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

KITES ARE FLYING

At Ogunquit's main beach area on Saturday, Sept. 10, there will be a fantastic feast for the eyes — hundreds of multicolored and multi-shaped kites will be afloat in the air simultaneously above the sand and sea. The Annual Festival of Kites has been a popular part of the Capriccio Festival of the Arts for 13 years now, and event organizer Tracy Smith is anticipating at least 300 participants.

"The Ogunquit Rotary Club is busy putting together 300 kites made of Tyvex that we will give away for children and adults to decorate and fly," she said. "And of course, many people will be bringing their own. We will have a roped off area for kite flyers of all ages and experience, many from local kite clubs. We typically have standard diamond-shaped kites, but we may also see 25-foot lobster kites, bol [rotating] kites, and two-lined kites — basically, kites of all types and designs," Smith said. The festival is sponsored by the Ogunquit Rotary Club and Ogunquit Performing Arts (OPA).

There will be a place in the corner of the beach parking lot for people to pick up a kite and decorate it. And since the goal is to keep this festival free from any kind of commercialism, there will not be any food or beverages sold there.

The mass ascension

Noontime on Saturday will be the best time to get a glimpse of the kites flying at Ogunquit Beach, because this will be when participants in the festival will have what Smith described as the mass ascension. Then, "After the kites are all in the air, they will be judged by Rotarians and kite flyers. We will have 50 to 75 prizes to give away in all. Some will go to the youngest kite-flyer, the kite with the most tangles, etc.," Smith said.

Prestigious kite-flyers

Among the flyers present at the festival on Saturday will be members of the Nor'easters Kite Club of Portland, who are huge supporters of the annual event.

"The Capriccio Kite Festival is older than our kite club, but we have been involved since the

start," said club member Tony Heeschen. The Nor'easters Kite Club has been around since 2003, and Heeschen describes it as "mostly a bunch of people who like to fly kites and some of us who like to make them." The club has monthly kite flies and kite-making workshops. To join the club is as simple as can be: there are no dues, no meetings, no officers and no bylaws.

Members of the Nor'easters have many interests. According to Heeschen, there are kite surfers, kite skiers, stunt kite flyers, single line flyers, and kite makers. They fly their kites all over the Portland area — at Bug Light Park in South Portland, Fort Williams Park in Cape Elizabeth, Pine Point Beach in Scarborough, Long Lake in Naples and other fields in the area. There are approximately 55 members, with as many as 20 of them at a time participating in the monthly fly events.

Many of the members of this club are also members of the American Kite Flyers Association and Kites Over New England, another group that will be present in numbers at the Festival of Kites. How the festival got its start

Tracy Smith's dad, Larry, started the Festival of Kites. He was a selectman in town and a kite enthusiast who also started up the Ogunquit Camera Shop and Cricket's Corner Toys & Kites in 1986. Larry has passed the reins to his daughter but still takes part in the festival as its official announcer.

Tracy also operates the two stores now, and the businesses seem to go together perfectly. Whenever kites are spotted on the beach, a natural instinct for most observers would be to pull out the camera and snap a few pictures. Kite enthusiasts and photographers alike will find ample opportunity for both passions at the Festival of Kites in Ogunquit on Saturday.

The festival is now as it always has been, free of charge, and children can come out and have a wonderful time decorating, flying and watching the demonstrations from the more experienced flyers throughout the day. The festival will start at 10 a.m. and run until 2 p.m.

Seacoast September

The end of summer is not a bummer

Yellow school buses are teeming on the roads, the evenings are crisp and cool and stores are already advertising Thanksgiving. But these signs don't mean the end of summer fun. As any local can tell you, this is the best time to get to the beach, or visit the galleries, markets and shops that hug the coastline. The sun is still hot during the day and ice cream is still a perfect afternoon treat. So head out to one of the many events on now through October and squeeze the most out of this summer.

In York there will be a variety of festivals promising live entertainment, food, art, crafts and more. The events are part of Maine's Oktoberfest celebration.

Artfest

This festival showcasing art in different media is held Saturday, Oct. 1, and Sunday, Oct. 2, with participants from area galleries and museums. The festival is intended to expose the work of area artisans, performers and cooks to the public. Times for each vendor are different, though a majority will be at York Beach at 10 a.m. Many will close booths in the afternoon at 4 p.m. and some will remain open to 5 p.m. Participating vendors include the York Art Association, Guacn-Roll (in conjunction with Inn on the Blues), Mary Sweeney Pottery and River Current Studio. Antiquefest

Running from Oct. 1 to Oct. 9, this festival takes a different approach with participating antique dealers. Uniting the various dealerships that run along Route 1 in southern Maine, the York Chamber of Commerce will make a "trail map" available to shoppers of each participating dealer. Each shop will feature the festival's logo and each shop will feature a specialty item during the festival. To

Salefest

Local shops and business will open vendor stations on Short Sands Beach in York to sell items at discounted prices on Oct. 8, 9 & 10 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

