

## Maine is a great place to walk, hike and bike

Pack the water, pump up the bike tires, and get ready for an outdoor adventure in the southern coastal region of Maine this summer. With hundreds of miles of walking, hiking and biking possibilities from York to Kennebunk, visitors and locals alike can get in shape while they admire some of the most magnificent, sweeping views of the north Atlantic. There's something for everyone here — educational walks along rivers, marshes and estuaries; trail walks in wildlife refuges; challenging hikes up hills and mountain terrains with panoramic views of the ocean and the Presidentials; relaxing seacoast strolls along vast, golden beaches; and paved bike trails through miles of rural pathways and historic villages.

## York: Hiking and biking the Big A

One of the most popular Maine destinations for hikers and bikers is in York. Mount Agamenticus (186 York St., York, 207-361-1102) is the highest point in York County at 691 feet above sea level. The park is a 10,000-acre parcel that is one of the largest undeveloped pieces of forestland left in New England. Although it's many times smaller than Mount Washington in NH, the trails around and leading to the summit of the "Big A" are nothing to

"There's something for just about everyone here," noted Outreach Specialist Kristina Clements.

Clements describes the mixed terrain as a beginner to intermediate hiking experience. Open all year round, the pathways around and up the mountain are mostly for multipurpose use and see walkers, bikers, horseback riders, snowshoeing and even ATVs. Some of the trails are reserved strictly for hiking. There is no camping here, and it is a carry-in/carry-out park, but leashed pets are more

"The park is truly a hidden gem with lots to do," Clements said. "The summit view cannot be missed; on a clear day both the coastline and Mount Washington are visible."

These are the Agamenticus Park trails:

Horse Trail (hiking, biking, horseback riding) - Moderate at 0.2 mile, this is a forested and densely shaded trail. Blueberry Bluff (hiking) - Rated as difficult although fairly short at 0.3 mile, this trail is very steep and exposed, and has several rocky sections. It is well worth the effort for the beautiful views of the ocean.

Witch Hazel (hiking and biking) – A short, moderate 0.1-mile walk with some rocks and interesting trees and plants, including

## **Explore Maine on two wheels**

Southern Maine has several long and varied bike paths that are worth a try. Check out the extensive East Coast Greenway through New Hampshire and Maine at www.greenway.org. Also, the Trail Finder on the Bike Coalition of Maine's website recommends the Mountain Division Trail, a 10-foot-wide trail running 5.7 miles from South Windham to Otter Ponds in Standish, plus a more rugged adjoining section for mountain bikers; the nine-mile Bingham Solon Trail with water frontage on the Kennebec River; and the 85-mile-long Down East Sunrise Trail, among many others. of course Witch Hazel

Sweet Fern (hiking and biking) – 0.2 miles of difficult, steep hiking and/or biking, this trail is not recommended for use in rainy

Vulture's View (hiking) – This is a difficult 0.5-mile hiking trail with exposed bedrock and is slippery when wet. Views of Mount Washington, 90 miles away, are amazing on a clear day

Ring Trail (hiking and biking; horseback riding in some areas) - This moderately difficult 1.5-mile trail goes around the Big A and climbs approximately half way up to the summit. It is mostly a gradual path with minimal rocky areas on the west side, and the east portion is steeper and rockier. Goosefoot (hiking and biking) - Some moderate to difficult hiking and biking will be involved in the 0.5-mile terrain of this trail. It is described as "a long, secluded walk to the base of the mountain," taking about 20 minutes.

Wintergreen Trail (hiking) – For hiking only, this 0.4-mile trail is moderate. Lots of berries, wintergreen and hemlock dominate the slopes of this mountain hike.

## Wells: Searching for birds at the Rachel **Carson Wildlife Refuge**

On Route 9 in Wells, the Rachel Carson Wildlife Refuge offers a one-mile-long loop of flat gravel, complete with 11 outlooks that boast views of the surrounding marsh and coastline. At each station, visitors can pause and learn about the area's fascinating

## The essential hiker's backpack

Going on a hiking adventure? Make sure you pack these essential items before heading out:

Water – It is important to stay hydrated

Food - You never know if you will be delayed Raincoat – Just in case the forecast was wrong

Change of clothes – To keep dry if sweating, or warm if it gets

Knife - To mark an area or in case of emergencies

Compass – To verify direction

First aid kit – For cuts, scrapes and bruises

Flashlight & batteries - For exploring, or in case it takes longer than you think

Sunscreen & bug spray – For protection

Sunglasses & hat – For protection from the sun

Map of the trail and surrounding area - In case you get lost Cell phone – For emergencies, or to call a friend and brag

"The Carson Trail is open all year round, so snowshoeing has also become a popular activity in the winter," Rachel Carson intern Katie Serock said. Serock also said that there is a wildlife guidebook available at the Visitor's Center for all those who might be interested in the flora and fauna on the path. There are many opportunities for birdwatchers and photographers as well as those who want to spend a little time outside exercising.

For the more avid hiker, the Cutts Island Trail in Kittery, also a part of the Refuge, offers a more challenging 1.8 miles of uphill hiking with countless marsh views. However, hunting is permitted in season so hikers should be vigilant and wear bright clothing here, such as an orange hat or vest.

## **Ogunquit: Strolling along the Marginal Way**

The Marginal Way is the most well-known village walk in Maine, and New England's only paved public footpath. The ocean views along the way are gorgeous, and although the walk along this one-and-a-quarter-mile-long "trail" is gentle, strollers will most likely see the fury of Mother Nature in the waves that pummel the rocky shore.

