Take Spot to the beach

Parks, beaches and even shops that welcome pets

You're not the only one who can spend some time outdoors this summer.

Whether you are taking the family for a hike in woods or a day at the beach, there are plenty of places where pets are welcomed, including trails, parks, beaches, stores, public transportation and hotels.

Dog-friendly parks & beaches

Dog parks are cropping up all over, thanks to the efforts of the Animal Welfare Society (AWS) of Maine, including the park at 36 Sea Road in Kennebunk. Executive Director Steve Jacobsen of Kennebunk described how it all started.

"Five years ago we were approached by a local donor and dog lover who said he would provide the seed money if someone would start a dog park. We took the idea to the town manager and then the selectmen of Kennebunk. Their only concern was that the park not cost the tax-payers any money," Jacobsen said.

After organizing a survey that showed significant local interest, the AWS was able to find and purchase an agreeable piece of property, raise additional funds for fencing, and gather volunteers to clear it out and set it up. Although the Kennebunk Dog Park is a little less than one acre in size, it is the busiest park in town.

"It is used consistently year-round and is a true community-builder," Jacobsen said. There is a gazebo where owners can gather and socialize while their dogs run around unleashed and get some much-needed exercise.

The park is the site of several annual events, including spring and fall clean-ups, a family festival, and a fun dog show, as well as many informal gatherings.

"We also have a local doggie daycare that brings dogs to the park for their field trips," Jacobsen said.

Kennebunk Dog Park isn't the only park around for dogs. After its success, the AWS has also set up similar dog parks in Biddeford and Ogunquit. And many other southern Maine towns are interested in setting up their own. "According to the National Humane Society, 60 to 70 percent of homes have pets. But not everyone can afford a fence, and with the leash laws being what they are, dog parks are a great way for dogs to get out of the house and use up some of their pent-up energy. It helps them to be healthier, better behaved and happier," Jacobsen said.

There are also some pet-friendly beaches in Maine, including York and Kennebunk, Wells.

Although many beaches do not allow unleashed pets during the peak hours of summer, most permit pets to enjoy some sand in their paws at the beginning and end of the day. Call a town's parks and recreation department to get the latest updates of beach rules on dogs. Here are some of the rules for the rest of the summer on dogs at area beaches (phone numbers are for the parks and rec department):

- Biddeford: allows leashed dogs before 9 a.m. and after 8 p.m., according to Pet Friendly Travel.com. (207-283-0841)
- Kennebunk: Gooch's Beach, Middle Beach, Mother's Beach allow dogs on a leash before 9 a.m. and after 5 p.m. until the day after Labor Day, when leashed dogs can be on the beach throughout the day according to Pet Friendly Travel.com. (207-985-6890)
- Kennebunkport: allows on Colony Beach and Goose Rocks Beach before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. through Sept. 15, according to Pet Friendly Travel.com. Afterwards, leashed dogs can be on the beach throughout the day. (207-967-4304)
- Kittery: The Kittery town website says only dogs licensed to Kittery residents are allowed on Seapoint and Crescent beaches through Sept. 30 (and then only before 10 a.m. and after 5 p.m., though they can be off leash, through Sept. 11). October through May 14, all dogs can be on the beaches, on or off leash, with no time restrictions. (207-439-3800)
- Old Orchard Beach City Beach: allows dogs on the beach through Labor Day before 10 a.m. and after 5 p.m., according to Pet Friendly Travel.com. No time restrictions after Labor Day. (207-934-0860)
- Ogunquit: According to the town website, no dogs are allowed on Ogunquit beaches through Oct. 1. (207-646-5139)
- Wells: According to the town website, Wells allows dogs on the beach on a leash before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. through Sept. 15. After that (until April 1), leashed dogs are allowed on the beach with no time restrictions (though they do ask that people keep dogs away from Piping Plovers nests). (207-646-5826)

• York: According to the town website, dogs are allowed on the beaches before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. through Sept. 20 (between 6 p.m. and sunrise dogs must be leashed). After Sept. 20, dogs are allowed on the beach unleashed, though owners must have a leash with them (207-363-1040).

Take your pet shopping

Many shopping centers in Maine are petfriendly, including the Kittery Premium Shopping Outlets on Route 1 in Kittery.

Other pet-friendly stores include Scalawags of 24 Ocean Ave. in Kennebunkport. Owner Mary Beth Kvaka opened her 600-square-foot boutique in the spring of 2007, and she carries toys, treats and apparel for dogs and cats, many of which are made in New England and specifically Maine.

"Our shop is relatively small, but since we do not carry large bags of pet food, we can offer a deeper range of high-quality pet treats, toys, leashes/collars, and even beds silk-screened by local artists," Kvaka said. "The items we carry cannot be found in the typical big-box stores, like those made by Maine's Planet Dog and West Paw Design of Montana."

But the products offered at Scalawags are only part of the attraction of this specialty pet boutique.

"Scalawags is a truly pet-friendly store. We keep our aisles wide so owners can bring their pets in and not worry about knocking things over. We offer treat samples and plenty of water for our animal guests. Also, we are a resource to vacationing families, providing recommendations on the best local hotels, parks and restaurants where pets are welcome," Kvaka said. Also, Kvaka offers dog-walking and pet-sitting services, and she maintains an online store where her vacationing guests can continue to order their favorite products and stay connected to Kennebunkport even after they leave.

