway of his lighthouse for friends to enjoy during their visits. "I said, 'I think that's a really wonderful idea; if you let us run with that, we will fix up this building for you and find an adaptable use for this structure," "Hyland said.

The Lighthouse is now a hot spot for celebrating such milestones as proposals, anniversaries and birthdays. The dining experience was ranked by Yankee Magazine as one of the top 35 things to do in New England.

"It's such a great panorama," Nyland said of the view from atop the lighthouse. "You can see both the Massachusetts and New Hampshire coastlines from up there ... you feel like you are on top of the world, really."

Guests have exclusive access to the lighthouse for six hours and their own waitstaff. They may choose to order from the Mission Oak Grill, which boasts such entrees as a dryrubbed pork tenderloin with jalapeño-pecan corn bread, apple slaw and chipotle-peach barbecue glaze, and a Brazilian Mixed Grill of skirt steak, cilantro-lime jumbo shrimp, chorizo and fries; Joseph's Winter Street Café, which counts Braised Pork Osso Bucco, Lobster-Stuffed Haddock and Sauteed Calf's Liver among its entrees; and the Starboard Galley Restaurant, which offers lobster rolls and fried and broiled seafood dishes. All dinners are BYOB and a restaurant must be selected when the reservation is made at the lighthouse. A menu will be given to diners upon arrival and their courses will be brought up to them by the waitstaff.

A half hour should be allotted between courses to allow time for meals to be cooked, packaged and brought to the lighthouse.

"It makes for a European dining situation ... a very relaxed kind of drawn-out meal," Hyland said. While the restaurant can hold up to four diners, Hyland said it can get a little crowded with more than two.

"Generally who we have up there are cou-

ples," he said.

Reservations are booked out a year in advance, but Hyland said he still has some dates available for this summer, with six-hour slots open at 10 a.m. (for lunch) and 5 p.m. (for dinner). "It's kind of a hit and miss situation," Hyland said of his remaining availability. "It depends on how flexible you are."

Reservations can be made for 2012 starting on Nov. 1. Dining at the lighthouse is offered year-round as a heat pump was recently installed. Hyland noted that it was tricky to find a unit small enough to fit in the space.

"It's not an insulated room, it's primarily windows and metal, but the heat pump is powerful enough that it can overcome the coldest winter day and take care of cooling on hot days as well," he said.

Lighthouse dining cost \$350 per couple and includes rental of the tower for six hours, waitstaff and a membership in the Lighthouse Preservation Society, part of which is tax-

deductible. All meals are paid for separately and the restaurants paid directly; Nyland noted that most couples can eat for less than \$100.

Malbec

Cahors & families of the vine

Most consumers associate wines made from the Malbec grape with Argentina. The French connection, both in Bordeaux and the more southern region of Cahors, is perhaps less well known. Red Bordeaux wines can be made from any combination of five grapes: Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Petit Verdot and Malbec. Before phylloxera, an aphid that dines on the roots of grapevines, ravaged the vineyards in Europe in the late 1800s, Malbec was a component in many Bordeaux blends. When the fields were replanted after the phylloxera epidemic, Malbec's star was in decline and the vines were often replaced with the more popular Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot.

Cahors, located in southwest France, has always been dedicated to Malbec or, as it is known locally, Cot or Auxerrois. The rivers from the region flow toward the port of Bordeaux, making that the obvious trade route. In Bordeaux, the exporters and negotiants (those who buy wine and sell it under their name) bought low and sold high to the disadvantage of the wineries in Cahors. Although wines from the region had been prized since the 13th century for their deep saturated black color, the devastation from phylloxera created a major setback. When railways opened the southern regions of Languedoc to the more

plentiful wines replaced those from Cahors on merchants' shelves. In Families of the Vine: Seasons Among the

Winemakers of Southwest France by Michael Sanders readers have the opportunity to meet three families who are striving to revive the reputation of Cahors. Each family has taken a different approach but they share a passion for their wines and the unique history and terroir of Cahors. Sanders follows in the winemakers' footsteps as they meet the challenges of tending to their vineyards, nurturing their wines through fermentation and aging, and creating a market presence for traditional Malbec Those who are intrigued by the role oak plays in the finished wine will particularly enjoy the chapter devoted to visiting a local barrel cooper.

