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
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

Craft shows, kites, musical performances and stage shows are all happening this weekend for those in search of Labor Day activities in York County. Here are a few of the end-of-summer highlights:

Kittery

The Kittery Outlets will be hosting their annual Labor Day Sale Event from Fri-

day, Sept. 2, through Monday, Sept. 5. More than 120 stores will be featuring the latest in fall fashion. The Kittery Trading Post will be holding its **35th Annual Septemberfest**, a weeklong event filled with sales rotating throughout its many departments, including free giveaways, T-shirts and special prizes. York

It is hard to imagine a better way of spending the last official days of summer than relaxing on the beach. Labor Day is a holiday for workers, and relaxing is definitely an important part of this three-day weekend. Why not head over to Long Sands Beach in York and enjoy some sun, surf and fun on Saturday, Sept. 3? Then, to perfectly cap off the day, the 9th Annual **Bonfire** will be taking place starting at 5:30 p.m. and continuing through until 10 p.m. The bonfire will be located right in front of the bathhouse, where it simply cannot be missed by beachgoers. There will be live music by the Morlocks and plenty of delicious food supplied by the Meathouse, Anthony's and The Barn. Proceeds for this great Labor Day event will go directly to the York Food Pantry.

Ogunquit

One of the most popular of Maine festivals is Capriccio in Ogunquit, and this year the

21st Annual Capriccio will begin on Monday, Sept. 5. It is a two-week celebration of the arts, including film, music, poetry and theater, and is a highly anticipated end-of-summer tradition in the quaint coastal town. In the past, Capriccio has offered antique shows, classic film previews, poetry readings, live musical performances in many genres such as folk, jazz and classic rock, and open houses at many of Ogunquit's finest art galleries.

The Ogunquit Playhouse will be showing repeat performances of two of its most popular plays of the season on Labor Day weekend, *Pinkalicious* — a delight for children and young families — and *Legally Blonde*.

One of the biggest highlights of Capriccio is its Kite Festival, taking place this year at Ogunquit Beach on Saturday, Sept. 10.

Wells

Also on Saturday, Sept. 3, the **Annual Summer Concert** series in Wells will come to an end with the exciting sounds of the New Legacy Swing Band. Hope Hobbs Gazebo at Wells Harbor Park on Harbor Road will come to life with the swing sounds of the Big Band era at 6:30 p.m. The New Legacy Swing Band started in the early 1990s and has evolved into one of northern New England's most popular dance orchestras. With more than 600 songs in their repertoire, the band will be sure to please audiences of all ages and musical tastes.

Kennebunk

School's in! Those who want to get back into the swing of pencils and books, teachers and dirty looks, should check out the exhibit at the Brick Store Museum in Kennebunk titled "Learning is an Ornament: History of Kennebunk Schools." Admission to the museum is by suggested donation of \$5 per person. It's open Tuesdays through Fridays 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturdays 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., closed on all national holidays. Based on the 2009 book by the Museum's archivist, Rosalind Magnuson, this exhibit explores the development of Kennebunk's schools from the earliest one-room facilities to the robust district of today. Highlights of the exhibit include numerous vintage photographs, a schoolgirl's sampler, the original 1855 sign that hung at the Lower Alewive schoolhouse, and a replica turn-of-the-century classroom. This exhibit, which has been available for viewing since October 2010, will come to an end on Tuesday, Sept. 6.

Head on down to the Green at Kennebunkport on Saturday, Sept. 3, for the **36th Annual Craft Fair** hosted by The School Around Us, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. This fair will feature 80 juried artists and artisans, live music and food. If it happens to rain that day, the fair will be held Sunday, Sept. 4. Admission is free.

23rd Annual September Summer Solstice Craft Show in Wells

Darr Littlefield knows something about crafts. She has been involved with crafts for the last 45 years and started the Summer Solstice Craft Show in Wells Maine with a group of like minded friends 29 years ago. This year will mark the 23rd September craft show, held Saturday, Sept. 10, and Sunday, Sept. 11, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days. The September show is the second of two Summer Solstice Craft Shows held each year. The first is held in July and celebrated its 29th year this summer.

The large number of visitors to the area each year helps to support the craft shows. Littlefield said crafting is an old form of creativity, but she is happy to see vacationers stopping by and returning each summer.

"Crafting is kind of a dinosaur and it's great to see people come out to the shows. People plan vacations to the craft shows," Littlefield said. She added that people will often drive from Massachusetts for the day to attend the event.

Vendors come from all over the New England region as well as from New York and as far away as Florida. Littlefield says most are just happy to be in Maine and near the ocean. For the vendors, the show is like a working

Littlefield is lucky, turning what some would consider a hobby into a life-long career.

"In a crafter it's in the blood," Littlefield said. "You're just creative. You just want to create. You want to start with an idea and work it to a finish "

She added that working as a crafter and vendor is a good way to make a living. When she

was a stay-at-home mother, she said, she made so many things she couldn't give them away. That led to creating the craft show, which led to another, followed by another, and eventually it became a full-time job. Now Littlefield is an administrative assistant at the Wells Chamber of Commerce, organizing the Summer Solstice shows and the League of Maine Craft Shows. All are juried by fellow crafters. She said the position is somewhat of a dream job though it took her a year to transition into the

"It's the perfect job for me where I am doing basically what I had been doing but, now, 40 hours a week," Littlefield said.

During the economic downturn it was hard to be a crafter, or a craft vendor, and the job at the Chamber came at a perfect time for Littlefield. Despite the hurt felt by many small businesses and organizations, Littlefield remained optimistic in her plan to put on a successful craft show each summer drawing local and visiting shoppers.

"If you offer a quality show to crafters and the public, and you do your work as a promoter and an advertiser, you will see a good return in an economic downturn," she said.