The Marginal Way offers many incredible shoreline views and is an easy walk for all guests regardless of age and physical ability. There are benches, lookouts, ocean vistas, and unique geological attributes such as one that somewhat resembles a boar's head. Although this seacoast walk is not really for die-hard hikers, it continues to grace visitors with its surrounding beauty in season

## More trails for the nature-loving hiker

There are many other trails in the southern region of Maine that will provide hours of recreational activity for the walker/ hiker. Here are a few recommendations from the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC):

Wells Reserve at Laudholm Farm – 7 miles of easy to moderate trails that loop through salt marshes, forests and beaches. Try the Salt Marsh Loop, the Forest Interpretive or the Laudholm Beach trail

River Run Trail and Bridal Path – This 2-mile trail in South Berwick leads the hiker through a forest of white pine trees and hemlocks along the Salmon Falls River, and is well-shaded for folks who want to get out of the sun for a while.

Vaughn Island Trail – Described by AMC as an adventure in low tide, this 0.75-mile trail runs between Porpoise Cove and Turbats Creek in Kennebunkport, on a narrow tidal channel.

Mousam River Estuary Trail - Starting in Kennebunkport, this 1.5-mile hike brings visitors by saltwater marshes, beaches and forests and links up with the Bridal Path (see above). Parsons Way Trail – In Kennebunkport, this 2-mile route is a cliff walk from Cape Arundel to Spouting Rock and Blowing

Cave with magnificent views of the shoreline.

## Art in a Barn

## Ogunquit gallery is part of Maine Drawing Project

The Ogunquit Barn Gallery's Late Summer Exhibitions run from Wednesday, Aug. 10, through Saturday, Sept. 10. The gallery will feature collections associated with "Drawing the Line: OAA Expression Showcase," which is part of the "Maine Drawing Project: Where to Draw the Line."

Two artists whose work will be highlighted during the exhibit are photographer Stuart Nudelman and printmaker Deidre O'Flaherty.

O'Flaherty is a former art teacher who worked in the York public schools. Nancy R. Davison, president of the Ogunquit Arts Collaborative and the Barn Gallery, said that many people received great training from O'Flaherty throughout the years she taught. Though O'Flaherty is primarily a printmaker, she has worked in painting and drawing. O'Flaherty's work focuses on food, which Davison attributes to O'Flaherty's first trip to Italy. Davison says that O'Flaherty only observed people sitting down when it was time to eat and much of their focus was on food.

Nudelman's photography has appeared in several books with many different series, including the Portland Ballet and a series on detritus. Nudelman and his wife lived in New York before becoming involved in the Ogunquit arts community running the Ogunquit Photography School.

On Aug. 11 Nudelman and O'Flaherty will discuss their work displayed at the gallery and the art's relationship to the world. The Barn Gallery is open Monday through Wednesday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., Friday and Saturday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m. Gallery talks begin at 7:30 p.m. on Thursdays.

Davison said Nudelman is looking forward to the exhibit as it occurs during the same month as his 80 birthday. Also on display will be the work of New England sculptors, including Ogunquit Art Association members Libby and Jeff Briggs. The work will be outdoors in the Barn Gallery's Sculpture Court.

The Maine Drawing Project is a statewide collaboration of

25 venues with exhibits focused on the practice of drawing throughout the state over the next year. Along with the Barn Gallery, other galleries on the seacoast participating include the George Marshall Store Gallery in York, the Ogunquit Museum of American Art, the Ogunquit Art Association and the Portland Museum of Art. The collaboration is a year-long event.

"This is a very rich area for the arts," Davison said. She added that the Seacoast is full of artists, writers and musicians. "Some are new and some have long and distinguished careers."

Davison is one of those who have a long history with the area. Fascinated by architecture, Davison took on the subject while in Pittsburgh, her forehead pressed against the window of a 20-floor high-rise building. From that height she took in the interesting 19th-century architectural landscape. This, she said, is when she found her voice.

Originally from the West Coast, Davison came to the York area first in 1967 and saw the difference in the way buildings and towns were structured. She let the layout of the structures influence her work.

"The constructive landscapes of buildings imply people. Things are close together," she said. "You get momentum on the piece."

In 1972 Davison moved to York permanently. She bought a cottage in town and began working with linoleum cuts, or linocuts. The medium is a form of printmaking and is often compared to woodcuts. A linocut is an image carved into a flat sheet of linoleum, coated in ink with a roller, then pressed onto the surface of a canvas, paper or fabric.

Davison focused her attention on the interior of town as opposed to the beach, or ocean, where many of the area's artists focus. Davison jokes that she is probably one of the only people who sits with her back to the sea.

"A lot of it, for me, is the way light defines architecture and form," Davison said. "And the light here is fantastic."

Selections from Davison's work will be included in a future drawing exhibition.

Davison was accepted into the Ogunquit Art Association in 1982. Three years later, in 1985, she opened the Blue Stock-

ing Studio, which she ran until 2007. In 1988 she was named president of the OAA and put together the Ogunquit Art Collaborative in order to run the Barn Gallery. And yet, with so much history and so much done, Davison is still seeking new creative inspiration in different media.

Recently she began learning piano and is working on a concerta about Noah's Ark. But she said the two different media go hand in hand and she doesn't show signs of slowing down.

"If I was a musician, I'd be painting [now]. You don't quench the creative side; it just comes out in different ways," Davison said. "Artists never retire. They morph sometimes."