For the book club I decided to do two flights. In the first blind flight we compared a Cahors from one of the families profiled in the book, Clos La Coutale, with Malbecs from Argentina and California. In the second flight the Clos La Coutale was tasted with another Cahors and a French Malbec from Pays D'Oc All of the wines were purchased at the New Hampshire Wine & Liquor Outlet in Nashua on Coliseum Avenue.

2008 Clos La Coutale, Cahors (NH Code 40363) \$16.99. Philippe Bernede caters to the international wine consumer who wants a wine that is ready to drink — lighter, softer and less tannic than traditional Cahors. He travels widely as an ambassador for not only his wines but Cahors as well. The deeply saturated, almost black wine starts off with a subtle aroma of cocoa, cedar and earth. The fruit lingers in the background, enticing but never taking charge, and yet it was the wine we all kept going back to. Definitely more of a food wine, it paired beautifully with Gorgonzola cheese

2008 Xumek Sol Huarpe Malbec, Argentina (NH Code 13088) \$21.99. This deep purple wine from Argentina delivers the bright blackberry that has converted red wine drinkers all over America to Malbec It exhibits smooth tannins, good acidity and layers of hot chocolate and a touch of licorice on the finish. Where the Coutale was best with food, this wine stands on its own as a sipper after a hard day at work or to share with friends on Friday night. Also available at WineNot Boutique in

2009 Clayhouse Vineyard Malbec, Paso Robles, Calif. (NH Code 13154) \$15.99. Blended from 93 percent Malbec, 2 percent Petit Verdot, 2 percent Cabernet Sauvignon, 1 percent Mourvedre, 1 percent Syrah and 1 percent Grenache, this Malbec comes from the Central Coast of California. As one might expect, the American Malbec displayed the most fruit, softest tannins and the highest alcohol. Blackberry, black cherry and black

raspberry dominate the nose and palate of this rich garnet-hued wine. Of the wines we tasted, this was probably the most approachable.

2007 Brise de France Reserve Malbec, Pays D'Oc (NH Code 14976) \$13.99. At under \$15, this was the surprise of the night. The nose elicits wild black fruit, and it delivers layers of dark chocolate and cigar box. Although I have read reviews that say a wine can smell like graphite and pencil shavings, this is the first time I actually discerned those characteristics. A perfect choice to pair with your summer barbecue menu, especially burgers with all the trimmings.

And following up on my theme from last week's column, my leftover Malbec (Brise de France) was used to make a classic wine cocktail: Lord Charles. I followed a recipe on eHow from Christopher Godwin. According to Godwin, "a properly prepared Lord Charles cocktail will have a deep amber color, and it will have a look similar to a glass of black or orange pekoe iced tea." In addition to Malbec, the cocktail ingredients are dry sherry, fresh lemon juice, simple syrup and club soda served on the rocks in a highball glass. It was positively delightful and refreshing!

There's no better way to signify the start of summer than by biting into a juicy, red strawberry. This luscious fruit can add summery zest to anything from a tossed salad to a creamy cupcake. Dipping the fruit into whipped cream or sugar provides the optimal flavor for my taste buds.

Strawberries not only satisfy your sweet tooth, but they are also packed with healthy nutrients and vitamins, including vitamin C and potassium. When baked, they lose some of their nutritional value, so eating them raw is always the better choice.

At many local farms you can pick your own strawberries, but keep in mind that once they're picked strawberries will not ripen any further. So if you see any green, leave it and let the berry ripen to its full potential. Find fresh-picked, locally grown strawberries at the farmers market. Applecrest Farms will be providing strawberries at the Seacoast Growers Organization's Portsmouth, Durham, Hampton and Exeter farmers markets this season, so stop by and maybe even try out this recipe from Sharon Lindsay, an Applecrest Farm baker.

Strawberry Rhubarb Delights Filling

4 cups rhubarb (sliced)



- 4 cups strawberries (whole)
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 11/4 cups sugar
- 5 Tablespoons corn starch

Cook strawberries, rhubarb, lemon juice over medium heat until tender. Add sugar and corn starch, cook until boiling (stirring to remove lumps). Boil and stir 1 minute or until thickened. Set aside.