Throughout the economic decline, more annual craft show promoters began to fill their vendor booths with imported goods from outside the country. The promoters of those events were looking to sell for profit. That cannot be said for Littlefield's craft show. All items are quality handmade crafts, never imported. And Littlefield takes it upon herself to absorb the blow of low attendance.

"If we don't have a big turnout, or many vendors, we eat the cost," she said. "We always thought long term and always will."

The Summer Solstice Craft Show is free to the public with free parking, and vendors keep 100 percent of any profits earned. Food will be offered by Julie's Ristorante and Provisto of Ogunquit. The spread will include clam chowder, veggie wraps, chicken wraps and deserts. The available crafts of the day will range in style and medium: handcrafted soap, lotion, jewelry, clothing and art and photography will

"You want it to be a diversified show for the customers," Littlefield said. "If one [vendor's work] looks too much like the other, you wouldn't bring those crafters in. We're trying to make a nice experience."

She added that shoppers often come with a set amount of money to spend, and she takes that into consideration.

With an increase of planning and scheduling added to her day-to-day activities, it's hard to believe Littlefield has the time to work as a crafter. But the truth is she still feels the need to create. She recently started making jewelry, something she said she has always wanted

Reflecting on what makes a crafter, Littlefield believes it is inherited and sees the same spark she had as a child in her grandchildren. She added that the desire to be creative is in her grandchildren's generation even if "the mediums may have changed."

Littlefield is ever the optimist about crafting. She sees it as a valuable art that can continue to be taught and encouraged in younger generations. She also appreciates being able to work in a community like Wells.

"I see Wells as — because we have the ocean - a big draw to people. It's very family- and people-friendly. People just feel comfortable,"

Littlefield is originally from New Jersey, but said she can trace the Littlefields to Maine over the last 344 years.

"I feel like a local," she said. "I've come home again."



NH honors citizen diplomacy with Peace Treaty Day

Portsmouth was site of 1905 signing

Just in time for the start of school, visitors and residents will have a chance to familiarize themselves with a lesson in history as Portsmouth Peace Treaty Day is commemorated statewide on Monday, Sept. 5. The treaty that brought an end to the Russo-Japanese War was signed at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard on Sept. 5, 1905, between Japanese and Russian diplomats.

We encourage everyone to celebrate the day of diplomacy in any way they can," said Stephanie Seacord, director of public affairs for the Portsmouth Peace Treaty Forum.

In addition to recognizing Portsmouth as the location for negotiations, the day will honor the diplomacy of the citizens of Portsmouth and their role in the peace negotiations.

"The interesting part is that local people, according to research for the 2005 100th anniversary, made a difference because formal negotiations broke down. For those 10 days, the people of Portsmouth invited both sides to picnics, teas, church gatherings to keep them in talks," Seacord said. "Now we understand how important that kind of atmosphere is to mediations and successful negotiations." Today, New Hampshire is the only state in the union that recognizes how its own citizens became involved in the ending of this war. Roosevelt eventually won a Nobel Peace Prize for his role as the facilitator.

At the time the treaty was originally signed more than 100 years ago, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard issued a gun salute and area church bells rang for an entire hour in celebration. This year, the shipyard will perform a Navy salute and signal the bells of area church towers to clang with a whistle blow. Portsmouth High School hand bell ringers who participated in a Japan exchange program will also be in Market Square conducting a performance in front of the Piscataqua Savings

Bank building. Those who would like more information about joining the bell-ringing salute should call Suzanne Moulton at 603-436-4010. Mayor Tom Ferrini will be reading the governor's proclamation that announces the day of celebration.

"It's all about citizen diplomacy," Seacord said. The Russo-Japanese war of 1904 and 1905 officially ended in Portsmouth. It might have become WWI had it not ended before more nations got involved. Overall there were 200,000 casualties.

Portsmouth was chosen as the location for the treaty discussions as a result of various circumstances. According to Seacord, neither side was willing to agree on a venue for talks. Secretary of State John Hay, who would normally facilitate the negotiations, was ill and eventually died at his home in Newbury, N.H. The folks at the Mt. Washington Hotel, which had just opened, appealed to Governor John McLane and official engraved invitations were issued. President Roosevelt, ever the diplomatic negotiator, was asked to assist in the matter as the United States was allied with both Japan and Russia at the time. Intrigued by the thought of New Hampshire as a possible location for the treaty negotiations with its cool summer climate, Roosevelt felt that the White Mountains were just a little too far from his vacation home on Long Island where he was spending time. As former Secretary of the Navy, the president decided on Portsmouth for its proximity to Long Island, and for the Naval Shipyard, which could offer security in a location that was not overly populated.

The Wentworth Hotel in Rye, N.H., also played a role in the treaty negotiations, as it was a location for meetings and lodging for officials. A stagecoach, vehicle and boat would transport the officials between the two locations. Ironically, the shipyard subsequently went on to build submarines in defense of Japan in WWII, and again during the Cold War as the U.S. struggled with Russia.



As visitors celebrate this day with the ringing of bells, the Peace Treaty Trail is also available for exploration, and maps can be found at the Portsmouth Historical Society (43 Middle St.), which is open seven days a week. "The best way to present the story was to show where these events took place. The trail covers the iconic sites of the treaty summer including the Wentworth Hotel, Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, private homes, and public events in and around the entire area," Seacord said. Maps are available at the Discover Portsmouth Center and the Chamber of Commerce, and the John Paul Jones Museum. On Monday, Sept. 5, the historical society (John Paul Jones House, 43 Middle St.) will be offering free admission between 3 and 5 p.m. A copy of the treaty can be viewed there. Alien landing

UFO Festival returns to Exeter

In the immortal words of Fox Mulder: the truth is out there. And now people can find it in Exeter

On Saturday, Sept. 3, the third annual Exeter UFO Festival will be held on New Hamnshire's seacoast, which is only fitting as that was the home of Betty and Barney Hill, the first two people to claim (and have that claim widely publicized) they were abducted by extraterrestrials.