27th Annual Harvestfest and Kidsfest

The biggest events at Oktoberfest, this year's annual Harvestfest and Kidsfest will take place on Saturday, Oct. 15, and Sunday, Oct. 16. The festival includes a range of entertainment, food and crafted goods. With roughly 200 vendors the day also includes events for the kids including games, hayrides and entertainment. Events will be held at the ball field and across from the York Beach fire station. On Saturday the Don Campbell Band will perform from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Stage One at the town ball field. From 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. The Substance will perform on stage two, The Esplanade. Other performers on that stage include York String from 11:15 a.m. to 11:45 p.m., Skyler from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m., Mainely Balloons from 1 to 2 p.m., Dan Blakeslee from 2 to 4 p.m. and his alter ego Dr. Gasp from 5:30 to 7 p.m. On Sunday there will be a Big Tent Pow-wow from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the ball field, and Dance Street Studio at stage two from 10 to 11 a.m., Park's Tae-Kwon-Do from 11 a.m. to noon and story time with Shawn Middleton from noon to 2 p.m. Extreme Air New Hampshire is set to perform from 2 to 4 p.m. and the day closes with the Harvest Raffle. Portsmouth Criterium draws cycling enthusiasts

It's the seventh annual on the Seacoast

On Sunday, Sept. 18, the streets of Market Square in downtown Portsmouth, N.H., will transform into a tour de force as the 7th Annual Smuttvnose Portsmouth Criterium celebrates the local riding community with pro and amateur races. A tradition since 2005, the event draws crowds in the thousands as racing enthusiasts spin tight circles between Congress and State streets in a 0.6-mile pro course.

The day begins with kids' fun races at 11 a.m., followed by adult races at noon, which include teams, professionals, and amateurs. All racers must have certification under the United States Cycling Federation (USCF) and will compete in the following categories: men's pro/1/2/3/4 and women's pro/1/2/3. Streets closures will begin at 7 a.m. and streets will remain closed through 7 p.m., to accommodate the event.

The race itself was a tradition from the 1970s into the 1990s and was resurrected by race organizers hoping to bring back a zest for the sport in recent years. Kicking off race day will be helmet-clad kids charging down an abridged course: the 4- to 6-year-olds (with and without training wheels) will race 600 meters, and the 7- to 9-year-olds (one lap) and 10- to 12-yearolds (two laps) will traverse a circle around Market Square. Medals will be awarded to the top three boys and girls finishers in each event.

"We have seen great participation and growth in our seventh year of the race. It's fun; you have a whole range of kids out there. Some are on just road bikes but ride very fast. And then others are out there just to have fun. We see a lot of kids coming back year after year," said Scott Bogle, organizer of the kids' event and member of Seacoast Area Bicycle Routes (SABR). The kids' portion is sponsored by Portsmouth Regional Hospital and encourages healthy activities for youth. There is space for 200 registrants, and with 160 children signed up last year, Bogle expects this race to fill up quickly. For more information on the kid's race e-mail kidsracing@portsmouthcrit.com.

In addition to the kids, pro and amateur races, there will be a community challenge including up to 10 teams with four cyclists. The race will be no more than 25 minutes and registration is \$250 per team. Proceeds from the challenge will benefit the Krempels Center (www.krempelscenter.org), a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of victims of brain injuries, trauma, tumor, or strokes. Companies signed up for the community challenge include organizations such as the City of Portsmouth, various bike shops, and companies that put together teams. The kids' fun race has a \$5 entry fee due by 10 a.m. on race day. Entry fees for the pro race participants range from \$35 to \$40 and cash prizes will be awarded to the top finishers. Participants are encouraged to pre-register through www.bikereg.com until midnight on Friday, Sept. 16. Race day sign-ups will start at 8:30 a.m. in the Bank of American Parking lot. The women's pro race registration was closed in August.

There will be numerous vendors at the Lifestyle Expo from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. The expo will feature cycling demonstrations, health and fitness exhibits, sports and recreational organizations, kids' activities, bike safety and tuning, sponsor booths and entertainment. Some of the vendors already registered include sports medicine facilities, BreastCancerStories. org, cycle shops, athletic wear sellers, and wellness providers.

When it comes to race support, race co-director Catherine Keenan said there are about 200 volunteers. But there is always a need for more help in the following areas: road marshalling, race setup and breakdown, loading and unloading hay bales,



parking, children's race, VIP tent, check-in, and administrative tasks. Volunteers will receive a race T-shirt and an invitation to an exclusive post-race party immediately following the race downstairs at the Jimmy LaPanza Lounge at the Portsmouth Brewery. Food and beer will be provided by Smuttynose. For more information on volunteering, e-mail portsmnouthcritvolunteer@gmail.com.

Plan to arrive early if you are participating in the race, and since there will be some street closures attendees are encouraged to visit the map on the Criterium website at www. portsmouthcrit.org for advanced planning. According to Keenan, parking will be at a fixed reduced rate in the parking garage, and there are other lots in the area around the course as well. Seafood Festival stretches out summer

Weekend-long bash draws a crowd to Hampton Beach

Who says Labor Day marks the unofficial end of summer? Not the organizers of the Hampton Beach Seafood Festival

Thanks to the annual event, people can stretch their beach-going, sun-enjoying and lobster- and clam-eating for one more weekend.

If you do go, you won't be lonely. The only event that beats the Hampton Beach Seafood Festival in terms of attendance is NASCAR at the New Hampshire Motor Speedway. Event organizers expect 150,000 people to take part in the annual seafood festival.

"It's really about seafood galore," said Jude David, chairwoman of the Festival. "Any kind of seafood you can imagine is down here.'

The event, which is the largest seafood festival in the state, showcases 50 restaurants and 80 arts and crafts vendors. The festival at Hampton Beach runs from 4 to 9 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 9; from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 10; and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 11.

"The best lobster roll you've ever had," David said. "Anyone who has won an award for a lobster roll is down here."

