Lobsters and more Seafood in southern Maine

When you think of Maine, you think of lobster. In fact, the Maine Office of Tourism claims that nearly 90 percent of all the nation's lobster is trapped from Maine. The deep, cold waters of the Gulf of Maine are just right for lobster.

But that's not all. If you pay attention to tidal charts, for example, you can watch clammers digging in the mudflats. Clams, mussels, scallops and a huge variety of fish ranging from Atlantic salmon to herring are naturally caught off the coast by fleets of commercial fishermen, trappers and clam diggers. According to the Department of Marine Resources, Maine is also one of the leading producers of farm-raised marine seafood in the country.

From roadside diners and upscale restaurants to large commercial seafood markets, locals and visitors alike will find a dizzying array of seafood to choose from.

The fresh seafood market

There are many lobster pounds and fish markets in southern Maine that offer the freshest possible seafood straight from the fisherman's docks. In fact, York Lobster & Seafood (855 Route 1, York, 800-288-8154, www.yorklobsterandseafood.com) is southern Maine's largest seafood market. Owner Tom Robinson and his staff of 12 sell a combination of popular choices such as lobster and clams, alongside some not-so-easy-to-find seafood items.

Open now for seven years, York Lobster & Seafood boasts that it carries more variety of fish on a daily basis than any other market.

"We will usually have at least 10 to 15 different types of fresh fish available every day for our customers," Robinson said. And most of the local choices such as their cod, haddock and swordfish (purchased as close to home as York Harbor, Portland and Portsmouth, N.H.) are carefully cut and prepared by hand in the market. "The fish we offer is as fresh as you can possibly get it," Robinson claims.

Hard shell versus soft shell lobsters

Lobsters molt their hard shells every year in order to grow larger. The younger the lobster, the more times per year it molts, until it molts only once or twice per year when it reaches the age of 5 or 6. When the new shells on its body emerges, it is soft and fragile for a short time before hardening. During this period that occurs for older lobsters in June and July, they are known as new shell or soft shell lobsters. Trappers also refer to them as shedder lobsters. When the shells harden, they are called hard shell lobsters.

Soft shell lobsters are tender, juicy and sweet, and make up about 90 percent of the catch during the summer months. They are cherished by Maine locals, and are oddly less expensive than hard shell lobsters, but they contain less meat. Additionally, since soft shell lobsters do not often survive a long journey due to their fragile natures, lobsters shipped significant distances will most likely be of the hard shell variety. One popular item York Lobster & Seafood offers is its day-boat scallops.

"Most sea scallops you buy at the grocery store are caught during a 10-day trip out to sea. These need to be preserved in a chemical soak made up of sodium tripolyphosphate during the long trip. But day-boat scallops are caught and brought back to shore within a day and are therefore much better-tasting and fresher than typical scallops," Robinson said.

York Lobster & Seafood will ship lobsters basically anywhere. Lobsters can be ordered over the phone or at their website. Additionally, they sell fish wholesale to many local restaurants.

Two years ago, York Lobster & Seafood opened up its own restaurant: "We seat approximately 100 people. Our most popular item is the lobster roll, but we also sell a lot of fried clams," Robinson said. "Tom's Fried Clams" (www.tomsfriedclams.com) are available at other restaurants as well.

From the ocean

They also offer items such as the Maryland soft shell crabs and the fresh squid from Rhode Island.

"We try to offer at least one unique seafood item on the menu. We even sometimes get New Zealand cockles. Real foodies come here to get seafood they cannot find elsewhere," Robinson said. Later on, guests can top off their meals with a scoop or two of Annabel's ice cream.

The seafood restaurant scene

Nestled along what is probably the most coveted view on the southern Maine coast is the renowned Barnacle Billy's (50 Oar Weed Road, Ogunquit, Maine, 207-646-5575). Located on quaint Perkins Cove where harbor and ocean views are sprinkled with some of the wealthiest yachts you will ever see, Barnacle Billy's is actually two separate enterprises: the original lobster pound known as Barnacle

Billy's serving primarily hard shell and soft shell (in July) lobster, and Barnacle Billy's Etc., which serves the other white meat — and chicken, too.

Now in its 50th year, Barnacle Billy's was started by William Tower Jr., a commercial fisherman turned box salesman who found that he needed to better provide for his wife and four children after the war. Tower saw an opportunity, purchased the parcel of coastland and built the first Barnacle Billy's. Now age 84, Tower has turned over the business to his son, William Tower III, who maintains the reputation and delectable seafood as the general manager of both restaurants.

"We still offer my mother's special recipe of lobster sauté to customers, as well as the freshest haddock, fried whole clams, salmon, mussels that we get fresh every day, and wonderful homemade desserts," Tower said.

Along with the seafood and coastline view, Barnacle Billy's can boast that it has had some of the most dignified guests of any seafood restaurant around. In fact, Tower says that there is only one special guest who can reserve a table ahead of time, and that is former President George H. W. Bush. "We have been honored to serve Mr. Bush about 14 or 15 times in the last year," Tower said. He has also seen the likes of Senator Joseph Lieberman, Nobel Prize-winning former Russian leader Mikhail Gorbachev, President Bill Clinton, New England Patriots Quarterback Tom Brady, singer-songwriter Art Garfunkel, and Boston Bruins legend Milt Schmidt.