The alleged incident took place in the White

Mountains in 1961 and has been retold in both a book. The Interrupted Journey, and on television, in The UFO Incident. In fact, the site of the alleged abduction is marked by a state historical marker. It is the 50th anniversary of the alleged alien abduction.

It will be memorialized in the premiere of Jeff and Jess Finn's documentary, Strange Septembers, which includes interviews with locals from the time period. The documentary also focuses on the Exeter Encounter, which happened four years after the alleged Hill abduction and involved a high school graduate, Norman Muscarello, and two police officers. Eugene Bertrand and David Hunt. who allegedly witnessed a UFO. The documentary will be the centerpiece of the festival.

The Finns have always had an interest in the paranormal, according to Jess Finn, and have been particularly fascinated with the Hill abduction since Jeff watched The UFO Incident starring James Earl Jones who was interviewed for the documentary.

"Ufology is fascinating to the two of us because, if it's true, if there are truly aliens visiting us (and based on these two cases, I have no reason to believe they aren't), then it's really the most important story of our time," wrote Jess Finn via e-mail.

"In regard to Barney and Betty Hill, I think they were sincere, honest people who contributed much to the civil rights movement [they were an interracial couple in the 1960s]," wrote Dean Merchant, the event organizer, via e-mail. "I believe in their hearts they thought they were abducted. I have had the opportunity to discuss the Hills with Col. Ben Swett, who was formerly at the Pentagon and an intimate of the couple.... Col. Swett believed the Hills were abducted and my mind remains open to that possibility."

The festival, which began in 2009, is both educational and entertaining, according to Merchant. The day will showcase worldrenowned authors and speakers like Richard Dolan, a prominent UFO researcher, and Stanton Friedman, a classmate of Carl Sagan. Mutual UFO Network's New England director Steve Firmani will discuss the alleged alien abduction of two Laconia teenagers in 2010.

'We look for speakers who are interesting, credible, will draw a good audience and are affordable." wrote Merchant. "We've been fortunate that several big-name speakers have made themselves available to us for this charity event.'

The event is free and has plenty to offer kids as well. There will be a UFO construction contest as well as animals dressed in alien attire.

The festival is held because people have a fascination with aliens. But what is it about extraterrestrials that people find so interesting?

"I think people are fascinated with the possibility of extraterrestrial life because it's one of the two great philosophical questions — 1. Does God exist? and 2. Is there other intelligent life in the universe?" Merchant wrote

For Merchant and others in the scientific community the answer to the latter question

"The greatest scientific minds of the last century, such as Carl Sagan and Stephen

Hawking, purport that because of the billions of galaxies, each with billions of stars and planets surrounding them, there are indeed probably many goldilocks planets occupied by intelligent beings within the universe," Merchant wrote. "It's not a question of if there is intelligent life but rather how do they get here from there? If you look at our own technological history — that the first rocket was sent up about 80 years ago and flew less than 100 feet and now our own astronauts have left 'alien' footprints on the moon and are capable of reaching Mars, I think our imaginations should be open to many possibilities."

Those possibilities will be on full display at the festival. And, besides, riding in a UFO is a convenient way to avoid Labor Day beach

More than just seafood

The Guac-n-Roll Cantina brings new flavor to York Beach

Joe Lipton won't be going anywhere anytime soon. The Inn on the Blues owner said he has spent his entire living in the York area along with his wife, Michelle Friar, who had the idea to open a taco stand for years before she made Guac-n-Roll a reality. Both are here to stay, to support the local community and to ensure people eat well.

But the Guac-n-Roll Cantina is more than just a taco joint. It is a restaurant inspired by South American cuisine and culture, with each dish prepared by hand.

In an area like York, where seafood is king, it takes a lot of support from the patronage of summer visitors and local residents, as well as local markets, to keep a place like Guac-n-Roll going. According to Lipton it's easy if you give back.

"One of the things I learned a long time ago is instead of advertising we would hold fundraisers and donate to a lot of different organizations," Lipton said. "We hire local people and they tell friends and parents and the high rate of turnaround comes from word of mouth."

The restaurant also supports local artists Dug Deshjardin and Ty Williams, whose work was featured in Urban Outfitters stores. Both artists helped to design the interior of the restaurant and their art can be seen on the walls and menu.

Lipton said Guac-n-Roll uses local products as often as possible, going to farmers markets for produce. The meat (beef and chicken) is local and the guacamole and chili are made in-house. Lipton's wife is a vegetarian and makes sure that other vegetarians can eat just as well as carnivores.

And what can a newcomer to Guac-n-Roll expect from the menu?

To start, try Guac-n-Roll's Maine-inspired guacamole (with choice of Maine lobster, or shrimp, lightly breaded, \$12.95). Here is something different and light: try a lettuce wrap, with a choice of filling (braised beef, \$11.95 pork \$10.95, braised chicken, \$10.95 and roasted vegetable, \$9.95), with green rice and salsa verde.

People are attracted to the cantina for the exotic selection of tacos, burritos and a menu that is unique amongst other area restaurants, like the Fish-Fenominal taco (fried fish with shredded cabbage, fresh cilantro, fresh salsa and Baja sauce, \$3.95) or the

Bean-Ba-Da-Bing (smoky black beans, queso fresco, fresh salsa and lettuce, \$3.25), The Gump (grilled shrimp with shredded cabbage, fresh cilantro, fresh salsa and Baja sauce) and The Lu-Lu (roasted vegetables, queso fresco, fresh salsa and lettuce, \$3.50).