Cake

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt

In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each egg. Beat in vanilla. Combine flour, baking powder, and salt in a small bowl. Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture just until combined. Spread half of the batter into a greased 15"x10"x1" baking pan. Spread fruit filling on top. Drop remaining batter by teaspoons over the top. Bake at 350 for 40-45 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely on wire rack. Drizzle glaze over cool bars and cut.





Students from Maine school of rock take stage

Academy of Modern Music bands perform at Old Home Week

This week marks the return of a classic staple in New England towns, the Old Home Week. Kennebunk, Maine, will honor the tradition with events until July 9. Centered around the family, Old Home Week also celebrates the history of the town with a scavenger hunt at the Brick Store Museum Program Center, as well as a family traditions parade featuring antique cars, horse-drawn carriages and fire wagons.

For a few young teenage musicians, Old Home Week will offer a chance to showcase their talents.

The teenagers are students at the Portland-based Maine Academy of Modern Music. The nonprofit organization founded by Jeff Shaw, also the program's executive director, gives teens with musical talents and ambitions a place to hone their craft. Last August, MAMM partnered with Kennebunk's River Tree Arts to extend the program to students in the area. The groups' intention is to offer classes at local churches and schools throughout the state.

"Maine has such a strong and vibrant music scene." Shaw said.

Shaw taught at the Spurwink Music Program in Portland. He said, however, that there is a disconnect between teaching teens music and teaching teens music they like. Shaw said he saw the possibility of putting together a place where teens could learn about and experience rock music.

"We try to reach teens through the music they listen to on their iPods," Shaw said.

MAMM runs programs in different music

genres. Some classes are in hip-hop, rock and jazz. Teachers involved in the program often have dual positions, such as teaching guitar and voice or bass and percussion. They also work for the River Tree Arts in its collaboration with MAMM.

Times have changed, of course, since rock music first made its cultural impact. Today, technology allows bands to get their music and their image out of their parent's garage and into the world through social networking. Shaw is aware of the changes in the way we hear and discover about bands. MAMM offers courses on how young musicians can navigate the world of online marketing safely. Though the ways in which bands promote themselves have changed, the practical aspects of being in a band have not.

"We aren't trying to reinvent the wheel," Shaw said.

MAMM teaches teens how to use recording software such as Garage Band, a home recording program that runs on PCs or Macs. Teens are also taught how to use sound equipment for live shows, such as how to mike amplifiers properly or utilize a PA system soundboard. But, Shaw admits, sometimes when it comes to technology the teens are ahead of the adults.

Most important to any band, especially bands just starting out, is the need to play

"[We're] trying not to just let teens sit in their garage," Shaw said. "Playing gigs is a major part of being a musician."

In order to give the young bands on-stage experience, Shaw organizes concert showcases. Most of the series are currently held in the Portland area. Venues include The State Theatre, Empire Dine and Dance and the Space Gallery. River Tree Arts hosts the events MAMM puts on in York County, from where both Shaw and River Tree Arts hopes to see MAMM expand.

"Jeff is capable, with good vision and a good business mind," said Clare Collins, secretary treasurer of the board for River Tree

River Tree Arts, an organization that works extensively with the community, will also hold events Saturday with an interactive table for kids and a table in front of the bands. "It's a great chance to see what is going on for kids and adults," Collins said.

Shaw said people ask him, "Where were you when I was a kid?"

"The reason this has worked so well is the parents of this generation get it," Shaw said. "They were in garage bands themselves."

The MAMM student rock ensembles, Oxymoron and Twisted Truth, are set to take stage on Saturday at 9:30 a.m. with music throughout the day from MAMM bands and teachers, including The Mousam River Ramblers, T-Minus One, Lauren Hastings & Tim Garrett and the Chas Lester Trio. All events will take place at the Plaza.

The Old Home Week celebration will also feature a performance of Shakespeare's *A Comedy of Errors* as part of Shakespeare in the Park. The play will be performed Thursday, July 7, and Friday, July 8, at 7 p.m. and Saturday, July 9, at 3 p.m. A 5K race for the Kennebunk Free Library will be held on July 8 at 6 p.m.