Canine art appreciation

Not far down the road from Scalawags is where local talent Chris Becker has his photography studio, Christopher Becker Photography & Gallery (127 Ocean Ave., Kennebunkport). His work ranges from his photographs of streets and sidewalks of New York City, his unique interpretation of light on landscapes and his local Maine landscapes of land and sea. Although artlovers will appreciate all of this fine work, their furry companions will most likely prefer his latest series of photographs, aptly titled "Canine Bliss"

In its second opening, the exhibit depicts dogs at their most happy, with their ears whipped by the wind, tongues hanging loose, and heads flying high out their owner's vehicles.

"The idea started with me sitting outside my gallery. One beautiful morning while I was sitting out front having my coffee, I began to see several dogs (heads sticking out windows) pass by. Witnessing that scene made me instantly smile and feel good. So, I borrowed a couple of friends' dogs and went for a quick ride/photo-shoot. It really wasn't until I had seen them up on my computer when I knew I had to do more. Wasn't sure where the project was going to go but it was happening," Becker said.

Beach etiquette for dog owners

- In an area permitting dogs to run free, never take your eyes off your dog.

This is the summer for Shakespeare

Kennebunk opens first professional company with Mainestage Shakespeare

This summer the plays of the famous Bard, William Shakespeare, find a new venue in Kennebunk, Maine.

The Mainestage Shakespeare Company is working to become the premiere outdoor theater experience for loyal Shakespeare fans and those who simply want to be entertained for the evening. The company also works with area youth through educational programs teaching interested younger audiences about the performing arts.

The outdoor theater opened successfully, says Chiara Klein, the company's artistic director, on June 16 with a performance of The Comedy of Errors in Kennebunk's Lafayette Park. Other performances this summer include Romeo and Juliet and A Midsummer Night's Dream running now through August each week, Thursday to Sunday at 7 p.m. Special matinée performances are held on Saturdays at 2 p.m. The Comedy of Errors continues to be put on through the summer. The company is a nonprofit offering the outdoor performances for free. Donations can be made through the Mainestage Shakespeare website.

Klein, a 2010 graduate of Dartmouth College, has been involved with theater since she was 14. As a teenager, Klein was a theater apprentice. It was during this time she discovered how a theater company is similar to

a family. She was surrounded by a nurturing group of people and discovered a comfortable lifestyle.

"It was one of the most transformative summers of my life," Klein said. "Those people said things to me that have stuck with me my whole life.'

It is this type of theater community, a welcoming place that gives back, that Klein is trying to establish in Kennebunk. In college Klein worked as both an actor and director. seeing performances from two different sides. She also established a Shakespeare company at Dartmouth. Klein has worked through Shakespeare in the Valley, a company performing in Waterville Valley and Plymouth, N.H., that aims to rid the world of the perceived affliction, "bad Shakespeare syndrome."

For Klein, being the only Shakespeare company for 50 miles in Maine gives the company the great responsibility of bringing something unfamiliar to an area and to a new audience.

The Mainestage Shakespeare company comprises 10 professional actors, two directors and one stage and company manager. The ensemble wishes to expand by bringing in performers from the community and beyond. Many members of the current company knew each other from previous theater experience, Klein says, which gives the ensemble strength.

The youth programs during this summer are Kids Summer: Actin' Out! and the Playgroundlings: Write On! The camps teach children the responsibilities of writing, performing and rehearsing a curtain opener. The students are also cast in supporting roles alongside the company's professional actors in main stage productions. The regular ensemble is made of youthful actors, some recent college graduates such as Klein.

"Kids like learning from people they perceive as cooler versions of themselves," she said. "They really connect to us. It's a positive."

The two educational programs are held every week for four weeks. The first two hours of classes each day divide students by age before bringing them back together as a whole. The camps cost \$150 for each session, with financial aid available

But for people like Klein, the camps are more about hanging out

as a type of community whose members learn from one another as opposed to learning in a classroom

"This park is one of the most rewarding parks to me," Klein said. "I feel like [the campers are] entertaining me. They're paying to hang out with me, and that's cool."

Klein would like to see the live plays make the area even more of a destination for summer visitors. She credits the small community and the close proximity to cities such as Portland and Boston for solid turnouts each night so early in the beginning stages of the company, using word of mouth and online media such as Facebook and to Twitter to get the word out

One of the reasons Kennebunk was chosen as a location was the existence of local ties within the company. Assistant artistic director Meg Kiley Smith and executive director Stephanie Strohm, whose parents owned homes in the area, thought of the community

instantly when Mainestage Shakespeare was first conceived.

Preliminary talks began last November, said Klein, which left just five months to find funding and housing. The openness of the area and the attitudes of the local people enabled Klein to complete the task.

"Talking to people around here, there is a 'let's get it done' energy," Klein said. "[There is a] very large community of full-time people here that love, love, love their area and town."

The town has welcomed the company by including the ensemble in the town's Old Home Week activities that took place in June, including performances and walking in the town parade.

Klein hopes that both local and visiting members of the summer community come out this season.

"We rely on people coming to make it a viable thing," Klein said. "Don't you want to be a part of something for the very first year?"

Saved from the wrecking ball

The many mysteries of Wallingford Farm

Charles Godfrey took his passion for restoring historic buildings to the next level when he purchased the Wallingford property in Kennebunk. The buildings on the farm, a hall and two barns, built in 1804 by architect Thomas Eaton for George and Abigail Wallingford, were three weeks from being demolished to make way for a gas station when Godfrey stepped in.