## **Early America live and up close**

Fort McClary offers an 18th-century encampment experience

At Fort McClary State Park & Historic Site at Kittery Point, the Friends of Fort McClary will be hosting an event that is sure to impress history buffs while piquing the interest of visitors of all ages. This weekend, Saturday, Aug. 13, and Sunday, Aug. 14, guests of the park will be able to experience what it was like at the fort in the Revolutionary War era during its annual "Revolutionary War Encampment."

In its fourth year, the event will offer a "step back in time" into 18thcentury camp life, with tactical demonstrations, colonial cooking over an open fire pit, musket drills, hourly cannon firing and children's games of the period. Visitors will be welcomed into the fort buildings still standing for a guided tour.

On Saturday starting at 6 p.m., Artillery Park along Pepperell Cove will host its first-ever concert by the maritime folk singing group The Dog Watch.

According to Friends of Fort McClary President Ken Higgins, this is one of many events the group hosts throughout the year in order to raise funds for the restoration and upkeep of the historical site.

We receive no financing through the state. The Friends host and pay for all the events, but donations are most gladly accepted," Higgins said. Although he never fought in a war himself, Higgins noted, "I grew up in Kittery Point and have great respect for the old fort."

The Friends of Fort McClarv have documented that since 1689, the site of Fort McClary has been occupied as an important military defense base in Maine. According to the nonprofit group's online historical account (www.fortmcclary.org), the land was acquired by merchant and landowner William Pepperrell and was once known as "Battery Pasture." It is coniectured that the first structures were most likely very simple earthworks and a small blockhouse known as Pepperrell's Garrison or Fort Pepperrell.

In 1715, the Colony of Massachusetts Bay voted to install a permanent array of six guns for the purpose of defending the river. The fort may not have been built until around 1720, and was known as Fort William. Since members of the Pepperrell family were British supporters, the fort was

confiscated during the Revolution in 1775. It was manned and eventually abandoned in 1779 by the New Hampshire militia.

In 1808, more structures were built and the fort was renamed Fort McClary after Major Andrew McClary, a New Hampshire native, who was the highest-ranking officer killed at the Battle of Bunker Hill in 1775. The blockhouse, which still stands today, was built in 1844 and was the last to be built in Maine.

All told, the fort once contained barracks, officers' quarters, a cookhouse with mess hall, a powder magazine, two rifleman's houses, a shot furnace, a guard shack and a hospital, and was fortified and ready for five wars — the American Revolution, the War of 1812, the Civil War the Spanish-American War and World War I - which never came to its shores. The fort was finally put out of commission in 1918.

The hexagonal-shaped house still stands to this day on the hill overlooking the beautiful banks of Portsmouth Harbor, and it is the impressive visual focal point of the fort. Ken Higgins noted that some of the protective granite stones put in place along the wall for the Civil War

period still linger.

"The blocks have never been touched since that period," Higgins said. One of the two rifleman's houses built on the site also remains.

Fort McClary is the site for many historical and artisan events hosted by the Friends. In May, the Friends hold a French and Indian War Encampment and Tactical Demonstration. An Artisans' Day is held in June, complete with Colonial crafting demonstrations. Mid-July brings a bluegrass open-mike concert, which is a fundraiser for the Friends and other local charities. There is also a WWI and

WWII display in the works, dates and times to be determined.

The Friends of Fort McClary nonprofit group welcomes guests both young and old to the park for its dramatic and educational Revolutionary War Encampment, taking place on Saturday, Aug. 13, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. (with the musical concert scheduled from 6 to 8 p.m.) and Sunday, Aug. 14, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. For more information, contact Ken Higgins at 207-703-2069 or visit the website at www.FortMcClary.org.

## **Boston-Portsmouth Air Show takes to the skies**

Hornets, acrobatics, parachutes and biplane will wow crowd of thousands

Last summer's air show at Pease brought the Blue Angels screaming across the skies of the Seacoast.

This year residents and visitors are in for another treat as the United States Air Force Thunderbirds perform maneuvers from the runway at Portsmouth International Airport at Pease. Home to one of the longest airstrips on the East Coast, the base will be transformed on Saturday, Aug. 13, and Sunday, Aug. 14, as the Las Vegas-based F-16 jets headline what is now being called the Service Credit Union Boston-Portsmouth Air Show.

Not to be outdone by the red, white, and blue jets, there will be many additional attractions that will have visitors peering skyward, including show opener the Army Golden Knights parachute team with an inspirational flag drop as they cascade from the U.S. Army parachute team plane. The packed weekend schedule will also include the United States Navy F-18 Hornets, AT-6 Texan Aeroshells, acrobatic performer Michael Goulian, National Aviation Hall of Famer Sean D. Tucker flying his custom-built 400-horsepower Challenger II bi-plane, Yak-

52's Northeast Raiders, extreme acrobatic pilot Jason Newburg, the Heavy Metal Jet Team, Corsair, WWII P-51 Mustang, U.S. Navy Legacy Fight, and the fueling plane NH-ANG KC-135 Strato Tanker demo.

Gates will open at 8 a.m. on both Saturday and Sunday, and demonstrations are scheduled to run non-stop from 11 a.m. through 4 p.m., with gates closing at 5 p.m.