"It's lobster every which way you can think of," added Ginni McNamara, festival vice-chairwoman. "There's even lobster ice cream," which she said was awarded most unique cuisine at last year's event. There are seafood cupcakes available as well — vanilla cupcakes topped with caramelized scallops and chocolate cupcakes with sweet chipotle salmon, McNamara said.

A New England lobster dinner is a staple for the menu, as well as fried clams, which David said are "to die for." Expect plenty of varieties of clam chowder, seafood chowder or lobster bisque. There is a lobster roll eating competition at 2 p.m. on Saturday. It's the second annual competition and there will be 11 competitors.

Culinary chef demonstrations are a big draw. The best chefs in New England are continuously showing off their favorite recipes. Patrons get a sample and they get to take home a recipe, David said. Programs have all the information on what food is in each tent.

For seafood lovers, there is shrimp with lime and cilantro dipping sauce, pasta tossed in lobster cream sauce, fish tacos, Cajun seafood and more traditional New England dishes, like fish and chips, McNamara said.

"It's just on and on," McNamara said.

Non-seafood-lovers need not worry. There will be sausage, steaks, burgers, hot dogs as well as Jamaican jerk chicken, pulled pork, Chinese food and prime rib sandwiches — "Something for everyone," David said.

And don't stop with the main course. David said the event features an "incredible" array of desserts as well

"This is making me hungry just talking about it," David added.

The event started 23 years ago and was put on by the Hampton merchants and restaurants. Restaurants wanted to showcase themselves to the general public - and extend the summer season. The first festival was held in June, but the weather didn't cooperate. The following year and every year after, the event has been held in September in a strategic effort to stretch out the summer. Today, it takes the efforts of the Hampton Area Chamber of Commerce and 500

volunteers to put the popular event on.

David, who said she always used to attend the event herself, has been involved with the event for more than 10 years. She's been chairman for three years and was vice-chairman for the three vears prior to that.

Beyond the seafood and desserts, there is continuous entertainment throughout the weekend, including the live music of 15 bands and orchestras, live acts and events and activities for kids, including magicians, jugglers and storytellers. Main events will include fireworks on Saturday night at 8:15 p.m. and an extreme skydiving demonstration Sunday at 5 p.m.

It's also a great opportunity to shop, David

"It's just the best shopping deals," David said, noting that there are 80 vendors offering arts, crafts and locally made goods. The merchants across the street do their end-of-season sale as well. "It's the best place for Christmas shopping. I do my Christmas shopping there every year. Just some really unique items and great prices."

Some businesses report the festival is bigger than the Fourth of July in terms of sales volume. According to www.hamptonbeachseafoodfestival.com, many nonprofit organizations earn large chunks of their income at the festival.

Certainly the event is a draw for New Hampfshire residents, tourists and much of New England, but the interest is bigger than that. David said she's become friends with people from all over the world who make it a point to come to the festival each year.

"It's just people who love New England seafood," David said.

Hotels book up in advance as well. David said

David said the event draws a wide demographic mix.

"It's just people that come, families, that are here to have fun, to enjoy the last bit of summer, to eat and to shop until they drop," David said.

If you don't come with friends, there's a good chance you'll have made some by the time you

"There's nothing like it," David said. "It has that 'wow' factor. ... The atmosphere is just very happy and friendly."



Devotion to the past keeps Goldenrod thriving

York Beach restaurant serving the area since 1896

Maine's motto is "The way life should be." At the Goldenrod, a restaurant with a marble soda fountain and lunch counter located in the heart of York Beach, the expression seems to be, "The way life was." But some people might ask, shouldn't life be that way?

Famous for its Goldenrod Kisses taffy, the saltwater confection created by Edward Talpey when he established Goldenrod in 1896, the restaurant also boasts a full menu of breakfast, lunch and dinner. Its soda fountain counter serves homemade ice cream and sherbets.

"People like coming back to a familiar place to see faces they know," said David McMullen, part-owner of the restaurant. "We have people that come in whose grandparents or great-grandparents brought them in. We strive not to change."

And the restaurant hasn't changed much since it was first established, aside from a few upgrades to the machinery in the kitchen. Still you won't find one particular piece of equipment often found in other restaurants: there are no fry stations. McMullen said that long before fried food was considered a health issue, the fry stations were kept out of the Goldenrod kitchen for safety reasons and the lack of space.

When Talpey and his wife Mattie first expanded the Goldenrod — they later passed the business on to their daughter and son-in-law Francis and Irma Wagner — they incorporated a laundry agency and rented rooms upstairs. Then came the restaurant where the generations of owners to follow worked with what they had.

"They had to cook their own chickens," McMullen said. "When they [the original owners] got started, they tried things they knew they could handle."

Today the Goldenrod stands by its keep-it-simple-attitude and hasn't changed much on the menu. The restaurant's food is made on site, drawing from local markets when possible, and stored there for later use, including the ice cream and frozen vogurt

"We try to rotate the flavors constantly," McMullen said. He added that there are flavors that are available each day because they remain in demand. One of those flavors is the checkerberry chip.

"People will walk out if we don't have it," he said.

The Goldenrod also entices customers with frappes and iced drinks from the soda fountain to beat the remaining days of summer heat, including the malted frappe (\$5.29), root beer float (\$4.49), sherbet freeze (\$4.99), fruit slush (\$3.59), fresh lime Rickey (\$3.49) and old-fashioned egg cream (\$3.39).

But no day, even a day at Short Sands Beach, can start right without a proper breakfast. McMullen, who started working in

the restaurant's kitchen as a college student in 1969, said breakfast at the Goldenrod is his favorite time of day.