Chowdah

Make your own New England clam chowder with this classic recipe provided online at www.virtualcities.com by Dockside Guest Quarters Bed and Breakfast in York.

New England Clam Chowder

Ingredients 1 quart shucked clams (add water if too dry) 1/3 pound salt pork 1 large onion, minced 2 ribs celery, minced 2 large potatoes, diced 1 bay leaf $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon thyme 1 quart of milk, scalded (may use half cream for thicker soup) 1/2 cup of butter ¹/₄ cup of flour salt and pepper Method Drain and chop clams, reserving liquid (may substitute 5-pound can chopped clams). Fry salt pork in a heavy pan until all fat is rendered; add onions and celery and brown lightly. Add butter; melt. Blend in flour and stir constantly for 5 minutes. Add clams, potatoes, clam liquid, bay leaf, and thyme. Cook until the potatoes are tender. If desired, add fish and/or shellfish to make seafood chowder. Summer brings new life to old Maine barn

The Arundel Barn Playhouse opens its 14th season

It's noon and the temperature is in the low 90s. Inside the Arundel Barn Playhouse the air conditioner is off, with repairs scheduled the next day. But that hasn't slowed anything down. The actors run through songs prior to taking the stage, and chairs are added to the rows of theater seats for an almost sold-out matinee of George and Ira Gershwin's Crazy for You.

Adrienne Wilson Grant, the owner, producer and artistic director, stands in the back row greeting the audience, both regulars and new faces, as she waits to introduce the show.

The theater is in its 14th summer season, which opened with Alfred Hitchcock's The 39 Steps and currently is running the production of Crazy for You to July 16. The remainder of the season will include The Wizard of Oz (July 19 to Aug. 6), A Taffeta Wedding (Aug. 9 to Aug. 20) and I Left My Heart: A Salute to the Music of Tony Bennett (Aug. 23 to Sept. 3).

The barn, though moved from its original location and renovated to operate as a professional theater, maintains much of its 100-year-old charm Thick wooden walls stretch into a cathedral-like ceiling of exposed beams. On each wall are antique signs and show cards from the area's rich history. Also hung are collages of past performances with photos of actors and productions.

"I think people enjoy seeing an old barn recycled for a new use," Grant said. "It's an added dimension to the play. You know, to step back

into the past."

Barn theaters were how most people enjoyed theater from the 1920s into the 1940s. The Arundel Barn Playhouse does have a modern sound system that is used for sound effects, though Grant does not use microphones in the theater. Not using microphones allows the actors to explore their various vocal ranges. It tests them to hit notes both high and low and play with the natural acoustics of the barn. Without microphones, actors are free from the worry that the equipment will cause feedback or not work at all.

"It's not necessary. If we're going to find an Ethel Merman, we're going to find her without mikes." Grant said.

Every theater has limitations. Grant says, and the Arundel Barn Playhouse is no different.

"Lots of theaters were built in renovated movie theaters and their restrictions are that there was no backstage area," Grant said. "The back was the screen, or projection."


When the barn was moved, the width of the stage was altered to preserve a tree on the property. The right wing of the stage is 20 feet while the left is eight. There isn't a lot of space for overhead rigging either, which, as Grant said, makes staging stunts such as flying Peter Pan difficult.

"You need to ask yourself, 'Do we have the resources to do this play and do it so that it's wonderful? Are we able to have the talent on and off stage to create the piece?" Grant said. "In a show like this [Crazy for You] there are 18 people, 10 are company members and eight are local people."

The Arundel Barn Playhouse brings together technical staff and performers from all over the country. Some of the actors at the playhouse are college students, either majoring or minoring in the performing arts, who use the summer to stay involved with theater.

It's a way to add to their résumé. Other actors are auditioned in New York before coming to the Maine. Area high school students interested in theater come and work as apprentices, learning through this early experience what goes into operating a theater and staging a play.

Grant came up in the world of performance working in all aspects of the theater. Her credits include dance and choreography, directing, composing, theater education and playwriting. "The Kennebunk Beach is a huge, flat beach and my mother loved to swim. She could swim at that beach at her age," Grant said.

She purchased a condo in 1992 and found the worn, beaten barn that she would turn into the professional theater.

Grant works with each aspect of the playhouse

or a performance, whether it's the set design, an actor's delivery or fixing an air conditioner. Her commitment to ensuring that each production, and each operation, runs smoothly is reflected in the full seats and the seasonal ticket subscribers that return each year. For Grant, this is what makes attending the theater special.

"If you remember back on your life — all the great things that you remember, the things that really mattered - it didn't happen sitting in front of the computer screen," Grant said. "They happen when you were sharing something with other people.'



Powwow at the beach

Native American Council event is open to all

The New Hampshire Intertribal Native American Council (NHINAC) will be holding its annual summer powwow on the shores of Wells Beach, Maine, on Saturday, July 16, and Sunday, July 17.

"We were approached by a friend of the Council to see if we wanted to set up a powwow for the 350th anniversary of the town of Wells. This was eight years ago, and the event has flourished and gotten bigger each year. The town has been more than gracious and helps us with our every need," said Peter Newell, Chief of NHINAC. According to Peter, the powwow has been renamed this year the Annual Barbara "Runningwater" Beckwith & Val Ranco Powwow to commemorate two beloved Native Americans.