Children age 5 and younger get in free. For tickets purchased on the day of the show, the cost will increase by \$5 per ticket. Tickets are also available for an exclusive photo tour before the crowds arrive from 7 to 9 a.m., at \$50 for one day or \$80 for both days. Included in the tour are media parking passes. Mike Kaufman, CEO of the Daniel Webster Council, Boy Scouts of New Hampshire, the organization which co-produces the air show with the Brain Injury Association of New Hampshire, expects crowds to rival the 75,000 patrons from 2010. "Last year, it had been 20 years since this area had seen the Blues, so we are realistic that we may not get those numbers again. Early signs from online ticket sales and chalet sponsors are strong, however, and we are looking at an extended forecast of sunny skies for the weekend. I am sure we are going to have another great attendance," Kaufman said. In addition, "We have a dynamite line-up which starts an hour later to give patrons plenty of time to get on the [Pease International] Tradeport."

The air show website lists enhancements over last year including an increased water supply, a heat warning index, two more entrances, and a100-percent increase in food vendors.

"Last year we had 15-minute intervals between each performance, but this year there will be no breaks, yet you will still see and hear all the heart-pumping performances," Kaufman said. In addition, there will be a misting station to cool visitors off and the heat warnings will be apparent with a flag system accompanied by speaker announcements. Free spring water will be brought in by the truckload.

Ticket proceeds will benefit many area agencies, and the Boy Scout Council will also be presenting a check to Portsmouth High School following the show. In addition to ticket sales, a fundraiser sponsored by the Brain Injury Association of New Hampshire (www.bianh.org) will take place on Saturday, Aug. 13, at 9 a.m. Teams with no more than 20 participants will compete to see who can pull a 98,000-pound Jet Blue plane 20 feet the fastest; there will also be prizes for most money raised and best team spirit. According to Ron Snow, director of marketing and development for the Brain Injury Association of NH, roughly 20 percent of veterans suffer from

traumatic brain injuries due to roadside bombs.

"Think of us as a GPS to help navigate the healthcare system. Our organization guides the wounded veterans to proper treatments, reminds people of meetings and makes sure people get where they need to go," Snow said. The show's fundraiser will help augment their services.

The Mainely Grillin' and Chillin' Festival

Is Eliot, Maine, the next barbecue hot-spot?

This summer marks the sixth year the Mainely Grillin' and Chillin' Festival and Competition brings the best barbecue to the seacoast of Maine. Hosted by the Raitt Homestead Farm Museum, the festival offers free entertainment for children and adults, a beer garden, live music and of course, delicious barbecue

No matter how you like your barbecue - slow and low or higher and quick — the festival has it all, from different sauces and various meat choices, to crash courses in pulling off your own perfect barbecue at home. But what makes a good barbecue?

'Good barbecue is when you put your heart and soul into it," said Lisa Raitt, trustee and event coordinator at the Raitt Farm Homestead. "[And] the sweat equity that goes into standing over the smoker. Everybody's taste is different. You give it 100 percent of your all."

The meat will have turn-in times from noon to 1:30 p.m. with the official KCBS awards ceremony at 4 p.m.

The Mainley Grillin' and Chillin' BBQ Festival and Competition originated as part of the Celebrate Maine Festival before switching to its current name in 2008. The annual festival and antique tractor shows continued to be put on even as the farm fell into disrepair.

The Raitt Farm, built in 1896, was used by mason Charles A. Raitt to produce bricks. The bricks were used locally and as far away as Boston and England. The farm was passed down through generations before Gerald Raitt took over after the death of his father in 1962, running it as a dairy business until he retired in 1983. He continued to raise chickens and sell eggs on the property until 2004.

Sixteen years ago, Lisa Raitt's husband leased the property from his uncle Gerald and held the first tractor show. Then known as the Eliot Antique Tractor and Engine Association, The Raitt Farm was given a non-profit status in 2001. In 2003 Gerald Raitt donated the land to the association and it became the Raitt Homestead Farm Museum in 2006.

According to the official KCBS rules and regulations, meat will be judged first by appearance. Judges will then take samples from containers of meat, scoring each entry for taste and tenderness before moving to the next. The scoring system ranges from nine to two, using whole numbers, with eight being "very good" and two being "inedible." Any meat that is served with an unapproved garnish, pooled sauce or less than six samples of meat will receive a score of one

A score of one results in disqualification and will require the approval of a contest representative. Other reasons for a score of one include sculpted meat, foreign objects in meat, marks on a turn-in container and incorrect meat. Judges who do not receive a sample of the types of meat will award a score of one. Points will be tallied, with a computer breaking a tie in the event meats are awarded the same number of votes. The total points for each entry will determine the winner.

The festival also features a People's Choice competition where festival-goers determine the winner on less strict guidelines. Those interested in judging the People's Choice competition can sign up at the festival and will score the meat on a scale of one to five on an official score card

Most often barbecue is associated with ribs, pork or brisket. But Raitt declares herself a die-hard chicken fan.

"Barbecue chicken for me is the best. I love barbecue chicken," she said. She added that her husband will often find her with chicken on the smoker. But she did give pulled pork second place. "People love [pulled pork]. You can change it up with different sauces."

Other food will be available throughout the day: barbecue hot dogs and hamburgers, traditional fair food - such as strawberry shortcake and fried dough - and, the event being held in Maine, lobster rolls. The food used throughout the day, including the lobster, is locally sourced, an important element for Raitt, who supports local business and products. Cabot cheese company represenatives will be at the festival handing out samples along with various barbecue vendors, such as Denny Mike Cue Stuff out of York featuring gluten-free and all-natural sauces and rubs.