"Breakfast is a good time to talk [to the customers]," McMullen said.

Start the conversation off with a classic: two eggs, any style with toast (\$3.89). The eggs can come with home fries (\$4.79), bacon, ham or sausage (\$5.29) or both (\$5.89). From off the grill try the French toast (with maple syrup, butter and topped with sugar, \$4.89), the griddle cakes (a stack of three with maple syrup, butter, \$4.89, or with bacon, ham or sausage, \$6.19, or with blueberry topping and whipped cream, \$6.49). Enjoy Goldenrod's old-fashioned omelet (with home fries and toast, \$6.29) or choose from other omelet selections including cheese (\$6.29), ham and cheese, bacon and cheese, and sausage and cheese (\$7.29). There is also a Western omelet (ham, onions, green peppers and cheese) and a vegetarian omelet (onions, tomatoes, green peppers, mushrooms and cheese, \$7.49).

Goldenrod has a bakery serving blueberry strudel, assorted muffins and an apple or raspberry Danish (all \$2.29).

The lunch and dinner menu keep things traditional for people wanting an afternoon bite while on the beach or those strolling off the sand for a filling meal. The restaurant offers sandwiches, burgers, salads and seafood with dinner specials.

McMullen said the club sandwiches fly out of the kitchen. Try one from the menu: turkey (with bacon, lettuce, tomato and potato chips, \$8.49), ham (Swiss cheese, lettuce, tomato, pickle and potato chips, \$8.39), or a tuna fish salad (with sliced egg, tomato, lettuce and potato chips, \$8.49). All sandwiches are served on three slices of toast with mayo.

Also, try the ½-pound burger (with side of cottage cheese and fruit served with lettuce, or potato salad, lettuce, tomato and dill slice, \$8.19), fresh Maine lobster roll (with potato chips and sweet pickles, \$15.59), the Swiss cheese burger (\$6.39), a vegetarian burger (\$7.09), deviled egg sandwich (\$6.09, with bacon, \$7.59) complete with added side orders of a garden salad (\$4.59), coleslaw (\$2.39), cottage cheese and fruit (\$2.99) or potato salad (\$2.39).

The daily dinner specials, according to McMullen, include chicken parmesan, baked haddock and meatloaf. Of course, even with these, the big draw to the Goldenrod is the taffy.

The Goldenrod Kisses are saltwater taffy pulled and made while you watch, a tradition dating back to Goldenrod's origin. Then, in 1896, there was a railroad on Railroad Avenue and Edward Talpey pulled the taffy himself. The process was done by heating and pulling the taffy by hand, hanging it from a hook in the ceiling and stretching it out. The hook is still visible in Goldenrod's window, where Talpey stood, though now machinery does the pulling. After the taffy was pulled, it was cut into rope and wrapped by hand. That process also has been

given over to machines.

Changes in technology haven't dampened the nostalgic feel of producing the Goldenrod Kisses. According to McMullen, the machinery isn't that new. And it hasn't become a fully automated system.

"The machine that cuts and wraps the taffy was actually built sometime in the 1940s. You have to be able to work with it," he said.

Flavors are brought in from flavor houses throughout Maine. Some, according to McMullen, are older than the Goldenrod.

McMullen said it was luck and good timing that brought him to Maine from Florida during his summer breaks from college. He worked his way up each season and still has a fondness for working behind the counter and meeting new people, to whom he attributes the restaurant's success.

"I think the soda fountain is a great place to be, especially when it's not too busy — you can talk to the customers," he said. "It's the customers that do it. We try to give them the best"

Strawbery Banke fundraiser moves indoors this year

The Vintage & Vine fine wine and gourmet food tasting takes attendees on a tour of the 15 historic homes and gardens on the grounds of the Strawbery Banke Museum in Portsmouth.

"It was decided [a few years ago] to move the event into the houses and gardens to make the historic gardens the vintage piece," said Michelle Firmbach Nadeau, Strawbery Banke Museum trustee and co-director of Vintage & Vine. "The vintage focus of the event, essentially, is to showcase what the Strawbery Banke Museum is all about and it helps people who wouldn't have the opportunity to see those houses and gardens to enjoy them while sipping wine and eating fine food."

This year's event will be held on the museum grounds on Saturday, Sept. 10, from 4 to 7 p.m. To keep up with increasing attendance at the celebration, the event is now held across the museum's 10 acres of land.

"There is more room to move around, which allows for people to have better access to the wine experts to learn about wine, talk about the tasting, talk to chefs," Firmbach Nadeau said.

A VIP reserve tasting will be held in the Goodwin Garden during the event, from 4 to 5:30 p.m., and will afford VIP ticket-holders an opportunity to sample wines valued at more

than \$100 a bottle. "This piece of the event is really for the wine connoisseur," Firmbach Nadeau said, adding that three restaurant booths will be set up in the VIP area.

A 15-person volunteer committee selected Mark Gaier and Clark Frasier of Arrows Restaurant in Ogunquit, Maine, Evan Mallett of Black Trumpet Bistro & Wine Bar in Portsmouth, Thomas Perron of Mombo Restaurant in Portsmouth, Michael Buckley of Surf Portsmouth in Portsmouth and Mark Segal of The 100 Club in Portsmouth to serve as the "Star Chefs" at this year's celebration

"We're thrilled to have them," Firmbach Nadeau said. The chefs, each paired with a wine broker, will create dishes using local produce and fish center stage at the event, she said.