"Both Barbara and Val are members of the Penobscot nation from Indian Island near Bangor. Runningwater lives in Buxton with her husband Cliff, but used to run a Native American store in Wells. Val Ranco used to run a Native American store on Route 1 in Wells. Up until her death three years ago, Val was the oldest surviving Penobscot in Maine. Her daughter now runs the store," Newell said.

The celebration

A powwow is the Native American event where people get together for dance and song, visiting and renewing old friendships and making new ones. Its origins are spiritual and religious, and the gathering is often coupled with prayer and sacrifice, ceremonially responded to by voices of nature. It is believed that powwows preceded marriages, important hunts or significant political gatherings of nations.

The Wells powwow is a two-day event with Native American entertainers and vendors coming from New York, Georgia, the Carolinas, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, Canada and elsewhere. There will be many family-friendly events and shopping opportunities for guests throughout the weekend.

We have many Native vendors boasting handmade crafts from the U.S., Canada and even South America. There will be drumming, dancing, flute music, an auction, and storytelling, and on Saturday evening there will be a concert featuring Grammy and 'Nammy' [Native American Music Awards] winner Joseph Firecrow - a Northern Cheyenne flute maker and artist," Newell said.

The powwow is open to the public with events for all ages. The powwow will open each day at 10 a.m. and is free for kids 8 and under. Suggested donation is \$5 per adult. Here is the line-up for the weekend.



History in the making

Exeter Independence Day is special

Folks in Exeter, N.H., will get another chance to celebrate our country's independence this coming weekend, as July 16 marks the day New Hampshire's copy of the Declaration of Independence was read in Exeter by 22-year-old John Taylor, who later served as governor for 14 vears.

The American Independence Museum and festival committee members will present the American Independence Festival, a fun and educational day complete with historical speeches, processions, battle reenactment, music, cannon blasts and fireworks, on Saturday, July 16.

Visitors will have the chance to view a 1776 Dunlap Broadside rendition of the Declaration of Independence, of which there are only 26 versions remaining. Also available will be a museum draft copy of the United States Constitution. The festival will take place rain or shine and will feature events along Water Street in Exeter, as well as admission-only events along Swasey Parkway and inside the museum.

special year." Tiebout said. She explained that on the night of July 4, 1776, Thomas Jefferson had handwritten the Declaration of Independence, and brought the document to John Dunlap, who created copies all night long. They were sent out by horseback courier and pasted up on walls because that was the fastest way to get the word out. At the time, Exeter was the state capital, and a copy was delivered there two weeks later. The document was discovered in 1985 in the Ladd Gilman House attic by Dick Brewster, who was there to install an alarm.

"Our copy was the 25th copy in the world to be found and the original is only on display once a year under armed guard in the Ladd Gilman House. People will be able to file past it," Tiebout said. "The rest of the year the copy is held in a bank vault, but I cannot tell you where that is "Tiebout said

A day of celebration

Saturday will kick off at 10:15 a.m. with a procession by an actor playing George Washington at Folsom Tavern on the museum campus, followed by remarks by an actor portraying John Adams. A reading of the Declaration of Independence will follow, as it is delivered on horseback. The afternoon will bring more historical figures along with tactical demonstrations and a 2 p.m. battle reenactment at Swasev Park. The battle can be seen from the non-river side of the street behind barriers that will be in place. No battles actually took place on New Hampshire soil; the re-enactment will demonstrate the maneuvers and events that took place during the war. Additional activities will take place until 5 p.m. The evening concludes the celebration with a musical performance by Soulmate at 6:45 p.m. and a fireworks display at 8:45 p.m.

Visitors can interact with some of the historic characters on Saturday, including George Washington as portrayed by George Moore of Newton, N.H. Moore will be available for conversation and photos throughout the day on the museum campus. He has depicted the historical leader since 1987 and said, "I have been from Maine to Florida and California as George Washington." Moore, a Baptist minister by trade, was once an actor who trained in Boston. He turned to portraying George Washington after much research and decided to do his own show.

There will also be an artisan village on the museum grounds presenting many art forms from hundreds of years ago. One craft maker displaying her wares will be Alice Ogden (www. aliceogden.com), a traditional basket maker from Franklin, N.H. For more than 30 years she has created baskets from native black ash trees using material she harvests herself. "When you are starting off with something as raw as a tree, this is the way baskets used to be made hundreds of years ago. As a traditional basket maker I still hold true to the original process," Ogden said. Baskets such as those she makes today were once used for carrying anything you might see in a plastic bag today. Other demonstrators on the

A restaurant grows up with the community

Alisson's offers Maine classics and new favorites

Located in the heart of Kennebunkport, Maine, Alisson's Restaurant is a staple in the community when it comes to dining and entertainment. Ashley Padget Mills knows this; she has worked for the restaurant since she was 14 working as a bus-girl.

The building is centrally located on Dock Square, where Mills' grandfather purchased the Chat & Chew restaurant and the adjacent Smith's Market. The central location of the restaurant meant a high rate of business traffic.

"We're lucky my grandfather had the vision to [keep the restaurant] at that location," Mills said.