The burritos are boss, as in the Boss Burritos section of the menu. All come with a choice of wheat or white tortilla bread, a side of tortilla chips and salsa. The options are The Bean-O-Rama (smoky black beans, red rice, cheese, lettuce and Baja sauce, \$7.95), Meeshs-Rito (roasted vegetables, black beans, green rice, cheese, lettuce and a creamy avocado dressing, \$8.95), Chik-Rito (braised chicken, black beans, green rice, cheese, lettuce and Baja sauce, \$8.95) and the intimidating Joey Knuckles (braised beef, chicken and pork, refried beans, red rice, cheese and lettuce, \$11.95). For vegetarians, try The Tofu-rito (with homemade tofu chorizo green rice, cheese black beans and lettuce, \$8.95)

Guacamole can be added to any burrito for \$1.

Enchiladas are a favorite on the menu. All enchiladas are hand rolled and coated in red sauce and melted cheese packed with refried beans and red rice with a choice of filling (braised chicken, beef, pork or roasted vegetables, all \$15.95).

Quesadillas, or Quesadeeee-Yahs as the menu calls them, are flour tortillas grilled with cheese, mild green chiles, onions and a choice of filling (braised beef, \$9.50, braised chicken, \$8.50, Maine shrimp, \$10.95, or roasted vegetables, \$8.50) or just as it comes (\$7.50).

For lighter fare, try one of Guac-n-Roll's unique salads. There is the Sombrero (mixed greens, smoky black beans, red rice, roasted corn, tomato and queso blanco with a honey lime dressing and served in a tortilla bowl, \$9.95), Pepitas (mixed greens, crunchy jcarna, cucumbers, tomato, jalapeno slices and toasted pumpkin seeds with a creamy avocado sauce, \$7.95) and the Coooooool! salad (mixed greens, shredded cabbage, roasted corn, fresh cilantro, cucumbers, citrus pickled onions, avocado with a coconut lime dressing. Steak (\$4), chicken (\$3), fried fish (\$3) pork (\$3), Maine shrimp (\$7), roasted vegetables (\$3) and lobster (market price) can be added to any salad option.

Lipton is impressed by the turnout of locals who, he said, often try to avoid the beach area in the summer. He added that there is a rebuilding of community that York Beach has been lacking and he is excited to be part of that through Guac-n-Roll.

"We can build the beach back up. You can walk around and

see so many people doing some great things for the area," Lipton said. "We are trying to be community-driven." Lipton added that he would like to see the people of York to be proud of the beach.

Though the restaurant isn't always open in the off season, Lipton said that it will remain open this fall until Halloween and will host events to bring the community together.

"In October my wife and I are going to host an art walk in York," Lipton said.

The art walk will be in conjunction with Guac-n-Roll, The Inn on the Blues and local artists. The proceeds will be donated to charity and there will be free food. Lipton did mention he had big plans to further the growth of business and community next year, but he remained mum on what those plans are.

"Every two years we do something," Lipton said. "Stay tuned."

Lots of local at Epoch in Exeter

Chef Beane serves modern American cuisine

The Exeter Inn is set in a large old brick house on Front Street with two white pillars standing tall at its entrance. A red and white lamppost stands out front. Epoch is tucked on the Pine Street side of the Inn and has a stone walkway of its own leading diners down a lighted path to its doors. A gazebo sits in the corner of a lush lawn; a brick patio with tables sits under a white pergola next to the entrance of the restaurant.

The stairs leading up to the bar and lounge area glow red, as does the backlighting on the liquor shelves. Red leather high-backed stools line the bar and surround a handful of hi-top tables. In the dining room, sunlight beams through the long sheer swirl-embossed curtains. White-clothed tables sit on oriental rugs and the round booths are roomy enough to sit four guests comfortably.

Executive Chef Bobby Beane has held the reins in the Epoch (pronounced "epic," an Old English word meaning "new beginning") kitchen for a little more than a year. Before taking the position, Beane had worked at the Four Seasons

Hotel in Boston and Todd English restaurants in Boston and Las Vegas. He said he came to Exeter because it allowed for a better quality of life.

Beane, a Culinary Institute of America graduate, did not have much opportunity to make the menu his own when he began at Epoch but has since been able to make the necessary changes in kitchen staff to better realize his vision of modern American cuisine based on French technique.

The menu at Epoch is divided into small plates, soups, salads and main dishes, most created with local produce and meats when possible.

The restaurant counts Breezy Hill Farm in South Berwick, Maine, Tuckaway Farm in Lee, Carl's Meat Market in Kittery, Maine, Browne Trading in Portland, Maine, York Lobster & Seafood in York, Maine, Moor Farm in North Hampton, Katsirubas Brothers Produce in Boston and Provisions International in White River Junction, Vt., as its sources.

Moor Farm is currently raising a pig for Epoch. Beane said he and his sous chef have taken to visiting the farm frequently to feed the swine

"I like to help raise it and see it all the way

through," he said, adding that it motivates him to be able to use 100 percent of the animal in his dishes.

All meats are cured in-house for the charcuterie, which is one of the most popular small plates on the menu, as are the jams and jellies that accompaniment it along with pickles and artisanal cheeses. The in-house-made gnocchi is also a popular starter course and is served with a parmesan reduction emulsified with butter in lieu of a red sauce.

Gazpacho is one of the newest menu additions and is served tableside at dinner. The gazpacho is brought out in a carafe and poured into a bowl already filled with a block of fresh crab meat, whipped sherry, finely diced cucumbers that had been compressed and marinated in an airtight bag with lemon oil and seeded tomatoes — the best Beane said he has seen all summer — from the Exeter Farmers Market. The clam chowder and corn soup (made with lobster and cilantro) are also served tableside.