"At the museum we are very focused on sustainability and using local first, local products whenever we can," Firmbach Nadeau said. "We know that's important to our local restaurants and decided to take this next step to make this event a little more green."

A total of 25 Seacoast restaurants will offer samples of their culinary favorites throughout the museum grounds during the evening and 13 New Hampshire Liquor & Wine Outlets representatives and wine brokers will be pouring more than 100 wines. Soda and water stations will be set up throughout the museum grounds, as designated driver tickets are also

available to allow non-drinking guests to enjoy the food offered at the event.

A new addition to the event this year is a 26-passenger trolley service available for both event-goers and volunteers. It will run a continuous loop with stops at the museum, Hilton Garden Inn, Market Square bus stop and Parrott Avenue parking lot, from 3 to 8 p.m.

"We are always looking for new, fun elements for the event ... we talked about a fun way to entertain guests and provide safe transport and came up with the idea of creating a Vintage & Vine trolley service," Firmbach Nadeau said. "[The trolley] will allow guests to step out in style, leave their cars at home and enjoy a ride to the event with their friends and family."

Vintage & Vine is the largest annual fundraiser for the museum; more than 800 guests attended last year's event and raised a total of \$70,000. The museum set a fundraising goal of \$80,000 for the 2011 Vintage & Vine.

Food challenge

Hippo reporter faces one last contest: lobster rolls

Editor's Note: Hippo reporter Angel Roy spent the summer working her way up to the lobster roll eating competition at Hampton Beach this weekend (see more about the seafood festival on page 11).

Nine weeks ago I embarked on a journey that was perceived as insane by many and impressive by others. A journey that resulted in a handful of food comas and a weight gain of three pounds.

In the past two months I have attempted eight food challenges and have successfully completed zero. I held my own in competitions where I was pitted against men more than twice my size to eat a quart of hard vanilla ice cream with a tasting spoon; and to eat as many hot dogs as I possibly could in 10 minutes to secure a spot in the Hampton Beach Seafood Festival lobster roll eating contest — the goal I set for myself at the start of my quest.

My boyfriend has sat across the table from me at many of attempts — he even took on the Billy's Burger Challenge with me at Billy's Sports Bar in Manchester — and while he was supportive of my efforts, I'm sure he enjoyed indulging in the scraps of failure left strewn across my plate or sitting in a Styrofoam box in our refrigerator. My co-workers rejoiced when I returned from my most recent event, a lunch date with six pounds of barbecued meat at KC's Rib Shack, with about four pounds of proof that I stood no chance against the Feedbag Challenge.

Coming in a close second to the difficulty of the Feedbag Challenge was the Grand Poutine Challenge at Chez Vachon in Manchester: five pounds of poutine (french fries topped with black pepper chicken gravy and Canadian cheese curd) in an hour. I did not even last a half hour and earned myself a spot on the "Forfeited" sign on the restaurant's Wall of Fame.

The challenge I came the closest to completing was actually my first: the Great American Challenge at Great American Sub in Derry. A 21-inch steak bomb sub, a pound and a half of french fries and 60 ounces of soda in 30 minutes. I somehow willed my way halfway through that one despite being able to actually feel my brain and body slow down in a big way.

It made me feel a lot better to know that no one has been successful in tackling the Feedbag Challenge or the Great American Challenge and to know that those who have succeeded in the others I attempted are part of an elite group. I will be the only woman competing at the lobster roll eating contest this year.

The only real injuries I sustained during my journey were two small cold blisters on my fingertips from digging my hand into the quart of ice cream at the aforementioned Granite State Candy Shoppe ice cream eating contest during the Market Days celebration in Concord.

Because of the frequency of my attempts, I found it nearly impossible to follow any of the training tips shared with me by professional eater Pete Davekos before my foray into competitive eating. I was unable to go a week without eating meat, which he said he avoids before competitions as it takes longer to digest, and I only made it to the gym a handful of times. For the most part, though, I was able to fast the morning of my competition — but not the entire day prior as Davekos suggested. Between my profession and my love for food, I can barely even go five hours without eating, let alone a full 24. Not to mention that since my stomach has stretched out a little bit from all of this eating I have been hungrier than ever.

Matthew Stonie, of Hampton, won the 2010 Hampton Beach Seafood Festival lobster roll eating contest by devouring 23½ lobster rolls in 10 minutes. Tom Gilbert, of Amherst, Mass., came in second with 23. I have set a reasonable and attainable goal of eating at least three lobster rolls during the event — but maybe I will surprise myself and everyone else and win this thing!

Pumpkin

This week, we continue our EAN-LUC COLOM rosé trip through France but look at two younger bottles, both 2010

The first bottle we tried was the 2010 Jean-Luc Colombo Cape Blue Rosé (on sale for \$11.99). Like some of the other rosés we tried lately, this one was almost a dusty rosé color. Very much on the light side of a

rosé. On the nose we smelled citrus, almost a grapefruit. That smell carried through the flavor that too was on the grapefruit side with a touch of berry sweetness, a very dry wine. We felt this wine would go good with a salad or a spicy barbecue.

The other bottle we tried was the 2010 Chateau Montaud Cote de Provence Rosé (on sale for \$11.99) and this too was a dusty

Buoy brings in national bands

Slow growth brings new change to Kittery's music scene

Jeremy LeClair and Alex Mead relax in second-hand chairs, made of wood with a dated orange upholstery. Between them is a worn coffee table and rug, but the space has a minimalist vibe to it with white walls and sparse seating. A few microphone stands hang like scarecrows in the "stage area" alongside a drum kit and one squat amplifier. And the remaining work from a recent art show hangs on the wall.