On Saturday KCBS judge Ardie Davis will run demonstrations on how to properly prepare, cook and smoke meat. The event will feature Northeast Flavor magazine editor Jean Kerr as the emcee.

"You have to start with really good meat," said Raitt on perfecting the art of barbecue. "It's a great opportunity for people who want to learn. If they stay the whole day they're going to

learn everything they need to know — how to pick the meat and the cooking process — and we want people to cook barbecue at

Raitt says that people attending and participating in the two-day festival will have a positive influence on the Raitt Farm. The farm, now a museum educating local adults and children about traditional farming practices of the New England seacoast, will get all the profits from attendance sales. Admission to the festival costs \$5 free for children 6 and younger.

Other festival events include face painting and a bouncy house for children, and a beer garden sponsored by Shipyard Brewery for adults. On Saturday there is a rock climbing wall and a Maine Marketplace and Green Technology Expo.

Live music will be provided throughout the day on Sunday by The Don Campbell Band, Lit on the Flash, Tone and Phrendz and the appropriately named Pork Pullers. There is a Woodsmen Competition on Sunday with 50 lumber jacks participating. Raitt encourages those coming on Saturday to return Sunday for more activities and food.

"Both days have their own things you don't want to miss."

## Philbrick's keeps the natural, organic and gourmet on its shelves

Working as a store engineer for Hannaford supermarkets, Phil Philbrick designed and opened many of their stores but had always wanted to open a market of his own — an outlet for locals to sell their new products and a place where customers could have more allnatural and gourmet options.

"I like to say I got to practice with other people's money," Philbrick said.

Philbrick and his business partner Vicky Turner opened their second location of Philbrick's Fresh Market on Lafayette Road in North Hampton earlier this year.

"With this location we are able to take care of the people of Hampton, Stratham and other areas over this way," Philbrick said. The new 15,000-square-foot market sits only sev-

en miles down the road from the flagship store in Portsmouth and is three-fourths the size. The North Hampton location opened on April 2, exactly seven years after the ribbon was cut at the Portsmouth store.

"In Portsmouth we were ready to open on April 1 but being April Fool's Day we decided to wait until the second, just for good luck," Philbrick said.

The produce section of the new Philbrick's had been a Mr. G's supermarket at "the beginning of time when grocery stores were really little," but the entire space most recently housed a Rite-Aid until the pharmacy moved across the street. The building sat vacant for six years until Philbrick decided it to use it as the home of his second market.

The entry of the North Hampton store has a similar look to that of the Portsmouth location, as customers are greeted by the produce section. Philbrick noted the shop's produce as its "strongest suit" as nearly every item is organic and/or locally grown. "It's a little department but it does very well," he said.

The offerings available in the produce section vary on a seasonal basis and Philbrick noted now as the "glory time" for area farmers. "The tomatoes are coming in, the corn," he said. The names of the source farms are listed on colorful price tags in front of each produce item. The North Hampton produce area also features an open prep room where guests can ask the staff about each item. All the produce is washed and soaked by hand. Greens that get trimmed off the produce are given to three local farms to be used as feed for pigs and chickens.

In the earlier years at the Portsmouth shop, most farmers were not able to supply the store with enough produce to keep the shelves full, Philbrick said. Years later, the shelves are nearly stocked full. Even the eggs from Hayward Farm in Gilmanton Ironworks arrive in

"This growth in local farms has coincided with our growth," Philbrick said. "It's been great."

The organic eggs sit in an open cooler with organic pickles, hummus, spreads and even radish kimchi. A glass-fronted case sits nearby and is filled with milk, juice, cream cheese and a variety of yogurts and butters. Philbrick opted for the case to have doors so as to be more energy-efficient.

Philbrick expanded his vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free options at the suggestion of his customers. "Big corporate stores take forever to do those things," he said.

The new market also offers a large variety of imported and domestic beers, including a

few local suds, and boasts a larger brew section than that in Portsmouth.

"There is not a good beer selection around here," Philbrick said. "I'm not much of a beer drinker, but I've learned that there is a lot of interesting stuff happening with beer."

A small wine section is also among the market's offerings and Philbrick noted he likes to find wines that are not available at the nearby state liquor store.

The meat section features steak that is cut in house, hamburger that's ground in house, and marinated steak, chicken and turkey tips. The market also sells a variety of steak cuts, sausages, ribs and chicken. The majority of the meat is certified humane free-range Scottish Highland Cattle from Wee Bit Farm in Maine.

We sell twice as much grass-fed hamburger than we do of the other kind," said Garrett Hussey. Philbrick's seafood and meat manager. Though the shop does not open until 8 a.m. Hussey arrives daily at 6 a.m. to set up the meat section and fill an ice bed for the seafood display.

"It looks awesome and keeps the fish nice and cold," Philbrick said of the ice mountain sitting behind a glass panel, oyster shells peeking out from the chips. Local seafood is sold at the store whenever possible, he noted.

Prepared foods fill refrigerated shelves next to the seafood section and in front of the openconcept kitchen where the dishes are prepared daily, starting at 6:30 a.m. "There is nowhere to hide," Philbrick joked.

Recent offerings included roasted eggplant rolled with ricotta, spinach and chicken ravioli, crab cakes and Israeli coucous salad made with walnuts, ginger and citrus dressing.

The cheese case serves as an end cap of the prepared foods section, and staffers are on hand to answer customer questions. The market also sells sushi, and deli meats are available to be sliced to order and are nestled next to such specialty items as Shanghai dumplings and truffled mousse made with pork and chicken liver.