"We were just pouring the soup in back and sending it out but it didn't match the style we do," Beane said of the improved presentation of his soup offerings.

Beane said his two favorite salads at Epoch are the Arugula Frisee (topped with eggs from Moor Farm, cured pork cheeks, grilled red onions and a truffle vinaigrette) and the From the Garden (a mix of baby vegetables often including red and golden beets, baby carrots and white asparagus topped with raspberry vin cotto and lemon oil). The From the Garden is served atop an edible "dirt" made of almond flour, butter, cocoa powder, barley malt flour, licorice root powder and porcini powder.

"We basically bake it off like we would a shortbread and just crumble it," Beane said.

The New England Farms Burger, made with meat from a handful of select farms in the region

and ground in-house, is one of the most popular dinners at Epoch and is topped with caramelized onions, bacon, Vermont cheddar and garlic aioli.

The Vegetable Ash Roasted Ribeye is also a favorite at the restaurant. For the steak dish, Beane gathers the scraps of vegetables used in other menu items, such as the root ends of garlic and carrots, tosses them in olive oil, wraps them in tinfoil and leaves them to sit for a day over hot coals to caramelize the vegetables and add a smoky flavor. He uses mainly hickory, mesquite and applewood for smoking the veggies.

As the ribeye is roasted at Epoch (Beane opts not to grill most of his meats as he called it a "harsh cooking technique" that toughens the meat), guests end up missing out on the grill flavor associated with steak. Beane paints the ribeye with the vegetable ash before it is put in the oven to allow for the meat to carry the smoky flavor without having been grilled.

Other entrees include Spaghetti, Pan Roasted Organic Salmon, Ritz Cracker Crusted Tuna, Seared Sea Scallops, Day Boat Cod and Steak

& Eggs (an eight-ounce grilled filet topped with a poached egg that has been breaded and fried).

Though Beane is not a pastry chef, he has developed a passion for creating new desserts. Lining the after-dinner menu at Epoch are such treats as Strawberry Fields (in-house-made pound cake topped with strawberries macerated in simple syrup, bergamot pastry crème and chocolate cookie crumbles to give the illusion of strawberries growing out of dirt alongside blades of vanilla grass), Fried Cheesecake (bitesize cheesecake spheres with a graham cracker breading, served with peach compote) and Fudge Brownies (three freshly made brownies covered in a cherry veil and served with root beer sauce, whipped root beer and sarsaparilla ice cream from Memories ice cream shop).

"Everything is made in-house," Beane said. "It's a little bit of work but it's not really work if you care about what you do."

This shop is popping

Michele's Gourmet Popcorn opens store in Epsom

A new store has popped up on Dover Road in Epsom, a store that owner Michele Holbrook hopes will become a landmark in the community and in the Granite State, a place where many generations will come to watch plain, snowwhite popcorn be transformed into one of more than 20 flavors.

"I want to become a household name, I want people to say, 'Let's go to Michele's,'" Holbrook said. "That has always been the goal since we started the business four years ago."

The popper that started it all sits in the corner the retail space of Michele's Totally Awesome Gourmet Popcorn, Holbrook's storefront that opened this week. The antiquated popper will continue to make eight ounces of popcorn at a time for customers to snack on while they walk through the space and peek through the viewing windows at the goings-on in the production room, where a 36-ounce popper has taken its place. If the need arises, Holbrook is ready to move up to a 60-ounce popper.

Holbrook is now using a caramel cooker that produces enough for 21 bags in only 20 minutes, a far cry from her standing over the stove watching caramel cook for 20 minutes to learn it would only yield enough for three bags. She also went from using one tumbler to three. Bagging and labeling is still done by hand, but Holbrook said if business continues to increase she may look into an automated bagging system.

The bright yellow walls of the retail space are painted with images of large popped kernels of popcorn and the room features an upright wide wooden board cut and painted to look like a box of popcorn, with a face-sized hole in it for photo opportunities.

"I know as a family we stick our heads in every one of those we find," Holbrook said. The popcorn box was designed to resemble a similar Halloween costume she had made for her son when he was in the fourth grade.

The center of the retail space is filled with short black metal towers, each with a handful of candy-filled metal mesh baskets hanging from them.

"Obviously it's not a penny anymore," Holbrook said of the bags of lollipops, jaw breakers and licorice ropes waiting to be poured into the baskets.

Other non-popcorn items, including chocolatedipped pretzel sticks, Twinkies, double-stuffed Oreo cookies and marshmallow pops, will line the glass cases in the retail space. As an oven has been built into the production space, Holbrook said she has not ruled out baking and selling cookies at the shop.

"Our focus is popcorn but we have the ability, now that we're here, to help draw people in that are not popcorn people, so why not do it?" Holbrook said

Epsom had not even been considered as a possible spot for their shop initially but the "for lease" sign caught their eye on trips to visit Holbrook's in-laws in Exeter.

"It was an empty shell; we fell in love with it," Holbrook said of the 1,600-square-foot space. "I laid [the business] out in my head that night."

When Holbrook signed the lease on May 4, the space, a former childcare center, was a blank canvas. Since then, a wall has been built to separate retail from the production area, the floors have been redone and sinks and exhaust hoods have been installed.

"It's been a process to get the place together but we're almost there," Holbrook said two weeks before the shop's opening. "I can't wait for people to see it."

Michele's Totally Awesome Gourmet Popcorn was born out of entrepreneurial spirit and from the visible devastation of a Girl Scout troop volunteer when she learned that Holbrook, a troop leader, opted not to bring her white chocolate popcorn to a potluck dinner both women attended in 2006.