You may not know of Buoy, but that will change. In the heart of Kittery, Maine, the space is located in what was once the town's post office. Through the efforts of LeClair and Mead, co-directors of Buoy, the space has become a gathering spot for live music and an art gallery.

"I think our niche, in terms of what's happening in the area as a whole, is really providing a place for touring bands to come and play. We're bringing in a lot of performers and visual artists and giving the public an opportunity to hear more music that's not from the area," LeClair said.

It's hot in the space on an early September afternoon, an industrial fan blowing warm air across the bare concrete floor. In a separate part of the building the whir of a saw as it cuts through wood and men's voices come through the walls. That space will be a new bar — The Black Birch — opening to the public in October, through friends of LeClair and Mead, and raises an important question: what about the noise?

Buoy is in a location that is zoned as both residential and commercial. Just outside the window the sound of a neighbor mowing a lawn competes with the noise of construction in the next room. And a stone's throw from Buoy's front door is Anneke Jans restaurant, a hair salon, and the Corner Pub. Recently, the former Grange Hall, now The Dance Hall, located behind Buoy, hosted Daytrotter's Barnstormer Tour featuring indie-rock bands such as Deer Tick.

"We still have neighbors. We don't have a lot of loud shows, especially in the summer because it's hot in here. We do whatever we think will work. I don't know if we'll have Deer Tick's full band play here," Mead said.

The noise ordinance, according to LeClair and Mead, is 9 p.m. to 9 a.m. with a decibel level limit set at 50, a somewhat out-of-date limit since the invention of the automobile.

"It's a really antiquated noise ordinance," Mead said. "Fifty decibels or something, which is like horse and buggy."

They both laugh at this, but noise complaints have been called in on Buoy in the past. Each time a call was made

police responded and both Leclair and Mead had the music turned down — they say the police are good about it. The venue, though, isn't intended to be a noisy detriment to the town. Rather, it is a place designed for musicians and artists to come together and let people experience their craft.

"I'm more of the school of just realizing what we have and playing at an appropriate volume," Leclair said.

"I don't want it to be a loud rock club," Mead added.

But they don't want volume to be a limiting factor when it comes to selecting bands or musicians for the space. The two have toyed with the idea of soundproofing, a major undertaking, and haven't arrived at a decision about that possibility. Instead, they ask bands to take the space into consideration when they come to play.

"I think variety is important to us," LeClair said. "Maybe 'experimental' is not the right word, but we do a lot of that. I wouldn't say, 'No, this can't happen here,' but if a certain musical act has volume as part of its ideology and can't do without it, then this might not be the place."

Buoy opened three years ago as new restaurants began to sprout up, drawing more people to spend time in Kittery. And with the new establishments came artisans looking for a good location at more affordable living costs than neighboring Portsmouth had.

"Kittery's still cheaper [than Portsmouth], so it's kind of your classic gentrification move, or, the artists go wherever is cheap," LeClair said.

A native of Hudson, N.H., Leclair spent time playing in jazz groups in Portsmouth. He says that at that time he and Mead were allowed to host live events at the now-closed Muddy River Restaurant in Portsmouth's Market Square.

"It was a weekly thing and sometimes we had a touring band play, but mostly it was a weird collective of local people from all walks of performing life," Leclair said.

Back then, the restaurant would give the basement over to the two at 3 p.m. and both Mead and LeClair had free rein to put on whatever they like. Then, as now, they approached scheduling with a laid-back attitude, starting each week, according to Mead, by saying, "What are we doing this week?"

Now the two plan live music just a month ahead of time. Most acts that play at Buoy LeClair and Mead met while touring themselves. Others reach out to Buoy directly based on word of mouth.

"It's a personal network," LeClair said. "We've done a little bit of touring ourselves and we're close with people who've done quite a bit more. So, mostly, bands on tour approach us.

They've heard about us over the years and that we're a good place to play and they contact us."

"Two months ahead somebody says, 'We're coming through town on this date. What can you do for us?' And we're like, 'Let's do it." Mead said.

Buoy will host Unprisoned on Sept. 16 and the two-year anniversary of Sun Worship on Sept. 17.

The space is ready for word to spread even more as Kittery re-develops itself into an art and music destination. It may be taking time to get there, but the men behind Buoy are doing what they envisioned three years ago.

"It's a real slow, steady build. We've just been doing it. From the most humble beginnings of putting on a show — we didn't have a name for the space. It's just been one step at a time," LeClair said. "There's no business plan, it's just doing. And putting things on for ourselves and for people."

Musicians gather for second Eve Rising Festival

Group aims for more visibility this time around

As Elle Gallo watched the first Eve Rising Festival unfold one year ago, she wasn't thinking about a follow-up — yet. It was her initial effort as a promoter; Gallo conceived the event as a celebration of the female creative spirit, with a wide range of musical talent raising money for local charities. Success on that level would be enough, she reasoned.

But by the end of the day, the future became much clearer in Gallo's mind, especially after an impromptu performance of a Great American Songbook standard closed out the festival and revealed the unity of spirit present.

"We invited all the musicians, whether they'd performed or not, up on stage and we sang 'Over the Rainbow," Gallo recalled recently from her

home in Haverhill. "Tears were flowing; it was such a joyous moment, and that was the grand finale."

Within a week after the daylong festival ended, every performer had signed on to return.