But Kennebunkport changed from little fishing village to popular upscale tourist destination. When a town parking lot was put out back, the restaurant owners knew it had to change too. Renovations were done on both the restaurant building and the market shop. In the 1980s, Dock Square Market closed and the restaurant was renamed Alisson's. The restaurant expanded into the market, which was renovated into a pub and dining area downstairs plus an additional 50-seat dining room upstairs. Mills says the change to the area has been both a positive and a negative: though she does miss the small community Kennebunkport once was, the expansion has been good for business.

Alisson's signature dishes include Maine classics such as the 1¼-pound fresh Maine lobster (served with fries and coleslaw, market price) with the option to add steamed clams (market price). If it's a lobster roll you crave, Alisson's is award-winning (lobster meat lightly mixed with mayonnaise served in a grilled roll with fries or coleslaw, \$18.95). And if the regular size is too much, the petite Maine lobster roll and clam chowder (served with potato chips, \$14.25) is available. After 5 p.m. it's time for the menu's Maine event. Dinners include seafood fettuccini (Maine lobster, scallops and jumbo shrimp in a Parmesan basil cream sauce served over pasta, \$21.95), pan seared scallops (with lemon Parmesan risotto and vegetables, \$19.95), Maine lobster mac & cheese (lobster with sweet peas and prosciutto served in a fontina and Gruyere cheese sauce over cavatappi pasta, \$22.95) and baked haddock (topped with Ritz cracker crumbs with a side of wild rice and vegetables, \$18.95).

For those who prefer turf instead of surf, the Maine event also includes a 12-oz. New York sirloin strip (topped with beer battered onion rings, and the chef's potato and vegetables as a side, \$21.95; add sauteed onions or mushrooms for \$.75), margherita chicken (grilled chicken with mozzarella cheese, basil, tomatoes and pine nuts served in garlic shallot butter over angel hair pasta, \$16.95) and bourbon chicken (Italian and bourbon marinated chicken with skewered vegetables and wild rice, \$16.95).

Pub fare is also available, including spicy buffalo Maine shrimp (baby shrimp tossed in a buffalo sauce, \$10.95) and a New England special, the Red Sox sampler (mini cheeseburger, red hotdog, cheese nachos and beer-battered onion rings, \$9.95), along with traditional pub favorites such as spicy buffalo chicken wings, (\$10.95).

Alisson's also serves up 8-oz. burgers: the Pammy Melt (American cheese and sauteed onions on grilled rye bread, \$9.50), Dee Dee burger (bleu cheese dressing with sauteed mushrooms and onions, \$9.50) and a nod to small communities, the small town cheeseburgers (three two-ounce cheeseburgers served medium with American cheese, sauteed onions and pickles, \$8.95). A vegetarian burger is also available (served with lettuce, tomato and red onion, \$7.95).

This is just a sample of Alisson's menu, which

also includes cold and hot sandwiches, various salads with or without seafood, a create-yourown-pizza menu with gluten-free options and a kids' menu.

Alisson's includes live music from the band Murray's Law every other Thursday evening and also features karaoke and trivia nights. It hosts local bands in the summer and off-season. Mills, now Alisson's general manager, says she would like to expand on the business again, at least the entertainment portion. One way she has managed to do so is through online resources. The Alisson's website is easy to navigate and features a live webcam for potential customers to check in on how busy it is at any given time. Expanding into the online community is something that Mills believes is important.

"We're really big on social networking," she said. The Facebook page for Alisson's boasts thousands of followers and the restaurant has worked with the check-in application Foursquare and online restaurant review site Yelp. Though she can envision an expansion to the restaurant's physical space, Mills isn't moving forward with the option.

"We love what we are now," she said.

The people who eat at Alisson's love it, too. Tourists to Kennebunkport tend to return year after year. Mills said that there have been more people meeting at the restaurant who will return months or years later as a married couple. It's this type of relationship that Mills says is important to the restaurant, to be a family-owned business in a town that acts like a family.

Fun fair features family food

Children's museum hosts eat-local event

The Children's Museum of New Hampshire will host its first Eat Local Foods Fair to promote locally made and grown products and to plant the seed of healthy eating in children and their families.

The fair, which will be held on Wednesday, July 20, from 1 to 4 p.m., is the fourth in a sixevent food and nutrition program created by the museum and Hannaford Supermarkets. The fair is included with the \$8 museum admission price.

"When we started planning these events ... we decided [July] would be a perfect month to promote local growers and also because a lot of families are of out school and are trying to figure out how to eat healthy and stay fit," said Ellen Schultz, special project coordinator at the museum. "With the abundance of crops right now, it's just a good time to do this event."

Schultz called the event a win for the people who grow and the people who love to sample. "It's been no problem to set this up," she added. "It's going to be a one-stop event where people can be exposed to a lot of different foods from local growers and get a lot of information while they're there — a lot of information they can take home and share with their kids for the rest of the summer," said Children's Museum Marketing Director Heidi Duncanson.

Fair participants will include Brookdale Fruit Farm (seasonal produce) of Hollis, McClure's Honey & Maple Products (honey) of Littleton, Abigail's Bakery (organic bread) of Weare, White Mountain Kettle Corn (popcorn) of Henniker, Echo Farms (organic pudding) of Hinsdale, Chamberlain Springs (NH₂O water) of Alton, Putnam Farms (maple syrup) of Charlestown. Stonyfield will also be featured at the event, arriving at the museum with its "Milk and Cookies Tour" truck and offering Omega-3 milk and organic cookies made by Late July Organic Snacks in Barnstable, Mass.