"She said, 'I only came here to get your popcorn, I can't go home without your popcorn," Holbrook said. Holbrook and her husband had been researching opening a food business at the time but had set their eyes on making and selling whoopie pies. The Girl Scout volunteer's disappointment inspired the pair to enter the gourmet popcorn business instead.

Knowing she would need to make and sell more than just her white chocolate popcorn to

maintain a viable business, Holbrook has developed more than 20 deluxe, caramel-based, savory and sweet varieties of popcorn.

"Some flavors are standard and some are unique to us," Holbrook said.

Buffalo Supreme, a spicy variety that Holbrook said has a "good taste, good bite," is the biggest seller. Caramel and chocolate-caramel are also popular choices, as is the white chocolate popcorn that started it all. Pizza-flavored popcorn is a favorite among young snackers, and the dark chocolate mint popcorn is a nod to the Thin Mint cookies sold by the Girl Scouts.

For the fall, Holbrook created "chocolate apple harvest" popcorn, a play on the taste of gourmet chocolate-covered apples sold at fairs and local candy shops, made with caramel popcorn coated in apple flavoring, milk chocolate and crushed peanuts, drizzled with more chocolate.

"The proof is in the popcorn," Holbrook said.

Until now, Holbrook, with assistance from her husband and children, had been making small batches of popcorn to-order in a kitchen built in the basement of their Loudon home. The popcorn at the shop will still be made fresh to-order, Holbrook said. Michele's Totally Awesome Gourmet Popcorn is also sold at a handful of Granite State farmers markets and 37 stores in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, and is available to order from her website.

Holbrook is the face of the business and wears the most hats; her husband helps out with shows and takes his turn at the popper at night, and her three children lend a hand when needed. Her oldest son, Jesse LaMontagne, will likely come

on as a full-time employee at the shop later this year. LaMontagne, who holds an associate's degree in culinary arts, has already taken on a major role in the business, creating many of the seasoned flavors, Holbrook said.

"We all want to succeed," she said. "We are not looking to be millionaires at this; we just want a viable family business."

"Eventually we would like to retire and have the kids take over the business and have it be around for 50 years," she said, adding that LaMontagne will likely take over the business when the time comes. "[Jesse] sees the

Apples

Apple picking season is almost here! There are 2,500 varieties of apples grown in the United States; Red Delicious is the favorite of our nation. Other popular varieties are McIntosh, Cortland, Golden Delicious and Granny Smith.

Apples contain no fat, sodium or cholesterol. One apple contains five grams of fiber and about 80 calories.

The apple has been an icon in our culture for centuries. In Greek and Roman mythology the apple symbolized love and beauty. Nowadays we generally associate apples with autumn and maybe even the scent of Grandma's beloved apple pie.

When choosing your apples, look for a deep rich color — whether it's golden yellow or deep red, you want the color to be vibrant; this indicates full flavor.

Apples can be used in a multitude of dishes. My personal favorite apple dish is apple crisp, but apple pie comes in a close second. Apples can also be used to complement sausage or to add a fresh tang to a salad. Call vour local farmer or visit vour farmers market and pick your own bushel of apples. In the meantime, try out this recipe.



Cheese & Apple Hash Browns Shared by Willow Pond Community Farm

2 large apples, peeled, cored and finely chopped, about 1 pound

2 large russet potatoes, about 1 pound, peeled and cut into 1/4 inch cubes

1 medium-size onion, chopped

1 medium-size red bell pepper, seeded and

1 Tablespoon lemon juice

½ cup shredded cheddar cheese, regular or reduced-fat

2 teaspoons butter or margarine salt & pepper

1/4 cup chopped parsley

½ teaspoon cumin seeds

In bowl, mix apples and lemon juice. Set aside. Melt butter in wide nonstick frying pan or wok over medium heat. Add potatoes, onion, and bell pepper. Stir-fry until potatoes are slightly brown and tender when pierced, about 15 minutes. Add water, 1 tablespoon at a time, if pan appears to be dry.

Stir in apples and cumin seeds; stir-fry until apples are tender to bite (about 4 minutes). Remove from heat and stir in parsley. Put mixture into serving bowl. Sprinkle with cheese Season to taste with salt & pepper.

Red, white and green A lot of wine, a little cash

This week, we continue our rosé exploration with two European wines.

First we tried the 2010 Masciarelli Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Rosé (\$9.99) from Italy. It more on the dark rosé spectrum and has a nose of green plum. The red grape used here is the Mon-

tepulciamo and is from the Abruzzo region of Italy, which is on the back side of the boot on the Adriatic Sea. Many times rosés are created when the full red version of the grape didn't have a great harvest; perhaps it rained a lot and the grapes weren't full enough for their use as a red varietal. Regardless of why rosés are created, they are a summer treat. The Masciarelli is no different. As a dry rosé it's an easy drinking wine with citrus and green stone fruit with a nice short slighly sweet finish. One of our tasters even got a hint of





smokiness at the end. Wild fires that year?

Next we chose the 2010 Bodegas Borsao Rosé (\$7.99) from Spain. It was more dusty in color for a rosé - almost the color of watermelon — and comes

from the red varietal Garnacha, which is to Spain what Cabernet Sauvignon is to California. The Borsao had a citrus nose and a long finish that, like the previous wine, was a bit sweet, almost strawberry in flavor. This is lovely afternoon drinking wine with silky smooth flavors.

The Dance Hall in Kittery invites town to listen

Former Grange Hall is site for music, dance and community

Drika Overton marvels at the space around her. She keeps her small black poodle, Tucker, by her side and points out the various renovations that have led to The Dance Hall's completion — water damage repaired there, a new wall put up here, things brought up to current fire code.