'These buildings are designed in a highstyle, federal period architecture. They are well balanced and have a certain delicacy to them. Everything just works and fits together," said Godfrey, who estimates that the interior of the hall is 95 percent original. In 2004, the buildings and farm were logged into the National Register of Historic Places by the U.S. Congress to commemorate their 200th birthday, although the hall itself is not open to public viewing — which only adds to the mystique of the place.

Saving a historical property and restoring it cost a huge amount of money, so Godfrey has many unique ventures associated with Wallingford to raise the funds necessary to make restorations, some promising and some just barely earning their keep.

The farm store

The most prominent of these businesses is the Wallingford Farm Store, which opened in 1996. Godfrey claims it isn't the profitable business he hoped for, but it is the largest fullservice farm store in Maine, offering the usual fare of plants, bulbs, seeds, soils and basically any gardening supplies one might need for a home garden. In addition, the store carries local specialty items such as pure Maine maple syrup, Raye's mustard from Eastport, Flo's relish from Gray, and Swan's honey from Albion, and also boasts an interesting array of statuary and pottery, unique seashells, holiday décor and a significant floral department.

Besides products, Wallingford Farm offers landscaping services, lawn mower repair and even tool sharpening. One of its complimentary services is a gardening seminar series, currently being planned out for the 2011 season by landscaper Sue McDonough. The popular classes usually run from 9 to 10:30 a.m. at the farm, rain or shine, and refreshments are served.

The secret sales

If you are savvy enough to friend the farm on Facebook, you may be privy to some of its 'secret" sales, usually running on Saturdays. Just recently, Wallingford offered large patio plants that were originally priced at \$29.99 at a huge discount of \$12.99. Some other sales were just as enticing, such as a \$50 gift certificate good toward landscaping services.

The upcoming events

Wallingford holds a few very popular annual

events, including the Fall Harvest and Children's Funfest, both planned for mid- to late-September, and a "Made in New England Christmas" with visits from Santa in December. But a bigger plan is in the works: Wallingford will soon be able to offer event hosting. The grounds, barn at Wallingford Hall, and soon-to-be completely restored Federal period gardens will be available in 2012 for wedding receptions and other large events of the kind.

Ghosts

There be ghosts here! Many of the Wallingford Farm employees and visitors claim to have seen or heard paranormal activity at Wallingford Hall, such as doors slamming, footsteps going up and down the old staircase and apparitions of soldiers walking along the rafters. The only way to know for sure is to attend the annual paranormal evening, this





Get to know the ocean at Seacoast Science Center

The New Hampshire seacoast hugs the shores of the Atlantic Ocean for 18 miles and is loved for its pristine water and sandy possibilities. Many visitors enjoy taking in the views, building sand castles, surfing, or soaking up the sun in the warm summer months. However, there are other places to discover that offer insight about the beaches and the creatures that live in the New Hampshire waters. One such place that offers programs and walks is The Seacoast Science Center (Ocean Blvd., www.seacoastsciencecenter. org, 603-436-8043), located on the grounds of Odiorne Park in Rye, N.H.

Visitors can enjoy delightful walks along meandering nature trails, participate in tidal pool adventures, and learn about coastal habitats. The park itself comprises 135 undisturbed acres where one will hear little more than the chirping of birds, the whoosh of ocean waves, and the clatter of laughter as sightseers make discoveries.

The Seacoast Science Center opened in 1992 with a mission "to create connections

to nature through personal experience," said Karen Provassa, the Center's marketing director "

We offer a real hands-on interactive nature experience, using the park as our classroom," Provassa said. As for people who are just visiting the center for the afternoon, there are programs every hour starting at 11 a.m. included in the admission price. The programs range from creature features to tank exploration and tidal pool explanations.

On Thursday, July 21, from 4 to 5:30 p.m. visitors can participate in a guided wildflower walk (part of the Family-Wise program), where they can learn about plants used for medicinal purposes by Native Americans and early settlers. The cost for the program is \$15 per family for members, \$20 for non-members.

Following the walk will be an outdoor concert starting at 6 p.m. It's part of the Music by the Sea series, which will conclude at the end of the month. This Thursday's music will be by Gnarlemagne. Concert tickets cost \$8 for adults (\$4 for members), \$2 for children ages 3-12 (\$1 for members). Kids under age 3 get in free. Gates open at 5 p.m. for the music event and there is no park admission fee for visitors arriving for this celebration.

The concert series concludes on Thursday, July 28, with the Jumbo Circus Peanuts performing at 6 p.m. The Music by the Sea program serves as one of the biggest fundraisers for the center as it helps to support environmental education. Tickets can be purchased online, at the center, or on arrival at the gate. The sessions are truly a family event: guests spread blankets and lawn chairs out on the grass for perfect viewing. People may bring their own picnics or enjoy vendors' food offerings. Face painting will be offered. And in case you don't get a chance to visit the center during its daily hours (admission is \$5 per adult, \$3 for ages 3-12, free for kids under 3 and members, and free for military families through Labor Day), the center will be open during the entire concert.