All of the food stations will be set up among the museum's exhibits.

"We are definitely looking at this as an activity within an activity," Schultz said. In addition to local food purveyors, the fair will feature information tables manned by members of the Seacoast Growers Association (www. seacoastgrowers.org) and Seacoast Eat Local (www.seacoasteatlocal.org).

"They will have all of the information on things to do at different farmers market and different farms that people can go to and actually pick fruit for their families," Duncanson said. Hannaford will provide reusable canvas tote bags for people to fill with informational brochures and recipes to bring home. Nutritionrelated games for children will be run during the event. Schultz noted that holding the event in July could spark the idea in children to plant a

"It seems like the best way to get kids on board with good nutrition is to really start early; our museum sees kids as young as one year old," Duncanson said. "We just need to get kids into the idea of healthy food produced locally without pesticides. It's one of those things where if you get kids early on they will just grow up with it as part of their everyday life versus something they need to be taught about later on."

"I hope that ... just exposing them to a variety of fresh food produced locally will make that the way they want to eat and the way their families want to eat, too," Duncanson said.

Sampling with owner/winemaker Vic Roberts

When most people think of California wine country, Napa and Sonoma quickly spring to mind. Wines from Oregon and Washington might be more familiar than those made in Santa Barbara County, Temecula, Lodi and Paso Robles. Some may recall that in 2010 Wine Spectator selected a wine from a Paso Robles winery, Saxum, to crown its Top 100 List.

Paso Robles has been growing in leaps and bounds as a center for winemaking. Located in San Luis Obispo County about halfway between Los Angeles and San Francisco, the Paso Robles American Viticultural Area (AVA) was established in 1983. In a little over 20 years the number of wineries in the area rose from less than 20 to more than 170 with 26,000 acres of vineyards. The vast majority are wineries producing around 4,000 cases of wine per year, with only a handful distributing more than 60,000 cases a year.

Early wine festivals attracted mostly a local crowd, gradually growing in recognition across California. Next May will mark the 30th Annual Paso Robles Wine Festival. Harvest festivals and Its All About Zin have been added to the calendar to increase the visibility of Paso Robles

Armed with a degree in enology from UC Davis in 1983, California native Victor Hugo Roberts was lured to Paso Robles to work with a start-up winery. By 1984 he and his wife Leslie had purchased an abandoned cattle ranch in nearby Templeton Gap, gradually clearing the fields and planting vines. Today

his estate includes 78 acres planted with Chardonnay, Viognier, Zinfandel, Syrah, Petite Sirah, and the five Bordeaux varietals - Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Cabernet Franc, Malbec and Petit Verdot. He supplements his estate fruit with grapes purchased from neighboring vinevards.

The property has a windmill and a 100-yearold redwood barn that has been updated to accommodate the winery. All the wood in the pole barn is original. Vic Roberts, who made his first estate vintage in 1997, decided from the outset that his production would be limited to "what he could do in this building by myself." The small family-owned winery is open by appointment only, a policy not intended to discourage visitors but rather a practical necessity.

All the wines that I sampled with Vic Roberts are available (or will be in the next couple of weeks) at the Wine Society in Nashua, the Wine Steward in Hampstead, the Wine Studio in Manchester, La Cave a Vin in Exeter, and Lucia's Bodega in Windham. In addition to the places listed above, I have identified places that are carrying individual wines in the notes below. The prices will vary at each retailer.

2009 Victor Hugo Viognier (NH Code 14479) \$20.99. The winery is best known for its red wines. 2000 was the first year they bottled a white, selecting the Rhone varietal, Viognier, since it was best suited to their soil and climate. It's made from a single clone of the grape; the key to this wine is picking the fruit ripe but not overripe and keeping the oak (Hungarian) to a minimum. The result is a fresh white redolent with peach and apricot, laced with a touch of herbal grassiness on

the nose, and finishing with a satisfying citrus note. Fruity and vet dry, this Viognier is a pleasant aperitif that will also shine with summery fare — fresh salads, chilled fruit soups, or a light seafood salad. Cava Restaurant in Portsmouth will feature this on its wine list.

2008 Victor Hugo Zinfandel (NH Code 14482) \$22.99. Zinfandel thrives in Paso Robles, yet it is a labor-intensive grape. The berries tend to dry into raisins, making the harvest (Victor Hugo discards the raisins before crush) and hand sorting critical to maintaining quality. Roberts has found that American oak pairs best with this wine, aging for 16 months prior to bottling. This bold red bursts with blueberry, strawberry and black cherry with a soft touch of cocoa on the finish. This is the only wine at Victor Hugo that is over 14 percent alcohol, generally reaching the 14.5 percent to 15 percent range. Mombo Restaurant in Portsmouth carries this wine.

2007 Victor Hugo Hunchback (NH Code 14483) \$17.99. Blended from 34 percent Petit Verdot, 24 percent Petite Sirah, 22 percent Cabernet Franc. and 20 percent Syrah: the name plays off the association with the French novelist. The winemaker insists he is named after a great-uncle and his great-grandfather, not the novelist, but.... From a winemaking perspective, this blend changes every year. His flagship blend, Opulence, is made first and then depending on the overall yields of each varietal the remainder becomes Hunchback. Fresh Bing cherry with highlights of cigar box and chocolate, medium tannins, and lively acidity make this a winner and a great value. Available at Philbrick's in Portsmouth.