The former Grange Hall, located in the heart of downtown Kittery, Maine, has taken time to come into its own. And there is still work to be done. The space is wide with maple flooring, a deep stage and retracting seats. The floor can be opened for Overton's various dance classes, or filled to capacity for live concerts, or host world music nights featuring live bands performing Latin music or jazz and dance.

Downtown Kittery, like many small towns in Maine, is going through a rebirth or resurgence in its approach to the music and art community. The Dance Hall is riding that wave of creativity, too.

Overton moved to the area 25 years ago and fell in love with the building when it was still just the town Grange Hall, a space for local performances but also a place of business and government. In 1996 the building went up for sale. Overton said that when she saw it on the market, she wanted to buy it and turn into something special.

"I had a whole thing in my head about community trying to create a space for music and dance that doesn't really exist other than in dance schools. And a place where people can experience it and see performers," Overton said.

Coming from San Francisco, Overton drew on the types of small performance spaces she saw throughout that city. But financial restrictions prevented her from making the purchase in the mid-1990s. Overton occasionally would rent the hall to stage a few shows. She felt the place was home, even staging a show she called Home on the Grange. But the Seacoast Repertory Theater took over the space for the next 15 years. Through the SRT, Overton "rented space for various things." As venue space for live music and dance began to disappear in Portsmouth, Overton moved her operations to Kittery full time.

Now open to the public, The Dance Hall invites people to come and see live bands, take classes in dance and drumming and experience the music of other cultures.

"I've always liked cultural and traditional dance and music. I like to promote that; I think it's really important for people to understand they are similar. It's part of our human nature to put music in dance. And in cultures worldwide its part of daily life," Overton said. "To me they're one thing."

On Friday, Sept. 9, The Dance Hall will welcome once again the Latin music of Boston's Combo Sabroso. The night promises dancing with a Salsa lesson at 7 p.m. and the band taking the stage at 8 p.m. The cost is \$15 and all are welcome.

Later in the month The Dance Hall will present the New Legacy Swing Band. The band performs classics from the Big Band Era. Tickets for that show will also be priced at \$15.

Tickets can be purchased online for both events from Brown Paper Tickets.

Overton opened The Dance Hall to a younger generation of musicians, many who have yet to perform in the area, and hopes to bring the community a diverse new music scene. The goal, Overton said, was not to have younger people move out of the area but to have them instead come in with their ideas and talents to reestablish Kittery as a music and artistic location.

Last week the popular free MP3 website Daytrotter — essentially a recording studio that offers live tracks of reworked or unreleased songs from Death Cab for Cutie, The National and Clem Snide to name a few — launched its fifth Barnstormer tour featuring White Rabbits, Deer Tick, We Are Augustines, Guards and Doug Paisley. The tour was scheduled to make a stop in North Hampton, N.H., but due to what the Daytrotter website termed "unforeseen circumstances," the venue had to change at the last minute. Overton stepped up, offering The Dance Hall's stage to the performers.

It wasn't the venue's first step into the alternative independent music scene. The Dance Hall was also host to Vermont's Mountain Man, a trio of female folk musicians who performed at this summer's Newport Folk Festival and have toured with The Decemberists. Overton was enthusiastic to have the trio perform and said she hopes to bring more acts like them to The Dance Hall and to Kittery.

For many years, Overton thought that the SRT would operate the space indefinitely. Over the next decade she watched as the building fell into disrepair.

"What a waste," Overton recalled.

Eventually Overton had to move on. She worked primarily in Boston, often traveling by train. A year ago, Overton was riding her bike through town and saw a "for sale" sign on the building.

"I saw the 'for sale' sign and thought, 'OK, this has to happen. It's an opportunity and I can't miss it,'" she said.

Overton said it was a struggle to get the financing to open the space in the way she intended for it to be used. She turned to Portland's Women's Business Plan for help. But with the economic downturn money was hard to come by. Because she tried, she said it was easier to let the idea go.

A longtime friend encouraged Overton to open the space as

a non-profit and even assisted in the purchase of the building. The Dance Hall now operates as a 501(c)3. Currently Overton operates the building on her own with the help of volunteers, and she encourages more to come and volunteer at the space. The Dance Hall opened this spring.

"It's hard because I still have to work to earn a living," Overton said. "I think it [The Dance Hall] has incredible potential, and the response from the community has been really good. It just takes time to build this kind of thing."

Overton said she is trying to add The Dance Hall building to the National Register of Historic Places. She said people who have grown up and spent a majority of their lives in Kittery come into the space and are awed by the work that has been done to make the space a lively spot for the community once again

"This building does have a life. You can feel it and when there's live performance in here it's like this is what it was built for. This is what it was meant for," she said.

See the Outlaws at high tide

They're a little bit Southern rock, a little bit SoCal

When the Outlaws burst on the national scene with the epic "Green Grass and High Tides" in 1975, they seemed a quintessential Southern rock band. Lynyrd Skynyrd lead singer Ronnie Van Zant certainly thought so; after seeing them for the first time, he called his manager, saying, "We found a band that wants to whip our ass, and they got 'em a 'Free Bird'!"

Their triple lead "guitar army" caught the ears of record executive Clive Davis, and the band was the first act signed to his Arista label. The band's eponymous first album also yielded the Top 40 hit "There Goes Another Love

Song."

But though the Allman Brothers, Marshall Tucker, Skynyrd and other bands influenced the Outlaws, their rich harmonies and tuneful melodies came from another place: the laid-back L.A. music scene.

"Popular culture was pervasive," says guitarist Henry Paul. "There was this underground cabaret, cosmic hippie, organic sort of movement musically — which I was a disciple of."