New to the center this year is the Close Encounters tank, which is home to horseshoe crabs and a certain small species of shark. Tank presentations are only conducted with a naturalist, so be sure to check the calendar for a schedule. The indoor touch tank is always open for people to get their hands on,



POP CULTURE: BOOKS

It's officially summer and time for the beach read or one of its many variants, depending on where you like to hang out. Here's one for reading in grandma's old house while you eat her cookies and milk



If the front of the book didn't say so, you'd never know that Horton Halfpott, or, The Fiendish Mystery of Smugwick Manor, or, The Loosening of M'Lady Luggertuck's Corset, by Tom Angleberger, is from the

same guy who wrote The Strange Case of Origami Yoda (which, by the way, will have a sequel coming out in August). Both are kids' novels. Horton Halfpott is a classic Victorian novel — no, wait, it's not. It's what happens when the guy who wrote The Strange Case of Origami Yoda writes a classic Victorian novel for kids. It suffers from more telling than showing; you don't really get a good sense of

place or scene-setting, so it can be a little hard to re-orient yourself when you resume reading after a break. But the fun with words and manners is pretty good. And the central conceit, that a loosening of the mean matriarch's corset leads to a general loosening of everything around the manor, is clever. I give you the opening line: "There are so many exciting things in this book — a Stolen Diamond, snooping stable boys, a famous detective, the disappearance of a Valuable Wig, love, pickle éclairs, unbridled Evil, and the Black Deeds of the Shipless Pirates — that it really does seem a shame to begin with ladies' underwear." My only real complaint is that Angleberger may have spread his ideas a little thin. I say give us a whole book of pickle éclairs, and another on the snooping stable boys, or bigger chapters anyway. But this is a diverting happy little read, with capers and crimes and romance and the polite yet hardscrabble underdog winning the day. — Lisa Parsons

A Maine bread company gets saucy

When Pigs Fly opens wood-fired pizzeria in Kittery

From college students to young children and adults looking for a night out, just about anyone loves a good pizza. The bread enthusiasts at When Pigs Fly, a local, all-natural, bread company based in York, Maine, are no different.

The company opened its own wood-fired pizzeria in Kittery this June. Andrew Siegel, co-owner of When Pigs Fly, said the idea came from his brother Ron Siegel, the company's founder.

It was Ron who first started the business in a small rented space in Wells in 1993, baking all the bread on his own. Andrew was bitten by the bread bug when, in 1994, on a visit home to Maine from California, he tasted his brother's bread. Siegel saw potential and returned home permanently. Soon the two were shopping samples to restaurants and grocery stores in the area.

Their idea was to create a taste that varied with the change of the seasons. The bread's popularity grew and they soon shed the small Wells location for an expanded structure in their home town of York. The company hired more employees as its production rate grew from 80 loaves a day to about 15,000 loaves.

A second building was built in York to accommodate the increase in volume. Storefronts were opened in Kittery, Freeport, Portsmouth, N.H., and Somerville, Mass. The bread is a popular choice in local and regional grocery stores and is available at farmers markets from Maine to Rhode Island.

After brainstorming ideas about pretzels, cookies and bagels, the brothers settled on an idea for pizza that would let them work with different fresh ingredients. Siegel said they wanted to bring something new to an area dominated by seafood.

The Siegel Brothers traveled the country, stopping in major cities such as New York, Chicago and San Francisco. They found inspiration about fresh pizza ingredients, different methods used by individual restaurants, and of course taste. When they returned home to Maine, the brothers turned their idea into a reality.

Now located down the road from the Kittery storefront's original location, the pizzeria is already showing signs of success.

The interior is made of cement and, in an effort to remain environment-friendly, reclaimed metals. The bar boasts 20 craft beers from small breweries in New Hampshire and Maine on tap and features one of the area's first wine taps.

Two large wood-fired brick ovens cook the pizzas at 800 degrees. The ingredients are, as Siegel said, "super-fresh and super-high-quality."

When Pigs Fly works with local and regional food producers. The mozzarella used for the pizza is handmade by Loudes Smith at Fiorre Di Nonno and brought in from Somerville, Mass., each day. The taste, Siegel said, is much different than

the taste of grocery store prepackaged mozzarella — "It's like night and day," Siegel said.

Mike's Hot Honey can be found as a selection on some of the pizzas on the menu. The unique blend of honey, vinegar and chili was inspired by creator Mike Kurtz's trip to South America. Kurtz makes his honey in Brooklyn and bottles can be purchased at the When Pigs Fly store.

Of course, pizza may not necessarily be what one thinks of when vacationing in Maine. It's the seafood people come for. But the pizzeria has options for those hoping to sink their teeth into Maine lobster. And the When Pigs Fly Pizzeria doesn't ignore the coastline.

For starters there is the Portuguese-style red chowder (clams, sweet tomatoes, chorizo, potatoes, smoke paprika and cilantro, \$8), the P.E.I. mussels (Benton's bacon, chick peas, kale and tomato broth, \$12) and the unique grilled octopus (potato chips, gremolata and roasted garlic, \$9). There is also a Greek salad (feta, cucumbers, tomato, olives, pepperoncini, herb vinaigrette, \$10) and a simple spinach salad (marjoram, smoked paprika vinaigrette, \$8)

Pizza- and seafood-lovers can unite over Little Neck Clam pizza (Benton's bacon, hot cherry pepper, fresh mozzarella, oregano, fresh garlic, complemented with fresh lemon, Pecorino Romano, sea salt and olive oil, \$18) and the shrimp pizza (basil pesto, sun-dried tomatoes, fresh mozzarella, Pecorino Romano, sea salt and olive oil, \$18).