"The energy that day was palpable ... it was such a feel good event," says Gallo, whose own band also appeared. "The camaraderie between the musicians was incredible, and it's been great to watch them over the last year since they met at Eve Rising, do shows together and hook up with each other. We've really become good friends and done a lot of work together."

This year's show features a certified headliner in Robin Lane, a singer/guitarist who early on sang backup on the Neil Young classic *Everybody Knows This Is Nowhere*, and later cemented a place in the pantheon of Boston musicians with her 1979 debut album, *Robin Lane and The*

Chartbusters.

Lane once said this of her decision to take up performing in what many considered a man's world: "Somewhere in me, I knew I could do it too. But I was a girl, after all, and usually girls sat around watching the guys play their music."

Her charity, SongBird Sings, is among four organizations benefiting from the show. The nonprofit offers songwriting and recording workshops for at-risk youth, survivors of domestic violence, post-traumatic stress disorder, war and incarceration. It's an effort that grew out of A Woman's Voice, a program developed by Lane in 2001 to help her heal after what she described as "a painful end" to her first marriage.

"She really embodies what this festival is all about," Gallo says.

The Eve Rising Foundation grew out of last year's event, a formalized group with a board

of directors and an ongoing mission to support local organizations. But women helping women remains the festival's focus, Gallo stresses.

Emmaus, Inc., which supports the homeless community, is again a beneficiary. The group works to move people in emergency situations toward independent living, and runs several properties around Haverhill. One of Gallo's favorite moments of last year's festival was when Emmaus director Gretchen Arntz spoke to the crowd.

"She believes so much in what she's doing," Gallo says. "She's an amazing spirit, and when she spoke, that was very moving."

Also receiving support at this year's event is the Dana Farber charity Kick Cancer and a fund created by the Eve Rising board to help single mothers in Haverhill with the rising fees for children's sports programs.

Holding up this umbrella of giving is, of course, a first-rate lineup of musical talent. Among the standouts are singer/songwriter Amy Petty, who uses a loop pedal to turn a solo act into a band and (Petty label mate) Jen Kearney & The Lost Onion, blending elements of funk, jazz and Latin rhythms with soulful, powerful singing. The keyboard/guitar duo of Carrie Rowan & Adrienne Fawkes harmonizes and trades vocals - Rowan played solo last year -Gallo, a singer in the mold of Joan Osborne and Janis Joplin, performs with her band.

The show has moved to a new location. Last year's site, Winnekenni Castle, located on the shores of Kenoza Lake, was beautiful but remote, forcing most in the crowd to take shuttle buses to the show. There were more than a few complaints about a shortage of parking as well. That problem is alleviated at this year's venue, the rooftop deck of a multilevel garage in downtown Haverhill

"Winnekenni is a treasure and aesthetically was the perfect place," Gallo says, "but we wanted to be somewhere that was highly visible in the community."

Gallo feels strongly that Eve Rising is fast becoming a tradition; she expresses hopes to expand it in 2012.

'We may even do a two-day festival next year, with overnight camping," she says. "If I can get the city to be on my side."

Murray's Rule

Mike Beam, guitarist for the band Murray's Rule, has nothing but positive things to say about his bandmates — especially the lead, Lindsay Hamilton.

"She really puts on a big performance," Beam said. "They're some of the best musicians I've ever played with."

Murray's Rule came together in 2007 and has had a steady lineup for the last two years — the most recent addition was Hamil-

ton in 2009 — though each member has a side project outside the group. Playing in other groups allows the members to expand in different directions but also bring in unique perspectives to Murray's Rule, Beam said.

The band plays in a style all its own, a genre the group has dubbed "Roadhouse Soul."

"We created [Roadhouse Soul] because all of us had sort of different backgrounds. We were playing these songs with a much more hard rock feel to it. A little less fine around the edges," Beam said.

Murray's Rule writes original music that draws on Beam's introduction to jazz, funk and bluegrass music while he was a student at the University of Vermont. When he was growing up in Lewiston, Beam said, there "wasn't much going on" in the town and he wasn't aware of a music scene or how to become involved in one. He credits college with introducing him to people and bands that were active in the local music

Now living in Portland, Beam and Murray's Rule have a growing fan base that extends into the southern coast of Maine. The band has a vast catalogue of cover songs ranging from The Beatles to Amy Winehouse and including Ray Lamontagne, Michael Jackson, Eric Clapton and Cee Lo

"Even with our covers we've tried to take things in a new direction," Beam said. "Our approach to performing live is improvised a lot. We'll hammer out the basics and improvise and take it to a new direction."

Murray's Rule has a steady schedule of gigs every month throughout the coast of Maine, including performances every other Thursday at Alisson's Restaurant in Kennebunkport from 9 p.m. to midnight. The band is also available for weddings and can be contacted through their website.

With such a solid schedule and various side projects, it's surprising that Beam is still hoping to add more gigs and pos-

"Right now we're just having fun playing live. It's about finding places that connect with our style," he said. "But it's nice that we've got that opportunity."

The Debt

The Debt (R)

Three Mossad agents involved in the capture of a Nazi war criminal wind up with secrets about the mission decades later in The Debt.