Rabbit, duck, venison, wild boar and bison are in the market's freezer cases along with breads, gelato, pizza, Indian dishes and gluten-free burritos.

Keeping with the all-natural theme, the market has a section of natural lotions, soaps, hair products and toothpastes, although a small space boasts old favorites such as Crest and Colgate.

One amenity found only at the North Hampton store is a full-service café that offers a variety of coffee drinks and freshly made pastries. Soups, salads and sandwiches are kept refrigerated in a smaller premade food section toward the front of the store

"Not a lot of places have a good quinoa salad," Philbrick said.

## **INGREDIENTS** Raspberries

Black or red, raspberries are delicious and are now in season.

Whereas the red raspberry originated in Asia, the black raspberry is only grown in North America and thrives in New England weather. If you poke around in your woods, you might find a few. I know I have already picked a few bowlfuls of the tiny berries, just in my back yard.

Raspberries are one of those fruits that you really want to pick yourself. They are extremely fragile and don't fare well when being shipped to your local grocery store, hence the hefty price tag stuck to each pint. It is even suggested that you pick them at dawn because the daytime sun tends to induce softness, which will make them crush easily when handled.

The best way to store your raspberries is in the freezer. They don't lose their flavor or

Raspberries can baked into pies or tarts. They can be pureed into a sauce, jam or even a smoothie; and they can be eaten raw or placed on top of cakes or yogurts for aesthetic purposes. Monadnock Berries farm has 4 acres of raspberries; however, their black raspberries are not as plentiful as usual due to the pesky porcupines. The red raspberries are ready for picking, though, so stop by here or at your local farm to pick some of your very own raspberries, and enjoy this recipe.

Raspberry Patch Crumb Bars Shared by Chris Bozak from Berry Best Farm

3 cups all-purpose flour

1 1/2 cups sugar, divided

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 cup shortening

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 teaspoon almond extract

1 Tablespoon cornstarch

4 cups fresh or frozen raspberries

### Directions

In a large bowl, combine the flour, 1 cup sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in eggs and extract. Press two-thirds of the mixture into a greased 13x9-inch baking dish.

In a large bowl, combine cornstarch and remaining sugar; add berries and gently toss. Spoon over crust. Sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture.

Bake at 375° for 35 to 45 minutes or until bubbly and golden brown. Cool on a wire rack. Cut into bars. Store in the refrigerator. Yield: 3 dozen. Editor's note: If using frozen raspberries, do not thaw before tossing with cornstarch mixture.

## Red, white and green A lot of wine, a little cash

This week, we took a trip to France in the summer if only in our wine glasses and compared two white 2009 Bordeauxs.

The 2009 Chateau Castelneau Entre Deux Mers (\$14.99) was a light gold color with a light floral nose. White Bordeaux are

mainly sauvignon blanc grape varietal, which, when from New Zealand or parts of California, can have a green, grassy flavor. Not so in Bordeaux, where the sauvignon blanc is blended with the rounder semillon to create a more full-bodied white than a single-varietal sauvingnon blanc found in the new wine world. And that's exactly what we found in this bottle. It was smooth and refined through its blend and we really liked it with a light cheese we were eating. The light citrus and flower flavors of this white remained subtle and restrained with a nice full mouth feel, a perfect summer food wine (or on its own).

The 2009 Chateau de la Jaubertie Entre Deux Mers (\$13.99 on sale for \$11.99)



couldn't have been more different than the Castelneau, though generally it's from the same region. The Jaubertie was lighter in color but was stronger on the nose with scents of lemon. The major difference between the two wines is that the Jaubertie uses muscadet in its blend, a

common varietal to add to white Bordeauxs. This muscadet makes all the difference. The wine was very floral with almost a sweet taste. We found the wine a bit powerful for our light cheese but guessed that it would go very well with salmon, swordfish or even a burger. This was a big floral white with plenty of personal-- a real delight to drink.

## York reinvents the nightlife scene

Blue Sky on York Beach attracts live music

There are many reasons to visit York Beach, Maine, the most obvious being the area's two beaches, Short and Long Sands. But over the last decade the village of York Beach has also reinvented itself into a music and food destination.

New restaurants, renovated high-end hotels, the ever-present art scene and the burgeoning music scene have people returning each summer and keep locals out late during the fall and winter off-season. One of these new establishments is located in one of York's older buildings.

Blue Sky on York Beach is located on the second floor of the Atlantic House, a recently renovated hotel that was built in 1888 overlooking Short Sands beach. The once grand hotel, located just inside the center of downtown York Beach, spent much of the 20th century as a safety hazard before a \$12 million renovation — a grand expense itself given that the hotel was first sold in 1894 for \$9,000 — reestablished the space as a destination for visitors and locals.

The renovation included nine luxurious guest rooms, shops on the street level and the Blue Sky in 2007. Since the Atlantic House reopened, Blue Sky has made a name for itself serving quality food with a knowledgeable staff and presenting some of the best live entertainment the area has to offer.

"Local patrons appreciate the renovations to the building and downtown," said Stephanie Schar, Blue Sky's event planner. She is surprised by how many local residents come out to the events year-round, especially in the summer, when the town has more out-of-town residents and visitors.

"Keeping things local is our lifeline," Schar said. Local patronage during the slow season is a desired commodity for businesses along the seacoast in Maine and New Hampshire and is often a challenge to local businesses and business owners.