Saturday will have events including a farmers market at 8 a.m., a petting zoo from

Surf by day, rock by night

Donavon Frankenreiter has the best job in the world

Summer in Salisbury Beach is always lively, but the weekend of Saturday, July 9, and Sunday, July 10, will positively teem with activity as the Surf Music & Art Fest arrives in the seacoast resort. Painter and photographer Jay Anders leads a group of surf artists displaying their work around the beach. There are board competitions, including the third in a six-race Atlantic Paddle Battle series on Saturday.

And of course, there's music.

Area bands, including Nerve 8, Dead Air Project, Before the Crash, Todo Bien and Plum Island Pans Steel Drum Band, play free shows all weekend long. On Saturday night, the polyglot Aldous Collins Band's performance will be followed by a fireworks display. National headliners appear at the beachfront Blue Ocean Music Hall, including veritable one-man band Howie Day on Saturday night and Donavon Frankenreiter performing Sunday.

Frankenreiter has perhaps the best job in the world. A professional surfer since his

teens, at most gigs he's out on the waves during the day, playing and singing when it gets dark.

Fellow surf rocker Jack Johnson discovered the 38-year-old after the two met in Hawaii. Frankenreiter had played in a couple of bands up to that point, but until he released his self-titled debut on Johnson's Brushfire Records label in 2004, few had heard his honey-and-gold-dust voice. "When that happened the music thing kind of took off into the stratosphere," Frankenreiter said recently from his home in Kauai. "I've always played guitar, but until then I never sang in front of live audience — that's all new."

Things moved quickly after that. In 2005, he received an invitation to film a concert in London, later released as a DVD, *The Abbey Road Sessions*. Frankenreiter still sounds awestruck recalling the experience. "Stuff like that typically happens to people after like five albums ... so I literally have one record out," he says. "Someone said, 'You're going to be at Abbey Road in front of cameras and you need to put on your best performance,' and I was like, 'What?' — it was pressure and weird, but we had fun."

The best part was touring the studio used for so many Beatles albums and taking in all the history. "I sort of froze that moment in time," he says. "After it was over we were like, 'What did we just do?' It was surreal. There is a serious vibe in that room."

Frankenreiter has made four albums; the most recent came out late last year. *Glow* has several moments of melancholy — for all the joy such a career often provides, it comes at a high cost to the married father of two young children. "I love what I do so much between the surfing and the music, but there is a very sad side to it — I'm never home," he says. "My wife never signed up to be a single mom, and the time that I lose — you never get that back. Sometimes I struggle with that."

He mines these emotions on songs like "Three," "Home" and "Keeping Me Away From You," but the album has many buoyant moments too, with the Matt Nathanson-penned title track and "The Ones in Your Dreams" particular standouts. The latter describes a house Frankenreiter lived in throughout childhood; he insists it was haunted. "I'd go on a trip and come home, walk through the house and it would seem like

somebody was walking right above me, following me on the rafters," he remembers. "The whole house would crack all the way through. It was just of one of those homes where some spiritual stuff happened there."

When Frankenreiter sings, "don't look away from the things that you can't see, the darkest light is the place you really want to be," he's thinking of his grandmother. "She said, 'Those are guardian angels, don't worry, they're your friends, it's beautiful ... you want to see it.' So from a young age I learned to embrace that stuff," he says. "Whatever you believe, I think when you see stuff like that it's a positive or beautiful thing. I've

always thought that."

Salisbury Beach has a different vibe from West Coast and Hawaii surf spots, but Frankenreiter says it's all good and he's looking forward to it.

'We played there last year around the same time," he says. "I have a lot of friends in that zone so it's great to get down to the beach and surf, it's a fun great time. We always love coming to that area — great shows, friends, musicians — then we head to the beach and try to find wayes.'

Frankenreiter pauses, and then manages to sum up his charmed life in just a few words.

"It's fun playing music by the beach," he says. "Surfing by day and playing music by night — that works out perfect."