The pizzas are inspired by Neapolitan style and range with various topping and choices. More traditional selections include the margherita pizza, the European equivalent to the standard cheese pizza (with fresh mozzarella, San Marzano tomatoes, fresh basil, oregano, sea salt, Pecorino Romano and olive oil, \$12) or the meatball (San Marzano tomatoes, ricotta dollops, fresh basil, fresh mozzarella, hot cherry pepper, oregano, Pecorino Romano, sea salt, and olive oil, \$16).

Trying something is always worth it. For pizzas with a different flavor there is the lamb (olive tapenade, cherry tomatoes, baby spinach, goat cheese, manchego cheese, roasted onions, fresh rosemary, sea salt, and olive oil, \$18) and the medjool date (soppressata, fresh mozzarella, Mike's Hot Honey, Pecorino Romano, sea salt and olive oil, \$18). Additional toppings range in price and include all-natural pepperoni (\$3) and the much hated and much loved anchovy (\$5).

The pizzeria also offers sandwiches served on the company's French bread, such as the classic Italian (soppressata, coppa piccante, aged provolone, onion, tomato, hot cherry pepper, balsamic, extra virgin olive oil, \$13), a meatball sandwich (fresh mozzarella, Pecorino Romano, two-tomato pesto, arugula and extra virgin olive oil, \$12) and a backyard tomato sandwich (fresh mozzarella, basil pesto, onion, balsamic, arugula and extra virgin olive oil, \$10).

When it comes down to it, Siegel wants the community, both local and visiting, to enjoy good, fresh food while enjoying the best of Maine.

"When Pigs Fly is a local company," Siegel said. "It's about making customers happy. If they want to try something cool and new they should come out."

Bubbly on the boat

Enjoy a harbor cruise with wine

Guests of Carla Snow's summer wine cruises are greeted with a glass of bubbles when they step on board.

Snow, owner of A Grape Affair in Portsmouth, has been hosting summer wine cruises in Portsmouth on the MV Heritage for five years and in Newburyport, Mass., on the Captain's Lady for three. Five wines, usually bubbles, a rosé, a white and a few reds, are sampled on each of the 90-minute-long sunset cruises. The selected wines are not region-specific but are ones Snow has tasted and thinks others would enjoy. Light hors d'oeuvres are

also served on the ship.

"You're on a boat on a beautiful evening — especially the Heritage, it's gorgeous — and the boat staff is so friendly, it's a great environment," Snow said. "People have a great time."

Rather than speak to the group about each wine, Snow opts to share information on the vino if guests solicit it while she walks among them, filling their glasses.

"If you just want to enjoy your friends' company and a glass of wine I won't bother you," she said.

At the end of the cruise, each guest will be given a list of the wines sampled and information on where they are available for purchase. Snow said her focus is finding the best wines

for the best price.

"I'm not trying to sell wine or push these wines on them; they're just wines I believe in ... at least they will have the notes of what wines they tasted so they don't have to keep track during the cruise," Snow said. Snow has not yet selected the wines for her upcoming cruises but noted some of her favorite summertime varietals are Grüner Vetliner (a citrusy, Austrian wine), Bernarda (an Argentinian red) and Zweigelt (an Austrian red).

"I try to do wines that people wouldn't necessarily buy for themselves to expose them to and educate them on different wines," Snow said. "We have a Zweigelt from Austria instead of a pinot noir, they're both light reds, but ... pinot noir everyone has tasted."

The MV Heritage, which holds 49 guests, departs from Portsmouth Harbor Cruises and only sails in nicer weather. The Captain's Lady sails from Plum Island, rain or shine, and holds up to 100 guests.

Wine cruises with Carla Snow will depart from Portsmouth Harbor Cruises at 7 p.m. on Thursday, July 28; Thursday, Aug. 25; Thursday, Sept. 22, and Friday, Oct. 2 (fall foliage cruise, 150 minutes). The Newburyport cruise takes guests close to the shore and through downtown Newburyport but does not offer the lighthouse views that are part of the Portsmouth cruise. Both the Whaleback and Fort Point lighthouses can be spotted from the deck of the Portsmouth cruise, Snow said.

"You see everything that you would see on the narrated historic harbor cruise; it just isn't narrated by the captain," Snow said, adding that guests are welcome to ask the captain questions about the area if they want to take even more from the trip. Music is played during the cruise in lieu of narration.

"The boat cruise itself is intoxicating," Snow said. "I could be pouring them Boone's Farm and they'd notice but they'd still have a good time."




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Wine across generations

How we approach wine

I was planning to write a factual article about the increase in wine consumption in the United States and how attitudes about wine vary by demographics. Instead, when my nearly 22-year-old niece and goddaughter visited last week I had a real-life experience that underscored both the similarities and the differences in our experience.

When I was a child and teenager in my parent's home, wine was rarely served. My mom and dad went through phases where they would share a pre-supper cocktail, but neither consumed alcohol in any form regularly. For my mom, her father (of German descent) had always made wine — dandelion, elderberry, and a few others — in large oak casks in the basement of their home. Mom loved her father's wine but found commercially produced wines less palatable.