Paul, who brings the current edition of the Outlaws to Salisbury Beach on Friday, Sept. 2, cites Southern California groups as critical to the his band's sound — Buffalo Springfield, Flying Burrito Brothers, and the Eagles.

"The Desperado record was hugely influen-

tial on us; we were quite honestly in awe of the polished musical character of that group," he says. "But we didn't blueprint bands like the Eagles ... not that we could have. We had more like the Allman Brothers guitars with the Eagles vocal style."

In fact, when Paul first jammed with singer/songwriter/guitarist Hughie Thomasson, "we sat down with acoustic guitars and played bluegrass," he says. "It was one of the cornerstones of the group musically — then there was the rock 'n' roll."

After three albums with the Outlaws, Paul left the band in the late '70s to test other musical waters. His first solo album included "Grey Ghost," a tribute to his Skynyrd friends Van Zant and Steve Gaines after their deaths in a

1977 plane crash. He followed the Henry Paul Band with Blackhawk, a new country group that had a string of 1990s hits. "Yeah, I sort of set out early on to make it my life's work to help introduce the spirit and soul of country music to popular music," he says, "so as life work goes, I was pretty successful."

One sad legacy The Outlaws share with other Southern rock bands is a history of tragedy. Original members Frank O'Keefe and

Billy Jones died within weeks of each other in 1995 — O'Keefe by drug overdose; Jones committed suicide. But the hardest loss was Thomasson's death in 2007 of a heart attack.

It came a little more than two years after the band had reunited for its first tour in over a decade. Asked about the decision to resume performing as the Outlaws in early 2008 after Thomasson's passing, Paul's voice catches momentarily.

"That's hard," he says. "Obviously, he was an important part of the landscape musically. It was a challenge. I wanted to try and help be a part of putting together a really worthwhile music chapter to the band's history."

The current lineup includes members of Blackhawk and Paul's solo band, which helped with the decision to move forward.

"Not to sound self-indulgent, but from the standpoint when Hughie passed away and Monte called me and said, 'What the hell am I going to do?' — I was like, well we can put the band back together if you want to ... everybody came to the band through me when I put it together for the 30th reunion."

A long and solid relationship with guitarists Billy Crain and Chris Anderson added to his confidence. "I know them both very well, and I know what they were capable of. So when we got together and played, it became apparent very quickly that we had weight and substance. My songwriting is still very much prolific and at a very high level, so writing new music and trying to conclude the band's story on an up note creatively and musically is sort of the challenge that I am engaged in trying to make happen."

To that end, the band plans to record some new material with famed producer Bill Szymczyk (Eagles, J. Geils Band) in the near future.

"I'm excited to go back in the studio with Bill," Paul says. "We haven't set a date yet, but I think that that would be a very logical place for the band to start in the re-introduction of new Outlaws music to the fan base."

Paul still feels energized every time he heads out on stage.

"I love it," he says. "I couldn't imagine doing anything else."

Columbiana

Columbiana (PG-13)

Zoe Saldana metes out bloody death to person after person until she runs out of people to kill in Columbiana, a movie that is about 80 percent fighting, 20 percent plot.

Not, I should be clear, that this is a bad thing.

As a wee girl growing up in Colombia, Cataleya (Amandla Stenberg) was present when

her parents were gunned down by vicious drug dealer Marco (Jordi Molla) on the orders of even more vicious drug dealer Don Luis (Beto Benites). He leaves her alive to ask her about the whereabouts of a computer chip that holds valuable criminalenterprise-type information. But it's obvious Cataleya has been watching a lot of Xena, Warrior Princess, because she stabs Marco in the hand and scampers to safety, using information her father gave her to get a passport to the U.S. There, she makes her way to Chicago and her Uncle Emilio (Cliff Curtis). Teach me to be a killer, this at-most-11-year-old girl tells him. He's able to convince her to stay in school to become a smart killer, one who isn't just about brute force and big guns.

As we see, she is about these things but she is a crackerjack planner as well.

As an adult, Cataleya (Saldana) is indeed a smart killer. She works as an assassin, specializing in killing people in prisons or in well-guarded mansions. But it isn't just about the killing or the payday for her. On each victim she leaves a line-drawing sketch of a Cataleya orchid. The orchid was the symbol of her father's family, and she hopes to send a message (something like "check out my killing skills" and "come and get me") to the men who killed her parents.

This kind of life doesn't leave a lot of time for dating, so she has a very arm's-length relationship with Danny (Michael Vartan), an artist eager to learn more about

Columbiana is an economical movie. It doesn't waste a whole lot of time on extra plot threads or superfluous characters or, frequently, pants for Cataleya. Saldana spends a lot of the movie in what could pass for underwear (or, on one occasion, a rather skimpy wetsuit). It's as though the movie is quickly trying to get down to business — in this case, that business is giving us images of Saldana in minimal clothes carrying giant guns. Sometimes, when you order a cheeseburger, that's all you're looking for — cheese, burger, bun, maybe a pickle. Columbiana is that cheeseburger — no guacamole or bacon slices to get in the way here.

And on that level, the movie works. It reminds me a bit of Taken, a Liam Neeson movie where, in order to save his daughter, he spends, like, an hour and 10 minutes of the hour-and-30-minute movie killing people. Columbiana is still in its backstory when our heroine starts beating up bad guys and giving chase. Because this movie is all action, you don't worry so much about the fact that there isn't a lot else going on. Even the bit of cops-and-robbers with FBI Agent Ross (Lennie James) is just around long enough to further the hunt.

That's a lot for just Saldana to carry, but she does it admirably. She's a perfectly serviceable action hero — as good as Angelina Jolie but with more liveliness.

Looking for some no-frills kicking and shooting? Columbiana will get the job done. B-