The remodeled hotel, the restaurant and the venue were

built to offer visitors — a majority of the local economy during the summer season — a place to to be entertained and feel comfortable.

"We just want to [have] upbeat music that makes people relax and feel like they're on vacation," Schar said.

One of the best performance spots at the venue is Blue Sky's second-floor deck. The outdoor area overlooks Short Sands and is an enticement for beach-goers to come in and enjoy great local and regional musicians.

This summer the Blue Sky entertainment roster is full with musicians each night of the week. Some are new faces, though many have become staples and fan favorites. This weekend will feature Tom Kennedy on Thursday, Aug. 11, and the musical duo Steve and Dave on Friday, Aug. 12.

"We really have a following for Steve and Dave," Schar said. "They come out twice a week. [Steve and Dave] really bring people into the interactive show." She added that the duo is one of her favorite groups to watch each week and she appreciates how the musicians are able to incorporate the audience and restaurant staff into their act.

Performers with an engaging act are what Schar looks for when she books musicians. Schar said that a majority of the entertainers that Blue Sky hosts come to the venue asking to play the space and, according to Schar, will play first and discuss payment later.

Also this month, Boston-based Strange Machines will bring a reggae-rock sound to the Blue Sky on Saturday, Aug. 13; Dennis and Joe will play on Sunday, Aug. 14; Paul Caraher, of Rhode Island, on Monday, Aug. 15, and Jim Gallant on Wednesday, Aug. 17.

Dennis Coraccio is another favorite. Coraccio performs from an extensive knowledge of songs with only lyric sheets to guide him.

In the event of bad weather, the deck will be closed and the musicians will set up inside the restaurant at the hostess station or occasionally at the bar. Large bands, such as the four-to

five-piece groups that perform at Blue Sky's New Year's celebration, set up in the main dining room.

Schar has started work to bring new faces to the venue for the remainder of this year and beyond: "We want to be a hot spot in York year-round."

## FestEvolve goes public

... but the party vibe remains

Michael Bernier is brimming with positive energy as he talks about FestEvolve, the all-day festival he's presenting Saturday, Aug. 13, at the Amesbury Sports Park. Maine musical shape-shifters Rustic Overtones headline a nine-band lineup that includes Bernier and his group The Uprising. Also on hand are vendors who share Bernier's worldview.

"We're trying to put together this scene of righteous, like-minded people who care about their bodies, care about the Earth they're living on," Bernier said by telephone from Evolvement Studios, home of his weekly radio show.

"When you're in a position as a musician where you're speaking to the masses, it's your duty to do something with it, to spread a positive message."

It's the fifth year of an effort that began as a private gathering of passionate music fans, but grew considerably — much like Bernier and his band. Formed in 2006, the group regularly sells out venues in Bernier's hometown of Boston, and tours successfully all over New England. The Uprising will play the penultimate set of FestEvolve

The singer/songwriter just returned from a solo tour that covered New England and Florida and ended in San Diego, Calif.

"I closed down at the House of Blues, played like 26 shows in 30 days ... most of which were legit venues," says Bernier of the self-booked tour. "I was shocked that I could get great gigs in states far away from here just based on my musical résumé."

The festival's early years occurred in what Bernier terms "an anything-goes setting," but the move to a public venue opened the door for bigger-name bands like Rustic Overtones, whose set will likely include material from their 2009 album *New Way Out* and a few surprises. "We'll also be digging back deep into music

from the late '90s, and we're working on new material," said founding member and trumpet player Daye Noves recently.

The band's last record was a focused effort containing strings and other studio touches, which surprised a few fans.

"We were really able to sink in and get into writing and arranging," Noyes said. "In the past it was really organic, with a band getting into the room together and hashing out a song. This time around we had some time to think about the song and how it could be."

Rustic Overtones' music blends elements of progressive rock, jam, funk and soul for a very original sound, featuring multiple horns and at times triple keyboards.

"Everybody was really influenced by soul music with horns in it, but we were all rock kids too," Noyes sais. "We were all highly impressionable by everything we heard. If it was good, we wanted to absorb it, didn't matter if it was a heavy band or soul, it all hit us the same way. I think that shows in our music. Some people call it eclectic at times, and they would be right."

Noyes senses the follow-up to *New Way Out* will be a more stripped-down effort. "I can't even put my finger on it right now, but it's good," he said. "[Lead singer/guitarist] Dave

Gutter's writing good melodies and we've been pretty psyched about it. It's going to be yet another direction for us, I think, but a very positive and refreshing one, with some great themes and messages."

Like all of the bands performing at FestE-volve, Rustic Overtones came to the event after appearing on Bernier's weekly Evolvement Radio show on WXGR, 101.5 FM, located in Newmarket, NH. "It was great to see someone firing up a musical community, so we're really

happy to be a part of that," Noves said.

Featuring a mix of local music, live performances and social activist banter, it's broadcast and webcast Saturday mornings from 8 to 10 a.m. from Bernier's home studio. In the yearplus it's been on the air, "we've just developed an amazing network of bands," Bernier says.

The show is the centerpiece of Evolvement Music, which also includes recording, promotion and event coordination.

"It's a way for me to have a business that encompasses all these things," Bernier says. "We're all about positivity, creating a family in the music world. I'm not the typical promoter guy who's trying to scrap to get his extra 50 dollars. I'm trying to create good times, a cool

scene, positive vibes, good people and good music.'

Fair-trade clothing, jewelry, tattoos, art and other goods will be sold at FestEvolve.