My wine epiphany was when I was an au pair for a summer outside of Lyon, France. I was 19 and "discovered" Beaujolais. Not Beaujolais Nouveau, but the light, fruity Gamay that is slightly chilled, low in alcohol, and perfect with fresh summer fare. It was served with lunch and dinner every day. Madame made a fresh salad of ripe tomatoes, sweet onions, and Dijon mustard vinaigrette served with a fresh baguette to sop up all the sauce. On that trip to France, I also learned about Tavel Rosé and the crisp Chenin Blanc from Saumur in the Loire. It was many years before I resumed my wine education with serious intent

What I find both amazing and refreshing is the level of knowledge, appreciation and curiosity I have encountered in many young people, my niece and nephews among them. My brother and sister-in-law, like my parents before them, are what I call holiday drinkers. They'll share a glass of wine or a cocktail at a party or along with Christmas dinner, but will rarely have either when they are home alone.

So what is it that encourages the younger generation to seek out and try wines? Despite a limited budget, they are willing to ask questions when they go to a wine store. They taste and remember what they like and don't like. They think about wine as something to cook with and to accompany a meal, not merely to drink until they are drunk. They are less likely to worry about whether they know the grape, and more open to lesser-known varietals — wines that often are a better value. They embrace wine as part of their passage into adulthood.

I invited my niece, Jenn, to a Sade concert in Boston for her upcoming birthday. It turns out she had never heard of Sade but was delighted that John Legend was the opening act. We went into the city early, leaving time for a late lunch and a stroll around the shops in Cambridge.

We dined outside in the courtyard at Harvest Restaurant off Harvard Square in Cambridge. Mary Dumont, the executive chef, was the former chef/proprietor of The Dunaway Restaurant at Strawberry Banke in Portsmouth. She was named Best New Chef by Food & Wine magazine in 2006. Did you see her on *Iron Chef?* She is carrying on a tradition at the venerable restaurant of focusing on local producers and

innovative flavors.

I also knew they had a carefully selected wine list. After deciding on our dishes — fish tacos for Jenn and lobster roll for me — I asked her what type of wines she preferred. Jenn favors red wines — Shiraz and Grenache. OK, at 22 or even 42, I had never heard of Grenache! They were featuring some wines from a small boutique winery that piqued my interest, and as I read the description they mentioned the winemaker had worked with McPrice Myers.

On a California trip to Paso Robles I had met McPrice Myers, and I have sampled his wines at a charming bistro in Los Olivos in Santa Barbara County. His wines are rarely available on the East Coast. Under "Interesting Whites" I discovered his 2008 Terre Blanche, a blend of Viognier, Roussane and Grenache Blanc. I had a trifecta wine experience: a wine that would pair beautifully with our food, a blend that would introduce new grapes to my niece, and a wine from a winemaker I knew and respected. How often does that opportunity present itself?

It isn't fair to write about a wine that has such limited availability. Some of his wines are made in single-barrel batches. The heady floral aromas from the Viognier were perfectly balanced with the robust Roussane and the Grenache Blanc body and fruitiness. It was fun to share a memorable wine experience with my niece, one that perhaps she will recall as I remember the wines from my long ago summer in France. Suffice it to say that it provided a delightful prelude to the Sade concert.

INGREDIENTS

Zucchini

Zucchini is now in season, according to the farmers of the Portsmouth and Hampton farmers markets. This vegetable has more potassium than a banana and is free of fat, saturated fat and cholesterol. Zucchini is one of the most versatile vegetables because it can work in savory dishes as well as desserts and breads. One of the more popular ways to prepare zucchini is by grilling it, but you can also cook it in other ways. Zucchini has a high water content, so try to avoid boiling or steaming it because those methods dilute the flavor.

When choosing or picking your zucchini, bigger is not better. Zucchini loses a lot of its flavor when it gets to be too large. The best size to choose is 6 to 8 inches long. It should be firm and heavy and have a nice gloss to its skin. The skin is where the majority of the nutrients are found, so avoid recipes that require you to peel the zucchini.

"Generally the skin on a zucchini is shinier if it's young," said Annie McKenzie from McKenzie's Farms. "If the skin looks very dull it tends to be an older one." Zucchini is the most versatile of vegetables. You can make chocolate cake, bread or even grinders using zucchini. McKenzie calls this veggie the "wonder plant."

Zucchini and rice
Shared by a baker at Lucia's Kitchen

Six 1-cup ramekins/heatproof custard dishes or cups

oil spray

1 Tablespoon corn or canola oil

2 cups jasmine rice or long grain white

kernels from one ear of corn 1 medium size zucchini

1½ teaspoon kosher salt

1 large garlic clove, minced

3 cups unsalted chicken stock or water Cut the ends off the zucchini, then cut it in half lengthwise and with a teaspoon or a melon baller remove the seeds. Cut each half into long strips and the strips into small squares. Set aside with the corn kernels.

In a medium-size sauce pan place oil and rice, stir to coat rice and place on medium-low heat; continue to stir until rice starts to gain a golden tone, then add minced garlic and salt. Continue stirring for a minute and then add liquid. Stir gently and let water reduce until small holes appear on the surface. Add vegetables, stir, reduce heat, cover and cook five minutes longer. Remove pot from heat and let stand, covered, for five minutes. Meanwhile spray ramekins or cups. Uncover pot and very gently "fluff" rice. Divide rice amongst ramekins and press to pack tightly. Turn onto plates or refrigerate until ready to use.

To serve at a later time, place heatproof cups in a large pot, fill pot with water to come half way up the sides of the ramekins and cover pot, bring water to a gentle boil, reduce heat and steam for 5 to 10 minutes. Alternatively cups can be placed in a baking dish and baked at 350° F for 10-15 minutes.