2007 Victor Hugo Cabernet Sauvignon

(NH Code 14485) \$22.99. Harvested in 2007, and aged 22 months in French and Hungarian oak, this rich red was bottled in September 2009. Already four years old, it is drinking well now and will also benefit from additional cellaring. The characteristic Cabernet cassis and cocoa are well integrated, smoothly flowing to the finely grained tannins. This elegant red might be too "feminine" for some Cabernet lovers, but that makes it a better match for foods - steaks, prime rib, or a Sunday roast tenderloin

2006 Victor Hugo Estate Opulence (NH Code 14480) \$29.99. This wine was my introduction to Victor Hugo many years ago and I was smitten. It's technically a Bordeauxstyle blend. Merlot (35 percent) and Malbec (29 percent) dominate with Petit Verdot (18 percent), Cabernet Franc (12 percent) and Cabernet Sauvignon (6 percent) playing the supporting role. Each varietal is fermented and aged separately for 15 months, blended and aged another 8 to 10 months in barrels prior to bottling. The result is a polished wine with finesse. Dark fruits dominate the palate. the subtle oak provides balance and structure, and the silky tannins punctuate the understated power of Opulence. Available at Unums in Nashua

Paso Robles is also home to the Paderewski Festival in honor of the Polish pianist, composer, and statesman Ignacy Paderewski. He owned a ranch in Paso Robles and was a pioneer in planting Zinfandel vines in the region.

Red, white and green A lot of wine, a little cash

Looking for something crisp and cool in these hot days? How about a sauvignon blanc? Formerly wines that tended to be uniformly grassy, sauvignon blancs have become more diverse in flavor and mouthfeel lately, but they still make for nice crisp wines, perfect for sipping on a hot day. Here are a few we've tried recently.

We've liked the Tohu Sauvignon Blancs over the years, which come from Marlborough, New Zealand. We had the F 2007 and it had a fresh smell ----a green woodiness and hints of kiwi. It was tart but had a fullness — a little toasty, a little AUVIGNON BLAN creamy - on the finish. The 2009 is a sunny wine that is pale gold in color and has fragranc-

es of pear and grapefruit on the nose. That bright grapefruit, along with a hint of lemon and tart green apple, followed through in the flavor.

Of course, New Zealand isn't the only place that sends in good sauvignon blancs. We tried the L'arpent des Vaudons Sauvignon Blanc from Loire Valley. This crisp, clean French white has a lovely light gold color. We tasted hints of grapefruit and crisp pear. As the wine warmed up, it lost the slight bitterness from the alcohol and showed some lovely, light flavors - perfect for sipping alone or for providing a balance of crispness for a rich meal.

One of our favorite sauvignon blancs comes from South America — the 2008 Casa Lapostolle Sauvignon Blanc from the Rapel Valley in Chile. That particular year was 92 percent sauvignon

blanc and 8 percent Semillon. It had crisp, green apple flavors with a light, almost citrus aroma, which can be stronger or weaker depending on how cold the wine is when you sip it and what else you're eating.

A good bargain wine was the Chateau Ste. Michelle Sauvignon Blanc. One of the winery's offerings from Columbia Valley, this wine had crispness and some of that green, slightly bitter flavor, but it also had very light grapefruit hints.

Higher in price but a special treat is the Neal Family Vinevards 2009 sauvignon blanc from Napa Valley. This sauvignon blanc is a real departure from the wines you generally

get from this grape. The wine has a white gold color and a light apple bouquet. It is a crisp and tart sauvignon blanc but without the grassiness you might see in a New Zealand version of the grape or in a pinot grigio. The Neal is light like a traditional sauvignon blanc but it has the rounded, full mouthfeel of a chardonnay. As the wine warms up, you can taste hints of mineraliness and even a light sweetness.

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

Sea songs find port on Maine coast

Roll & Go perform at the Pasco Center in Kennebunkport

This July, the Kennebunkport Historical Society brings history to life with art, culture and tradition from the port town's past.

"Most of our collection is from member donation," said Susan Edwards, executive director of the historical society. "The photograph collection is the strongest."

One way the historical society plans to bring attention to the town's maritime history is through music.

On Sunday, July 17, the Pasco Exhibition Center will be the stage for the Portland based sea-shanty group Roll & Go.

The group is helmed by Charlie Ipcar, who also performs solo throughout Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. In June, Roll & Go performed for a second time at the internationally recognized 32nd Annual Sea Music Festival in Mystic Seaport, Conn. The festival hosts groups from the United Kingdom, Italy, France, America and elsewhere.

Ipcar credits folk music with bringing him into the world of ballads, shanties (originally chanties) and fo'c'sle (a short term for forecastle, the location where crew is housed in the bow of the ship) songs. Ipcar first found folk music at college in 1960. He played in various groups before entering in the Peace Corps. Ipcar continued to play folk as he traveled abroad.

"Folk sustains people," Ipcar said.

Ipcar returned home to Maine after attending graduate school. In the early 1980s he helped reform the Portland Folk Club. With members from the club, Ipcar started to play the sea songs his father had played when Ipcar was a child growing up along the Maine coast. Ipcar and the club members named themselves Roll & Go. The name originates from a book of that title published in 1924. The book contains a collection of sea songs compiled by Joanna Colcord, a Maine native and sailorman's daughter, who remains a prominent figure in the preservation of sea songs in America.