Ukulele master wants to spread the vibe

There are a handful of musicians in the world whose names are synonymous with their instrument — Jerry Douglas and the Dobro, Bela Fleck on the banjo, the late Miles Davis's trumpet, and Jake Shimabukuro, coaxing seemingly impossible sounds from his ukulele. Videos of him re-imagining the work of classic rock artists like Queen and The Beatles, or using the diminutive axe to mimic piano, violin and other sounds, have made him a YouTube star.

The recognition helped launch a recording and performing tour that's taken him all over the world.

He's played with duets with cellist Yo-Yo Ma, Jimmy Buffett and the aforementioned Fleck, and his talents roused a roomful of geniuses to a standing ovation at last year's TED Conference. A tour of Australia single-handedly spiked "demand exceeding supply by a four to one margin," according to a music store owner quoted in the Aussie paper The

"Wow, that is amazing," said Shimabukuro upon hearing the last fact. The 33-year-old native Hawaiian enjoys minting new players almost as much as he loves playing the four-string instrument himself. "I heard that in Thailand, the ukulele is blowing up, and it doesn't matter if you can play it or not ... it's become almost like a fashion statement. Throw it over your shoulder or in a bag - I think that's totally cool!"

But playing it is the point, after all, and on that subject Shimabukuro is the ukulele's most vocal ambassador.

"There's this very childlike vibe to the music that makes people smile and think to themselves. I can do that! That is what I love about the instrument," he says. "Another cool thing is that it doesn't matter how well prepared you are, you can play with anyone. If you're a violinist or pianist, you have to be at a certain level to play with other people and make it fun.'

Shimabukuro learned ukulele from his mother early on, mostly playing the traditional music of his home state. As he hit his teens, he began to experiment, plugging into distortion pedals and feeding the sound through a Marshall amplifier, teaching himself Jimi Hendrix songs.

Many of his friends in rock bands encouraged him to switch to guitar. "I

would try to learn some chords but it was just different [and] didn't give me that same satisfaction," he says. "It really had nothing to do with the technical stuff and what I was doing, I get the same enjoyment out of playing something complex that I do when playing something simple."

Finding a way to insert his uncommon instrument into collaborations can be a challenge.

"If you're in a blues band or a bluegrass or jazz trio, there really is no part carved out for you yet ... it's so new," he says. "But at the same time you are very free to experiment."

That's not a problem for fiddle or mandolin players with well-defined roles, even in a loose jam structure. "For ukulele, you jump in there and then you just have to use your ear and your judgment and be Jake Shimabukuro. Couresty photo. as tasteful as possible and

do something to make the other musicians look at you and say, I'm standing next to a ukulele player, and it's OK,' Shimabukuro says with a laugh. "You have to be careful because you want to be respectful to the music ... you don't want to come in as an outsider and change the vibe, you want to blend in."

He's pleased that some big-name performers are giving the instrument greater exposure, like Pearl Jam front man Eddie Vedder, who recently released his the solo album Ukulele Songs. "I've heard from countless people that he loves ukulele," Shimabukuro says. "I remember thinking to myself, it would be so cool if someone like him would come out with the ukulele because it would really show people that the instrument is cool, and appeal to a totally new audience."

He points out that Train's 2009 hit "Hey Soul Sister" was another song that raised the instrument's profile. "It starts off with ukulele, and they start adding things in, but you have this whole ukulele rhythm driving the song," Shimabukuro says. "It's very interesting, because no one has ever used it in that way before in really mainstream rock and pop.

When asked why the instrument is so alluring, Shimabukuro answers disarm-



ingly: "When it comes to the ukulele, there is such low expectation to begin with," he says. "People don't expect to hear or see all of these techniques and all of this color coming out of this tiny simple instrument. I enjoy that element Blue Ocean of surprise."

Shimabukuro believes this will change.

The instrument has so much potential," he says. "In the future, there are going to be all of these players that specialize in different genres of music. So when you hear someone ask about a ukulele player, it's going to be, 'Oh, that jazz, that blues, that country or rock ukulele player. All of these things people will start attaching to the ukulele, and I'm very excited about that."

Larry Crowne

Larry Crowne (PG-13)

After getting laid off, **Larry Crowne heads to** community college to get some book learning and some career security in Larry Crowne, a pleasant but uneven movie.