DRINK

Red, white and green A lot of wine, a little cash

Given the heat of the last week, dry whites seemed like a good idea and both Rieslings and Gewurztraminers seemed like good candidates. These German and French Alsace-region wines are known for being



sweet but they actually can fall anywhere on the sweet-to-dry scale. We chose two from Alsace France, an area known for its dry whites

The first was the 2008 Trimbach Riesling (on sale for \$16.99). This wine was white gold in color and had a very light lemony nose. This riesling was very dry — tart with plenty of lemon flavors, perfect for a summer afternoon. We suspect that this wine would cellar well because of its high acidity. But even this young, it's a good afternoon wine.

The second wine was the 2007 Trimbach Gewurztraminer (also on sale for \$16.99). TRIMBACH

This Gewurztraminer was also dry, but less so than the riesling. The Gewurztraminer was white gold in color with hints of lychee nuts on the nose. The flavor is almost herbal with a slight green fruit note. The

bottle's label said this wine would stand up to spice, so we added some hot sauce to a cracker to pair with a wine. The result? Wow, the spice really brought out some of the more subtle sweetness in the wine. This wine ended up having a nice structure to it.

Each week in "Red, White & Green," two wine-lovers look at red and white wines, none over \$20 (and most under \$15), in an attempt to find some great bottles for good prices. All prices are according to the state liquor store (nh.liquor.state.nh.us) unless otherwise

Hot Summer Nights is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization working under South Berwick's SoBo Central, a group committed to maintaining local economic growth and culture. The concert series is in its 11th season, said Doug Keene, director of Hot Summer Nights. Keene says the series is family-oriented and opens a great sense of community.

"[The series is] working toward enriching the music community free of charge to people who otherwise wouldn't see it," Keene said.

Each concert starts at 6:30 p.m. with an open mike for local children and teens to perform solo or in groups. Keene said this is a good way to expose younger minds to music and give them a venue other than bars and clubs that only allow performers as young as 18.

The performers are mainly local, and Keene said the nonprofit tries to keep it that way. One regular is Slaid Cleeves. The nationally known musician now resides in Austin, Texas, but grew up in South Berwick. Cleeves opens the concert series each summer. Other performers this season are Chronic Jazz Syndrome, Dan Walker Band, Mudhook and Joyce Anderson.

Keene has lived in the seacoast of Maine and New Hampshire his whole life. Growing up in Portsmouth, N.H., he moved to York shortly after being married before settling in South Berwick. Keene came to the concert series originally as an attendee with an interest in audio recording, specifically live acts. He continued to return and was soon asked to join the concert series committee. Now Keene helps decide which bands are brought to the stage.

"Bands submit promotional materials through the website," Keene said. "We try to mix genres."

The concert series strives to get new acts every year, with Cleeves as the only yearly returning act.

Performing earlier this month was the New England Blue

Grass Band, helmed by Mississippi native Cecil Abels. Now retired, Abels credits his time as an Environmental Health Officer in the Navy for turning him on to bluegrass, but also says that singing traditional worship songs with family turned him on to to music early.

"I grew up in church music, like a lot of people in the South," Abels said. In the early 1980s, while in the Navy, Abels began listening to bluegrass musicians such as Flatman Scruggs and started his own trio performing at international stops such as Japan. The positive response further inspired his desire to perform.

"The Japanese absolutely ate it up," Abels said. "You keep playing off that."

The Navy brought Abels to the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. He became a regular performer with other bluegrass musicians at the Press Room in downtown Portsmouth. Abels eventually started playing with Gary Philgate and Lincoln Meyers and the seeds were sown for the New England Bluegrass Band.

The band's lineup has changed over the last decade. Abels now lives on a farm in Strafford, N.H., and teaches middle school science.

"We've been a band that plays mostly summer events," he said. Abels spends significant time in Mississippi caring for his mother. But the group has been fortunate with its rotating roster of band members, such as the Berklee College of Music's first banjo graduate, Chris Pandolfi.

Pandolfi brought a more progressive style of bluegrass to the group. Pandolfi now lives in Nashville and plays with The Infamous Stringdusters. Joe Walsh is another Berklee College of Music musician playing with the New England Bluegrass Band. Walsh has shared the stage with well-known performers such as Bela Fleck and Earl Scruggs. The current lineup also features bassist Amanda Kowolski, who has also toured with Bela Fleck as well as Abigail Washburn and Uncle Earl. And there is Dave Talmage on fiddle, who Abels credits as a real addition to the group.

"I feel like I'm the weakest link in the chain in the band," Abels said. "They're great people to work with. We don't have to fuss and fight about shows. I'm blessed to play with the band."

In 2005 the group released their album *Things in Life*. It sold well nationally and got positive write-ups in bluegrass magazines. It was a big accomplishment for a genre Abels sees as hard to sell.

However, both Abels and Keene see a change in the musical landscape of the Maine and New Hampshire seacoasts.

"Returning to roots and Americana is very much of interest to people in New England. Life has become so fast," Abels said. "Bluegrass is in your face. There is no pretentiousness. People long for the simplicity and honesty in bluegrass music."

Keene, who did not grow up in a musical household, credits independent recording labels and venues coming to the area with exposing people to different types of music. Keene, with Hot Summer Nights, is part of that change.

"We want [people] to come and to know this is an enclave of music, art and community," Keene said. "We just want them to experience what we experience every Thursday."