An inability to financially maintain the Portland Folk Club

led to its closing but gave the members of Roll & Go the time to develop their own selection of maritime songs.

In 2002 the group released their first album of ballads and sea shanties, *Outward Bound*. The album was followed by *Rolling Down to Sailortown* (2006) and *Lookout!* (2010).

Roll & Go is legally incorporated as Roll & Go, Inc. This allows the group, specifically Ipcar, to own the rights to the music they create and release. It also enables members to cycle in and out, bringing in new ideas each time.

The group performs traditionally *a cappella*, though occasionally they will use instruments for certain songs. Sailors aboard vessels would sing as a means to ease the work of navigating ships out at sea. Work, such as hauling in the anchor, cleaning the decks of the ship and rowing, was performed in time to the rhythm of the song. The songs were also a way to steer through the loneliness and boredom of a life out at sea.

"A good shantyman always added extra verses," Ipcar said. Though performing solo has its perks — Ipcar has been

working on a set of nautical poems that weren't originally put to music — working within a group allows for more creativity. "You have a choice of material," Ipcar said. "With a group,

you get the harmonies and the chorus." He said that a singing group acts like a family in some ways, or a community.

According to a Kennebunkport Historical Society press release, "Kennebunkport's Age of Sail spanned the 19th century and defined the fabric and character of the community." The exhibit, "High Seas and a Safe Harbor: Kennebunkport's Age of Sail," also in the Pasco Exhibition Center, highlights that period and is open now through Oct. 14.

Ipcar said Roll & Go is researching songs for the concert that might have been sung during Kennebunkport's maritime history. The work of groups such as Roll & Go, like the work of the historical society, is preserving the past for future generations to experience.

Ipcar has seen a rise in younger generations' taking to maritime music. He credits revivals in folk music keeping the form from fading away. Ipcar said that mainstream acts such as the

indie-folk-rock band The Decemberists are doing interesting cross-over work.

"It's a niche of folk," Ipcar said.

There is also a faction of pop-culture helping maritime music find younger ears. Ipcar said that people who participate in Renaissance fairs often enjoy the music, as do people who especially over the last decade — are fans of pirates.

The Kennebunkport Historical Society hosts events and exhibits year-round. Edwards says the best way to experience the history made available through the historical society is to just walk in.

The many hats of Mark Erelli

Singer/songwriter plays the Americana Festival at Prescott Park

This year's Americana Festival in Prescott Park features Lori McKenna, writer of hits for Faith Hill and others, the folk trio Red Molly, and singer/songwriter Mark Erelli. The show begins and ends with Erelli, a multi-instrumentalist who will lead off his own acoustic material and then join McKenna and keyboard player Jamie Edwards (Aimee Mann) for a band set to close out the afternoon. The two are longtime collaborators.

"It's a real treat playing with such a highcaliber songwriter," Erelli said recently from his home in Northampton, Mass. "I've been doing it for six or seven years now in some capacity, so I feel real comfortable and invested in that gig even though it's not my game."

Between his own music and work with other artists, Erelli tends to stay busy. Currently, his occasional band Barn Star is in the studio working on an album; the group gets together just a few times a year, often in pretty raucous settings, so laying down tracks proved satisfying. "Usually, it's in a bar where we can't really hear ourselves," Erelli said. "Other people can, and seem to like it. So once we got in the studio and heard the music, we were pleased — this is not bad!" The group, led by Zack Hickman (who produced Erelli's gem *Delivered*), with Charlie Rose on banjo, and Jake and Taylor Armerding on fiddle, guitar and mandolin, plays what Erelli terms "not quite traditional bluegrass by a long shot."

Their studio work has him wondering how five busy schedules might be juggled: "Now it no longer feels like a side project, and we're trying to figure out how to get it out there."

Last year, Erelli released *Little Vigils*, a record that journeys back to his high school "Basement Days" and an early performance when a young group's rented smoke machine shut down a battle of the bands. "True story," he says, laughing. "Sweating it out in the basement, making a lot of noise — I don't know if music has ever felt better."

Weaving in the titles of many classic rock songs his band covered, Erelli sings toward the end, "Who'd've thought I'd be the one still crazy after all these years?" riffing Paul Simon. "That was really fun song to write," he says. "I had the title for years; I was so afraid that someone was going to write it before me."

The lead track on *Little Vigils*, "Kingdom Come," first appeared on *The Darwin Project*, a compilation Erelli collaborated on to mark the bicentennial of Charles Darwin's birth. It begins with the startling image of a wasp laying a parasitic egg inside a caterpillar, a concept familiar to Erelli from his graduate work in evolutionary biology.

But the idea for "Kingdom Come" came from Darwin's correspondence with an admirer asking about the existence of God. "He was always very respectful and never critiqued or denounced religion because he has a religious wife, but he would use examples from the natural world. If a wasp can lay an egg in a caterpillar and eat it from the inside out, that appears to me evidence of a really cruel God. Is that the kind of thing you would want to believe in?"