It's the mid 1990s and Sarah (Romi Aboulafia) has just published a book about her parents' work on a Mossad mission in the 1960s that resulted in the death of a Nazi war criminal, the Surgeon of Birkenau, a Dr. Vogel (Jesper Christensen). The mission made Sarah's parents — her mother, Rachel Singer (Helen Mirren), and father, Stephan Gold (Tom Wilkinson) national heroes. But something about that mission clearly doesn't sit well, even after all these years, with Rachel, now divorced from Stephan and long retired, and David Peretz (Ciaran Hinds) the third man on the mission who has also long been retired from the Mossad. And there's something Stephan, who is now wheelchairbound but still an important official in the agency, is desperate to keep quiet.

In flashbacks, we begin to learn more about the mission. Young Rachel (Jessica Chastain) and David (Sam Worthington) lived in an apart-

ment in East Berlin with Stephan (Marton Csokas), the leader of the mission. Rachel and David posed as a married couple, with Rachel pretending to have trouble getting pregnant as an excuse to see Dr. Bernhardt, now a gynecologist, but who the Mossad believes was once called Vogel, a doctor who preformed ghastly experiments on Jewish prisoners.

The mission is to determine whether this man is indeed Vogel and then to find a way to capture him and smuggle him out of East Berlin. After all, while the mission represents a seeking of justice from one war, it is happening on the front lines of another one. When their original escape plan goes wrong, they end up having to hold Vogel captive, a circumstance that puts them all on edge.

Underneath this, however, even more is going on with this trio. Rachel takes a liking to David but, a restrained man, David is reluctant to show her that he shares her feelings. We learn that he has lost his whole family in the Holocaust — not surprising, then, that he might be afraid to open up to someone new, particularly considering the situation (the mission, three people living in close quarters). Meanwhile, Stephan, arrogant and ambitious, is a

bit of a ladies' man. He might not have David's deep feelings for Rachel but Stephan finds her attractive and clearly isn't going to let the moment pass if he gets his chance with her. As time wears on, this triangle adds to the tension of having to deal with Vogel, tension that the former Nazi exploits.

So much of what makes this story so fraught, so surprisingly engrossing has to do with the performances. The young and old versions of the agents are believably the same people — not something movies are always able to accomplish when different actors are playing the roles across time. Because Helen Mirren can make us believe that she is the same person as the one played by Jessica Chastain, we get the full story of Rachel — how she felt then, how it has colored her life. It makes the characters feel much deeper and more lavered. For a movie full of international intrigue, The Debt is a very guiet movie, one where the characters don't give big speeches as much as simply show what it is they're feeling. David, young and old, is a nearly wordless character at times, but we can sense, or maybe just fill in, more about his personality and his emotions than is stated.

Even Christensen, playing, essentially, the devil, but with subtlety, gives a performance that holds your attention. His character is evil, but not just a cartoon cutout of evil — he is a black hole of a man. The horrible things he did during the war are suggested in the way he is unapologetic and manipulative with the agents in

The Debt is a stronger, more thoughtful movie than its plot description (and its release date) would suggest. A gritty noir, a bleak war movie, a dark romance — The Debt is a solid film that deserves attention. **B**

Apollo 18 (PG-13) "Found footage" from a secret NASA mission uncovers a spooky something about the moon in Apollo 18, a sort of **Paranormal Activity meets** Apollo 13, minus any of the good things about either movie.

Astronauts Ben Anderson (Warren Christie), Nathan Walker (Lloyd Owen) and John Grey (Ryan Robbins) are sent to the moon as part of a top secret, post-Apollo 17 mission. Apollo 18 is a Department of Defense mission and will include setting up equipment that can help serve as an early warning system against Soviet missiles, the men are told. Grey stays in the orbiter and Anderson and Walker head down to the service in the lunar lander.

They start setting up their equipment and taking samples but things start to go wrong. They get strange feedback on their communications devices, they hear odd noises when they sleep, and one day they even find footprints, prints completely unlike American astronaut boots. They follow these and find what looks like a Soviet lunar lander, as well as something even more disturbing.

Were you a fan of The X-Files? With the conspiracies and the secret government within the government and the black oil and all that? Remember how. at some point (and I can't remember specifically what it was anymore well before Mulder left, possibly around the time the blonde UN girl showed up) you realized "oh, this isn't actually going to go anywhere"? Most

of this movie is like that. You have vour post-Watergate America, vour Cold War, your secret missions to the moon, your mysterious something and then, oh, I see, huh, that's disappointing. The "Something" is, well, stupid. It's nonsensical within the "this is the real world" gimmick of the movie and it's just not particularly interesting as a scary thing for either a sci-fi or a horror movie. It's even more of a letdown than a crash landing by Transformers voiced by Spock, which was this summer's other cinematic stab at creating a moon mystery. In fact, that opening segment of Transformers: Dark of the Moon, a movie that ultimately had nothing to do with the "dark of the moon," was more chill-inducing and sci-fi cool than the entirety of this movie. And that was Michael Bay we're talking about.

What makes the overall failure of this project so disappointing is that initially it seemed to have a lot going for it. This movie used its setup to its advantage — the grainy "found" footage helps obscure less than perfect sets and effects. It keeps things murky, which can help create mystery and the sense that you might not be seeing what you think you're seeing. Paranormal Activity did this brilliantly and managed to make slowly closing doors and pool cleaners scare the bejesus out of us. But Apollo 18 takes that nice bit of technical cover-up for a small budget and a fun conspiracy premise and does very little with it. It goes nowhere, brings up no delicious "what ifs" and offers nothing special about its characters to make up for the lackluster story.

Rated PG-13 for some disturbing sequences and language. Directed by Gonzalo Lopez-Gallego, Apollo 18 is an hour and 26 minutes long and distributed by The Weinstein Company.