"We seek out independent vendors that are like-minded, are in the positive vein of the festival and the entire Evolvement Music umbrella," wrote the organization's "Green Minute Kristin" in a recent e-mail.

Bernier puts a finer point on it. "That's what the whole Evolvement thing stands for: our team wants this world to be fun, take care of ourselves and be surrounded with people who have a positive vibe."

Rise of the Planet of the Apes

## Rise of the Planet of the Apes (PG-13)

James Franco makes apes smarter and next thing you know they're planning a fascist rebellion in Rise of the Planet of the Apes, a surprisingly fun take on the **Planet of the Apes universe.** 

The movie begins in Africa, where hunters attack a group of apes and catch them - not to kill, as far as we can see, but to take to America for research purposes. One such chimpanzee called Bright Eyes winds up in a drug trial run by scientist Will Rodman (James Franco). He is attempting to find a drug that can help the brain repair itself — particularly, in cases of Alzheimer's. This quest has special meaning for him, as we learn when we

meet his father, Charles (John Lithgow), a brilliant but quickly fading man. Bright Eyes scores high on cognitive ability tests and Will thinks at last he has found what will essentially be a "cure for Alzheimer's." On the day that he plans to show off the accomplished Bright Eyes to investors and FDA officials (or something, a room full of people who can be amazed and/ or horrified as needed), Bright Eyes is suddenly not herself. She won't leave her little cube and finds her inner wild animal when attempts are made to sedate her. Eventually crashing straight into the conference room. Bright Eyes is taken down by a security guard and with her dies Will's hope for his drug's approval.

In what seems like some shoddy scientific work, the pharmaceutical company's head, Steven Jacobs (David Oyelowo), tells chimp handler Robert Franklin (Tyler Labine, Sock from the much-too-short-lived Reaper) to dispose of all the remaining chimps because they're contaminated. With rage? With professional failure? If it's with the drug, then I'm not sure why they wouldn't test and observe the other chimps to see if they developed Bright Eyes' symptoms. Or do an autopsy on Bright Eyes. Or anything sciencey. But don't worry, you don't dwell too long on things because, as Robert soon realizes, Bright Eyes wasn't turned aggressive by the drugs; she was turned protective by the birth

of a baby chimp. Robert finds the baby chimp in her cubicle and, after having to euthanize all the other chimps (seriously? you don't look in the crazy chimp's cube first?) he refuses to look into those cute baby chimp eyes and insert the death needle. You do it or take him someplace safe, he tells Will. Will is also a sucker for those big baby chimp eyes, all trusting and primatey, so he takes the chimp home "for a few days."

Next thing you know, baby chimp is now three-year-old Caesar (Andy Serkis, all performance-captured and CGIed), living in a well-tricked-out play room in Will's attic. Will soon realizes that Caesar received some of the intellect-increasing benefits of the drug as well but whereas Bright Eyes' meds merely repaired damaged cells, Caesar's dose has increased his abilities. He can understand language and sign in response, he is agile and can think through things and he can reason. As he gets older, he even starts to have complex thoughts about his place in the world. Will doesn't seem terribly troubled by these advances in Caesar, but his girlfriend Caroline (Freida Pinto), a veterinarian, is worried that Will is screwing around with dangerous forces.

Because of Caesar's extraordinary abilities, Will starts sneaking samples of the drug home to give to his dad, who improves. His progress helps Will convince Steven to restart the drug's trials. But even for the what's-a-few-brain-cells-betweenprimates Will, Steven moves much too fast in his testing - which, of course, involves more chimps.

We get a remarkably well-developed story about the emotional life of the minimally verbal Caesar. He is a happy, curious child who loves his family. He grows to be boisterous, perhaps more boisterous than Will's suburban neighborhood can handle. He is smart enough to understand when something is wrong with Charlie. We get a sense of Caesar's longing and frustration as he lives near the human world but isn't quite a part of it. Eventually, the story takes him to a chimp sanctuary — though, some sanctuary. It's more like a prison run by the cheap, unsympathetic John Landon (Brian Cox) and staffed by his sadistic son Dodge (Tom Felton). Here, Caesar meets other great apes for the first time — including a bully chimp, a gorilla and an orangutan who also signs. He is first lost in despair but then he starts to figure out the way things run. As he tells the orangutan, illustrating with a stick, one ape is weak and can break but many apes together, like many twigs, are harder to break. (That bundle of twigs thing and the one charismatic leader do not bode well for an ape democracy.)

What truly makes that scene, however, is when the orangutan, who with Caesar has been watching the other

chimps wallop each other for no good reason, responds to Caesar's political philosophizing with "apes stupid."

Rise of the Planet of the Apes is actually a solid, old-school science fiction story, one about how the arrogance and over-reach of humans fuels their destruction. Will is well-intentioned and caring but he can't really do right by Caesar. And despite his attempts to present mankind with a cure, his inability to consider the ramifications of his actions makes his work potentially disastrous.

Bring to this strong story Serkis, who is brilliant at this kind of acting. He gives Caesar a soul and emotions we can understand even without words. He is able to do things with looks and gestures, just like a human actor would, while still seeming chimp-like.

Consider also that we all know, going in, how this movie is going to end. Or at least, we know the direction the story is going. It's basically a zombie movie where we go in knowing that the zombies will win. The movie is still able to make the journey suspenseful and keep us engaged. Rise of the Planet of the Apes is a refreshing update to the franchise. **B**