Erelli wrote the track while waiting at a rest stop for his ride to the sessions. Writing with a specific goal in mind was new to Erelli, and the quick composition helped to calm his nerves. "If I can write a song in a rest stop about this stuff," he recalls thinking, "I cer-

tainly can ensconced in this English country farm house with good food and wine ... so I came into that project with a real shot in the arm."

His latest release is a benefit CD for Monson, Mass., recently hit by a devastating tornado. Erelli recorded his first album in the town's Memorial Hall. "The people just handed us the keys to the hall for a week and said, 'It's a great thing that you want to do here — go for it.' I can't think of too many towns who'd do that."

Remembering their generosity, he wanted to

give something back.

The five-song EP contains outtakes and found material from the original Memorial Hall sessions.

"I literally pulled this together during my younger son's nap," he says. "I don't have to print out CDs; I threw it up on my site and used the social networking stuff and set this random goal of a thousand dollars.'

Such nimble moves are commonplace for Erelli, who's long stayed ahead of the music business curve; he began giving away free tracks online in 2000 when only a few college students knew about Napster, let alone iTunes, and he was an early adopter of fanfunded records in 2008 with Delivered.







Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows - Part 2

Harry Potter and the **Deathly Hallows — Part 2** (PG-13)

The Boy Who Lived and He Who Must Not Be Named finally duke it out, wizard style, in Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows - Part 2, the end of the seven-book, eight-movie J.K. Rowling juggernaut.

To sum up the action of Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows - Part 1: Harry Potter (Daniel Radcliffe), Hermione Granger (Emma Watson) and Ron Weasley (Rupert Grint) set out to find some Horcruxes, magical whosiwhatsits that hold parts of Lord Voldemort (Ralph Fiennes) and help make him hard to kill, possibly even immortal. If they can find and crush all the whosiwhatsits, Voldemort can be killed and his fascist reign of terror will end. To accomplish this, our heroes did a lot of wandering around some very picturesquely gloomy landscapes and hanging out in a tent, picking fights with each other. Then, in the final moments, a tertiary character dies.

This movie starts almost exactly there, with characters mourning and then moving past that loss to seek out another Horcrux (Meanwhile, Voldemort has found himself another evil gadget.) What follows is a bank heist, a bit of a chase and then essentially one really long battle sequence broken up by exposition. In past movies, I've felt like we were just waiting for a fight, one that never really arrived.

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Severus Snape (Alan Rickman, who may be the actor having the most fun) is running things. Neville Longbottom (Matthew Lewis) seems to be the leader of the student resistance, with Ron's sister/Harrv's love interest

Ginny (Bonnie Wright) and the delightfully dippy Luna Lovegood (Evanna Lynch) close at hand. Professor McGonagall (Maggie Smith) leads the pack of familiar teacher faces. We get to spend some time with Dumbledore brother Aberforth (Ciaran Hinds). And when all the serious fighting starts, Order of the Phoenix types like Arthur (Mark Williams) and Molly (Julie Walters) Weasley, Remus Lupin (David Thewlis) and Nymphadora Tonks (Natalia Tena) show up. Bad guy-wise, Voldemort is center stage though we do get to spend some time with those dysfunctional Malfoys - Lucius (Jason Isaacs), Narcissa (Helen McCrory) and Draco (Tom Felton) - and Bellatrix Lestrange (Helen Bonham Carter) makes some appearances, including a fun one where she's not herself. While Harry vs. the Horcruxes and Harry vs. Voldemort is the big action, we do get plenty of nice battle moments where other characters get a chance to be badasses and a few characters find love.

Part 2 is not a perfect movie but it is a solid finale to the series After so many movies that have felt like a slow creep to this final showdown, a lot of the storylines are wrapped up very fast. And the movie lacks a certain spark, a jolt of energy that could have made it more wonderous and exciting. Maybe it's because so much of what is happening with the characters is about information from before, things we're supposed to know going in and not shown here (who is in love with whom, why

fighting certain fights is important to certain people). Maybe it's the burden of so much material but the movie feels weighed down at times, plodding where it should be full of give-me-liberty-or-give-me-killing-curse vigor. So it's not perfect, but it is pretty good, all things considered.

Consider, for example, that exposition. There are at least three significant scenes where characters talk about secrets from the past or reveal important information. Two involve people talking to each other, one involves a flashback. From what I remember of Rowling's books, the world tends to screech to a halt for exposition - which is when I would start skimming. Here, all this explanation is handled fairly well. It serves as a balance to other action, not a sudden break from it.

The action itself may lack in energy but it is technically quite good. I saw this movie in 3-D and I was impressed with how unobtrusive the effects were. Are they necessary? Eh. But they don't take away from the movie and that's something. The battle scenes - full of zinging wizard blasts and smoky evil and giants and fireballs and other all-stops-pulled magical warfare - are well-crafted. Unlike in the most recent Transformers movie, for example, you actually can tell who is fighting whom and with what.

And for all that even the battle scenes are a little pokey, they are still mostly fun. I never felt myself looking to fast forward. Yes, the movie is long, but it pretty much all feels necessary. Even the goofy little coda (you'll remember the flash forward from the book) is entertaining if not particularly well done.

Overall, what Part 2 lacks in emotional resonance and depth of story - the stuff that would make it a better movie apart from its place in the Potterverse — it probably makes up for in giving the people, the longtime fans, a final chapter to a beloved story. **B**