Never too old to rock 'n' roll

Anarchy Angels plays for the love of the music

Live music is a regular attraction at The Chop Shop in Seabrook. Opened two years ago, the "biker friendly and classic car pub" books mainly cover bands; however, that doesn't mean "Sweet Home Alabama" and "Old Time Rock & Roll" are all you'll hear.

With bands like Tigerlily and Drop Zone regularly stopping by, those staples are certainly on the menu. But Anarchy Angels like to draw from a more modern palate for their shows — Buckcherry, Saving Abel, Nickelback and others.

"We cover a lot of new tunes that come out, and everything from the '80s and '90s, but we do very little classic rock," says the band's drummer and manager Colin King. "We're a little unusual in that aspect."

The Manchester-based quintet is scheduled to play once a month at the Chop Shop. King says a friend from Cabin Fever Whiskey recommended them to the club's owner, Bill "The Boss" Niland

"You need outside influences on who's up and coming," Niland says. "I couldn't speak more highly of this band. Five guys, everyone is a lead singer, and they're always changing up the dynamics, no set is the same ... an absolute perfect fit for this bar."

Niland also praises King's marketing savvy and stagecraft: "They go into the crowd and interact — it takes the entertainment off the stage and brings it right to the table," adding that he bumped a couple of bands to get them into the club's regular rotation, "I don't have average bands play here. They're new but at the top of their game."

Noting the club's state-of-the-art sound and light system, along with amenities like smoke and lasers, King is equally effusive about the Chop Shop and Niland. "I like the energy, the décor is phenomenal; they've got a stripper pole and VIP sections," he says, and adds that Niland's outsized personality is also an asset. "He's built himself a little rock star persona with the way he engages people. Bill gets it; he really knows how to run a club."

The band, formed in 2010, also includes

bass player Dan Roux, guitarists Lonnie Emerson and Tom Gamlin and lead singer Maven. Each brought a lot of experience.

"Tom and Dan are in Divide by Five and have been in bands since the '70s," King says. "I've been in three bands the last 10 years."

Maven is the group's youngest member and recommends a lot of modern rock material. After playing solo acoustic for a while, Anarchy Angels is his first band. "His singing is phenomenal; he's got a fantastic voice," King says

When Maven began pushing for them to cover Creed and Breaking Benjamin, the decision to go in a modern rock direction made sense.

"We looked around to see what everyone else was doing, and they were playing the same old crap — classic rock," King says. "No one can really cover Nickelback. The songs are hard; it's a lot of work."

All have day jobs and play music for love, not money.

"For most of us, it's the pleasure of making people happy, it's a natural high. We can play

songs from Seether, Godsmack and Metallica and it's like being at a concert," King says. "To see the energy of the people and the feeling of the music pass from us to them ... they really NITE

get turned on by it and we get turned on seeing them react."

King says that rush always provides the satisfaction he craves. "For me, instead of drugs, it's music, and it's been that way all my life."

Winnie the Pooh

Winnie the Pooh (G)

Christopher Robin and all his animal friends in the Hundred Acre Wood return in Winnie the Pooh, a charming little throwback cartoon that is sweet as "hunny."

Christopher Robin (voice of Jack Boulter) is a human boy whose best friends and best adventures happen in the Hundred Acre Wood, his imaginary world where all his stuffed animals are alive and have capers with and occasionally without him. There's the excitable Tigger (Jim Cum-

mings), the bossy Rabbit (Tom Kenny), the wise if pompous Owl (Craig Ferguson), kind Kanga (Kristen Anderson-Lopez) and her son Roo (Wyatt Dean Hall), timid Piglet (Travis Oats), glum Eeyore (Bud Luckey) and that tubby little cubby all stuffed with fluff, Winnie the Pooh (also Cummings). In this adventure, Pooh is, as usual, on the search for honey (spelled "huny" and "hunny" on all of his pots) and Eevore finds he has lost his tail. Luckily for Pooh, the winner of a contest to find Eeyore a new tail will get a pot of honey. Balloons, a cuckoo clock and a spring are among the many contenders.

Later, Pooh, still as unlucky with the quest for a snack as he is with the quest for a tail, heads to Christopher Robin's tree house and knocks on his door. He finds with the help of the narrator (John Cleese) — a note but can't make out what it says and takes it

to Owl to read. Owl decides that the note indicates that Christopher Robin has been kidnapped by the Backson, a terrible monster that the gang must catch if they want to save Christopher Robin. Off the animals go to set a trap and draw the Backson out — even after Owl wonders if there's a reason the phrase "back soon" sounds so familiar — and further adventures are had.

The charm of Pooh isn't so much in the story but in the animation. It is done in the style of the old-fashioned watercolorstyle cartoons. Nothing is 3-D here. The characters and scenery are all lovely illustrations, picture-book style, and, as in previous Pooh adventures, the words are mixed in with the pictures. A character running too far out or sliding too far down the "page" ends up walking on letters, sometimes even tripping on them or using the letters to get himself out of a predicament. And just like in previous Pooh movies, the narrator sometimes helps the action along, particularly with the sometimes slow-on-the-uptake Pooh.

G-rated and coming in at just over an hour, Winnie the Pooh seems like the perfect film to introduce the youngest moviegoers to the big screen. And it won't test the patience of parents - I think I ended up laughing more in this movie than at Pixar's recent Cars 2. It is sweet and gentle, like a story time come to