Larry (Tom Hanks) is a jovial worker at big box store U-Mart. He's clearly dedicated and hard-working, having won employee of the month several times. However, despite his solid record at U-Mart and 20 years in the Navy, the company decides it has to let Larry go because he can't move up the corporate ladder. His résumé, showing a man of work ethic and

dependability though it does, does not include any time in college, a must to become a U-Mart executive, his firers inform him. So suddenly there's Larry, a man who, like Hanks, is probably in his 50s, unemployed and unable to find work.

On the advice of his neighbor Lamar (Cedric the Entertainer), a man who makes his living running a permanent garage sale in front of his house, Larry decides to check out the local community college. There, the dean (Holmes Osborne), a fellow former military man, advises him to take a writing class, a business class and the public speaking class. These will put him on the road to knowledge and a better career, the dean says.

Larry arrives for his first day of school

on a scooter (which he bought for its less than \$5 fill-up to replace his \$70+ per fill-up SUV) and instantly makes a new friend in Talia (Gugu Mbatha-Raw), who, along with her boyfriend Dell (Wilmer Valderrama), is in a "scooter gang" that hangs out and rides around together. Talia is also in his economics class. Even though that is taught by the imposing Dr. Matsutani (a delightful George Takei), Larry takes to it quickly. And even though it's outside his comfort zone, speech class also turns out to be a favorite for Larry. In fact, it's his presence on the first day (bringing the class number up to the required minimum of 10) that keeps the professor, Mercedes Tainot (Julia Roberts), from canceling it.

And Mercedes was hoping to cancel this early-morning speech class. A teacher of unpopular subjects, she is also the wife of a loaf-y husband (Bryan Cranston) who has written a few books but now spends his days posting on blogs and looking at porn. She relies on bitterness, sarcasm and drinking to get her through the day but is slowly taken in by the genuine interest in learning from Larry.

And, because this is that kind of movie, there is also some chemistry from these two older adults in a college full of mostly kids.

The romance is one of the weakest parts of this story. Not that Roberts and Hanks couldn't have chemistry they kind of do as the movie wears on. But the story is not really about that until it is and then their relationship feels shoehorned in. It's as though the guy-on-the-journey story was deemed not enough to hold the movie so other things had to be added.

And that's really how all of Larry Crowne feels. This movie has good parts. Larry is a solid character, a man who basically made good life choices but now finds himself at odds with the modern, post-Great Recession economy. We don't see characters like this often and there's something nice about how the movie shows him dealing with his change in circumstance and starting over. And, by itself, the Mercedes character is also interesting. She's a woman who has been disappointed by life, by her husband and probably by herself. She needs her work to have meaning and isn't sure it does. Viewed as Larry's struggle to find a place in a changed world and Mercedes' struggle to find purpose and happiness in her own life, their stories kind of work and even kind of make nice parallels to each other until the romance is inartfully stuffed in

The movie has some nice, if a bit whimsical, supporting characters as well. Talia and Dell are nice young-people counterpoints to Larry. They bring him out of himself, but also we get to see their youthful decisions through his experienced eyes. The movie has nice moments about friendship and meeting new people and forming new bonds. But they are just

moments - no themes or even overall moods really gel. You can see how the movie could have become more situation comedy, sort of like Community but without that TV show's meta quirkiness. Or how it could have become more a dramady that focused on class and economic issues. Larry Crowne seems to split the difference, giving us unformed and not completely successful bits of both. There's a frayed feeling to the movie - plotlines that seem significant, like the dean who seems to be pushing students at Mercedes' class or Larry's divorce, never go anywhere.

I tend to wonder how much of this is due to Nia Vardalos, who co-wrote the project with Hanks. Her My Big Fat Greek Wedding was perfectly constructed. She was able to hit tone, comedy and characters just right. But subsequent movies, like 2009's I Hate Valentine's Day, have felt shaky. The story and characters in Larry Crowne go in so many different directions that no one plot feels fully developed. In the end it just comes down to how much time we are willing to spend with the characters. It's their general likability helps the movie rise above its mediocrity and become a mostly watchable affair. C+


